

INSURGENTS RISE UNDER WALLS OF CONSTANTINOPLE

Encouraged by Albanian Revolt
—Turkish General Refuses
to Lead Troops; Says Young
Turks to Blame for Trouble.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Belgrade, April 30.—The Turks are strengthening the garrisons in and around Constantinople in anticipation of a local uprising as a result of the revolt of the Albanians, according to today's dispatches. The revolutionaries are receiving reinforcements and funds from the people from Sanjak to Novi-Pazar, and nearly the entire population is in sympathy with the insurgents.

Albanian Boy, among the most prominent Turkish military leaders, has refused to take command of a division of the loyalist army which is to be sent against the Albanians. He told the government war office officials that the position taken by the Young Turks was unjustifiable and on this account he could not fight against the rebels. Nisai's prominence makes his attitude a serious obstacle for the government to overcome in its determination to suppress the revolution.

Reports from the field.
The outcome of the battle of Katchank Pass has not been learned. There has been fighting in the pass for three days and nights. According to the reports hundreds on both sides have been slaughtered in hand to hand conflicts.

The rebels have captured the towns of Hellan, Iakova and Ipek and it is believed are still holding Pirand, one of the most important towns in the province.

Austria Covers Turkish Soil.
Government officials at Constantinople are greatly alarmed on account of the action of the Austrian government in sending a cruiser and torpedo boat to the Albanian coast. The war vessels were dispatched ostensibly to protect Austrian interests in the revolting district, but the government fears that Austria intends to seize Albania as she did Bosnia and Herzegovina.

For several months some of Austria's representatives have been accused of undue activity in stirring up trouble in Albania, and for several years diplomats have whispered that Austria was desirous of getting possession of a slice of Turkish territory, which would give Austria a more extended seaboard.

DESPERATE BATTLE
NOW IN PROGRESS

Constantinople, April 30.—A desperate battle is being fought today between the Turkish forces and Albanians midway between Salonika and Ushak. The Turkish forces are being killed and wounded, and according to the reports the losses have been the heaviest of any battle fought thus far in the campaign.

to join in driving the fighting game from the state and asking all classes in all cities and towns of the state to use moral and political pressure on city, county and state officials to "kill" the fighting game in California forever.

Proclamation Outlined.
"Religious people and those who have the welfare of their homes and families at heart should combine in a final effort to prevent the Jeffries-Johnson fight at Emeryville on the greatest day in the American calendar," was the statement of the Rev. Dr. William Kader outlining the substance of the proclamation.

"All should bombard the district attorney of Oakland with letters of protest and force him to use every means in his power to prevent any possibility of a repetition of last night's fatality. Not alone the religious, but the domestic and business elements should combine to strike at the root of an evil which threatens the social, moral and financial foundation of the state. I consider the fatal injuries to McCarthy as a result of the prize fight last night as calling for a denunciation on the part of all good citizens and for a discontinuance of the fight nuisance in California."

"The time has come for the state to eradicate this vicious crime from our midst and the governor and legislature should be memorialized asking for the enactment of laws sufficient to forever banish a so-called sport which is now outlawed in nearly every state in the union."

California, Middlemen.
"California is held up to the ridicule of the world by such disgraceful scenes as that enacted last night, the one at Point Richmond a few weeks ago and others which have taken place in this vicinity within the last few months."

"The Church Federation of San Francisco is determined that this nuisance shall be banished from our city and will use every legitimate endeavor to see that this result is brought about."

The following announcement of the plans of the Church Federation of San Francisco was made today by Attorney J. E. White, chairman of the civic activities committee of the organization:

Presidents, Cal., April 30.—When the Pasadena Ministerial Union meets next Thursday night drastic resolutions urging the district attorney of Alameda county to prevent the Jeffries-Johnson

GOVERNOR GILLET
PUTS BURDEN UPON
DISTRICT ATTORNEYS
(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, April 30.—The Church Federation of San Francisco today sent a telegram to Governor Gillett, calling upon him to use his official position to prevent the Jeffries-Johnson fight at Emeryville, scheduled for July 4.

The governor will be urged to take a stand against the proposed fight in resolutions being prepared by the federation. Officials of the organization today declared it to be the desire of the governor should announce his position in the matter without further delay.

The text of the telegram follows: "Honorable James A. Gillett, Governor of California—San Francisco Church federation urges immediate action to prevent proposed Jeffries-Johnson fight at Emeryville, July 4."

White is attorney for the Church federation.

