

MAYOR GAYNOR GRILLES HEARST AS BAD CITIZEN

Banquet to Associated Publishers of America Scene of Uproar Over Chastisement of New York Editor.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
New York, April 29.—In an attack of almost unexampled bitterness on W. R. Hearst, who has again and again been called a bad citizen, Mayor Gaynor threw the annual dinner of the Associated Press and the Newspaper Publishers' association into riotous and prolonged disorder last night. Mayor Gaynor was the first speaker and took for his subject "The Press in Its Relations to Public Officials." He spoke as he had been invited to do, without mincing words. Mayor Gaynor said in part:

"The press as a whole is just to public officials. When the election is over, its wholesome wish is to see the one elected give good government and to help him do so. In that just frame of mind you often forbear much. That is true of all honest and unselfish publishers and editors."

But if a publisher or editor be himself a perennial office-seeker, he may desire to assassinate everyone he thinks in his way, and then, alas, what disaster he brings upon journalism! It is painful to mention such exceptions and to speak of their acts, but we should not shrink from doing it in kindly spirit and for the sake of good. You expect me to be plain and not abate a jot or a tittle."

"A newspaper proprietor or editor who is simply bent on cutting throats is an awful spectacle. In no book or corner of his head, or in his heart, is there the slightest sense of truth or justice. We may pity him, but cannot in the interest of public morality and decency remain silent about his misdoings."

Directly Attacks Hearst.
"Let me illustrate by mentioning one thing out of many. As late as the fifteenth of this month W. R. Hearst printed in his principal paper here the facsimile of a draft on the treasury of this city for \$4,000 with headlines and an article attributing such draft as the expenditure of the present mayor. The headlines and articles assert I fixed the award and amount, and paid it, and the draft in the treasury is printed to prove it."

"But when you look at the draft, as given in the article (but how few people scrutinized it that closely) you perceive the date of it is left blank. I have brought it here as printed in this newspaper, to show it to you, and here it is. When you look at the original draft, which I have also brought here for you to see, you see the date of it at the top in large letters and figures as 'December 31, 1908,' which is before the present city government came in."

"When you examine the original further, you see it also bears plainly the date audited and vouched, which established the claim as a legal liability of the city, and was recorded in the comptroller's office on December 29, 1908. This date is also omitted in the newspaper copies as you perceive. In plain words, two state prison felonies, namely, forgery and falsification of a public document, were committed in the eagerness of this publisher to wrong the mayor of the city of New York."

"A day or two afterward, when he had heard rumors that members of the grand jury were taking notice of the matter, he published an excuse that the dates were so faint in the original draft that the photograph did not reproduce them. Now look at this original draft again. The date at the top, as you see, is in larger and more pronounced letters and figures than any other part of the draft. I had the draft photographed as a test, and here is the photograph. You see that it shows the date as plainly as any other part of the draft."

Wash Own Dirty Linen.
"I mention the matter to you because right here is where it should be mentioned. And let me say it concerns you, the publishers and editors of decent newspapers, far more than it concerns me. If you can stand such things in your great profession, the rest of us can stand it, or will try to stand it, until the hour arrives when we shall make up our minds to destroy it utterly and take effective means to that end."

"It is high time that forgery and libelers were in state's prison, and the time is not far distant when some of them will be there. And just think of a man who is capable of doing things like this being possessed of the notion that he is fit to hold any office from mayor to president of the United States. Morally speaking, his mind must be a howling wilderness. Never will he be a voter anywhere put such a man in office. The relation of public officials and the press should be one of good will on both sides."

Thomas T. Williams, business manager for W. R. Hearst, was refused permission to speak as he rose to reply to biting criticisms Mayor Gaynor had just made of Mr. Hearst's part in journalism. For 25 minutes the uproar continued, while men stood in their chairs and women craned from the balconies of the banquet hall.

Toastmaster N. C. Wright of the Cleveland Leader hammered in vain for order, while Mr. Williams stood impassive but obstinate and waited with folded arms to be called to order.

The orchestra thundered "Dixie," but Mr. Williams still kept the floor, and a semblance of calm was not restored until Rev. Russell Wright, D.D., of Brooklyn, with a felicitous speech, brought laughter that drove out anger.

State Buys Water Bonds.
