

MUCH WORK DONE AT SESSIONS OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Delegates to Convention, Which Closed Last Night, Elated Over Results; Twenty-Eight Counties Represented.

A most successful session of the state Sunday school convention was closed at the White Temple last night. Twenty-eight counties in the state were represented by delegates to the convention, this being the largest representation yet noted at any former state convention.

Great work has been done during the year in getting the Sunday school workers into harness and used to the work planned by the organization. President Steele considers that the work done by the convention has been of great benefit to the Sunday school cause. This is shown both by the increased attendance and interest at the convention and also by the good work done in the teachers' training school work and the formation of adult classes. According to President Steele there are now 200 or more adult classes in the state, and the number is being increased regularly. During the year there will be approximately 200 graduates of the training department, of which number 50 or 60 will come from Portland. This work is making greatly for the strength of the Sunday school work in the state as it gives the conduct of the Sunday schools into trained hands, all working after a similar plan.

The delegates pledged \$2870 to carry on the work of the convention before the session adjourned yesterday. At the afternoon session addresses were made by Mrs. Lucie B. Addison, Dr. J. R. Knodell of the Anti-Saloon league, I. H. Amos, Mrs. Ada Wallace Unruh and Miss Meme Brockway.

A banquet was served to 150 at 6 o'clock in the banquet room of the White Temple. Toasts were given by a number of those attending the dinner.

ORCHARD COUNTY MOVEMENT LAUNCHED

Milton, Or., April 29.—At a big mass meeting in the Oregon theatre last night it was decided to separate the northeastern part of Umatilla county under the initiative law into a new county to be known as Orchard county. The proposed division will have as its western boundary a line between Adams and Athena, will embrace 100 square miles of territory, and will have a population of 8000 with an assessed valuation of \$12,000,000.

A strong committee has been appointed with D. C. Sanderson as chairman and S. D. Peterson as secretary; trustees, Henry Prasher, N. A. Davis and J. H. Hall; publicity, J. F. Slover, J. P. Neal, S. D. Peterson, W. F. Koria, D. C. Sanderson and Bruce Shangle. A campaign fund of \$2000 will be raised. The county seat will be at Milton and the county buildings at an equal distance between the business centers of Milton and Freewater.

TRIP THROUGH AIR VERY STRENUOUS

Paulhan Tells of Suffering of Flight for \$50,000 Purse—White to Get Cup.

(United Press Special Wire.)
London, April 29.—Louis Paulhan, the French aviator, who won the great aerial derby from London to Manchester, declared today the flight was one of unbelievable hardship. He was so nearly exhausted from cold and exposure when he reached Manchester that he did not believe he could have remained aloft another quarter of a mile.

He declared that he would not make the trip again for twice the prize the London Mail offered.

The \$50,000 purse will be presented to Paulhan at a luncheon at the Hotel Savoy tomorrow. Claude White, who twice tried to make the flight and who contested with Paulhan, will be a guest at the luncheon. He will be presented with a great memorial cup, valued at 100 guineas, a purse being raised for White and it is expected that it will amount to \$10,000.

PIONEER MINISTER DIES AT BROWNSVILLE

Brownsville, Or., April 29.—Robert Cerleu Martin died at the home of his son, E. S. Martin, in this city Tuesday evening at 7:30. He was born in Boone county, Mo., July 22, 1837. In 1847 he

enlisted in company C, Colonel Powell's battalion of the Missouri mountain volunteers, and fought during the Mexican war. He crossed the plains in 1849 to California and was immediately appointed by the governor of that state to return to Missouri and assist the emigrants to cross the plains to California. At a camp meeting held in Gilroy, Cal.,

May 18, 1855, he was converted and joined the Methodist church south, and at once entered the ministry, being ordained by Bishop Andrews. In 1860 he, with six others, was ordered to establish churches in the Willamette valley. On December 1, 1861, he established the first M. E. church south in the valley at Corvallis. At one time he was presiding elder of the Jacksonville district.