Sacramento, Cal., April 30.—Governor Gillett this morning washed his hands of prizefighting in California. He does not believe it is the province of the governor to stop prizefighting, but he refused to make any positive statement as to what he might or might not do.

Although he is against prizefighting and prizefighters, Governor Gillett this morning forcibly intimated that he saw no cause for the governor of the state to take any steps to stop the Jeffries-Johnson fight. In fact, he said plainly that if the state laws were being disregarded, complaints should be made to district attorneys instead of to the governor.

Evidently unaware that young McCarthy had been killed last night and that a storm of protest against the big Fourth of July fight had arisen, Governor Gillett this morning said he has nothing to do with fights, never saw one, never would see one and heartily denounced the newspapers which print stories of fights.

Governor Gillett said the matter of McCarthy's death was not a matter which interested him so far as it concerned prizefighting, and that he had as yet received no telegrams concerning the matter or asking him to stop the Jeffries-Johnson fight.

"I do not read about prizefighting," said the governor. "The whole country is waiting for some expression from you regarding McCarthy's death, and whether, as a consequence, you will stop the Jeffries-Johnson fight," he was told.

"The whole country will wait a long time before it gets the expression," replied the governor.

"Ministers are holding meetings and declare that the Jeffries-Johnson fight must be stopped," he was informed.

"If the law is being disobeyed," replied Governor Gillett, "they should make their complaints to the district attorneys. They are the officers."

Then Governor Gillett became excited on the prizefighting subject in the newspapers. Turning to a number of newspapers, he turned to the sporting pages, one of which contained the picture of young McCarthy, and snapping the page, he said:

"The governor of this state deprecates the fact that the great dailies of the United States give columns and pages and extra editions to prizefighting. If the big papers would not advertise the fights, there would not be any of them."

Then, refusing to make a direct, definite statement as to whether or not he would take any action, the governor retired into his office.

DONAHUE SAYS DEATH
WILL HAVE NO EFFECT
ON HEAVYWEIGHT FIGHT
(United Press Leased Wire.)
Oakland, Cal., April 30.—The responsibility for the death of Tommy McCarthy rests upon the shoulders of District Attorney Fickert and Sheriff Tom Finn of San Francisco, and all the executive officers of the state who have failed to enforce the state law regarding prize fights," said Carlos G. White, attorney of the Oakland Church Federation, today.

"The law has been persistently violated for years, if it had been respected and enforced Tommy McCarthy would not have been killed last night. The Moran-McCarthy fight would never have been allowed."

The state law absolutely prohibits such contests. The fight last night was identical with those that are being held throughout the state continually. McCarthy's death may mean the enactment of new laws regarding prize fights."

FICKERT SAYS FIGHT
ACCORDING TO LAW;
HE NOT TO BLAME

San Francisco, April 30.—The grand jury will take up at once consideration of the circumstances surrounding the death of Tommy McCarthy, the fighter," said District Attorney Fickert today.

"Attorney White of Oakland does not know what he is talking about when he accuses me and other officials of being responsible for the death of McCarthy."

"The referee should have stopped the fight or the police should have intervened when they saw that McCarthy was being beaten. If he was in the condition described in the newspapers."

"I think that the promoters and not the immediate participants should be held partly responsible for the fighter's death. Also there are many permits granted to clubs by the board of supervisors which never should be granted."

"It is hard to place the responsibility, as the fight was held under a law passed by the legislature."

GLEASON SAYS BIG
FIGHT PROGRAM WILL
STAND, BEING LEGAL

San Francisco, April 30.—The death of Tommy McCarthy will in no way affect the plans of the promoters of the Jeffries-Johnson fight, according to Jack Gleason. Gleason said today that he looked upon McCarthy's death as an unfortunate incident in a world of sport but of no more significance than deaths occurring in football, aviation or automobile racing.

"Had the death of McCarthy occurred even two weeks before the Johnson-Jeffries fight, it would not have affected our plans. The Jeffries-Johnson fight will be held under the law, according to law, and will not be prevented."

The general opinion here among sporting men is that McCarthy's death was unavoidable and that no one could be legally held responsible.

JEFFRIES SAYS IT'S
SAD, OF COURSE, BUT
COULDN'T BE HELPED

Ben Lomond, Cal., April 30.—Jim Jeffries' comment on the death of Tommy McCarthy was brief.

"See, that's pretty tough on old man McCarthy," he said. "They told me he was a kid, and it will surely break the old fellow all up."

"As to just how little McCarthy met his death, I don't know any of the circumstances just now. I presume it was just one of those unfortunate accidents that could not be avoided. A thing like that is likely to occur in most any line of sport—automobile racing, hunting, fishing, or even in military pastimes. Nevertheless, it's mighty tough for a family to lose a lad of McCarthy's age."

Fresno Joins Anti-Fighters.

Fresno, Cal., April 30.—Pastors of all the local churches will attack prize fighting from the pulpits tomorrow morning, according to Rev. Thomas Boyd, president of the Ministerial union. The matter was taken up by them today. Action regarding McCarthy's death will be taken by the union Monday.

The church federation in Fresno is greatly worked up over the report. Fighting is not permitted in Fresno, though it is allowed in other parts of the country.

San Diego Ministers Protest.

San Diego, Cal., April 30.—It was announced today that the local ministerial association will probably pass resolutions at its meeting Monday asking that prize fighting be abolished in the state. Local ministers are in favor of a movement against prize fighting and many stated today that they would sign petitions to the governor and other officials asking that the Fourth of July contest at Emeryville be stopped.

than my salary will amount to. For instance I spent \$30 in making enumerations of the Corbett building, from which many complaints came that the offices there had not been visited.

The government rules do not allow the enumerators to visit offices. The people must be found at home. But we have been answering every call, no matter from what place it came."

The Commercial club as headquarters for the census was today the busiest place in town. L. A. Coddington was in charge of the distribution of men. More than 200 volunteers from the business offices came in during the morning and were assigned to duty. Many others came to deliver properly filled out enumeration blanks in number of from one to ten.

Captains Establish Headquarters.
Each captain established his own headquarters for the day as follows:

First district—H. W. Stone, Y. M. C. A.; here 80 men were entertained at breakfast that they might be given the earliest possible start.

Second district—M. Moessohn, Chamber of Commerce office; reported many additional names before noon.

Third district—L. E. Rhodes, Y. M. C. A.; working in the Burnside street section, where the greatest congestion is found, was compelled to move his headquarters in an automobile in order to keep the work successfully moving; he is secretary of the Y. M. C. A. for Oregon, Idaho and Washington.

Fourth district—B. D. Sigler, county assessor; commenced the enumeration yesterday afternoon and completed his work at noon today; used his own men, and they were thoroughly organized; reported a finding of about 5 per cent of misses.

Fifth district—W. C. Kavanaugh, 312 Board of Trade building.

Sixth district—L. D. Freeland, Oregon Furniture Manufacturing company.

Seventh district—L. W. Bowman; made headquarters in the waiting room at Grand and Hawthorne avenues; asked and received 35 additional men after the work was commenced.

Eighth district—E. P. Hapwood; the Oregonian.

Ninth district—W. P. Olds, Olds, Wortman & King; used men from his store to help him in the work; each one given a particular district; assured that he would complete the district before night.

Tenth district—George W. Shepherd, Chamber of Commerce building, supplied with men for the west end of his district from the Peninsula Lumber company, shortly after the work was commenced came in person to the Commercial club and asked for 30 additional men. He is one of the largest districts in the city.

phone bonds is to be combed over by the May grand jury. The Morris trial should Morris go to trial, may delay the commencement of the Wilde investigation. Should the trial be obviated by the pleading of Morris, then the investigation will doubtless be taken up at once.

Because of this it is expected that he will be the star witness against Wilde when the investigation is started before the grand jury. SHOULD RESIGN
SAYS GRAND JURY

proving the methods of work in his office.

Investigated Charges.
The condemnation of the school board and the call for the resignation of its members is the outgrowth of the charges recently investigated. The school board's investigation was regarded by many as a farce, the result being a report that whitewashed Jones, the architect, referred to in the grand jury's report as the superintendent.

That the loose methods of the board leaves ground for suspicion on the part of the grand jury that other improper expenditures of money have been made is shown by the recommendation for an expert examination of the books. The grand jury believes this experting should go back four years.

The report on the subject of the school board reads as follows: "In the investigation of the school

board affairs, it is certain that the foreman has put names on the pay roll of men not working for School District No. 1, that were otherwise employed. It seems to us that the superintendent either did know or ought to have known of this."

"The directors, in our opinion, have been negligent in their duty in allowing such conditions to exist. An intelligent examination into the methods of returning 'time' would have revealed this condition, or at least the probability of its existence. The foreman has been discharged and we suggest to the taxpayers that they request the resignation of the board. We further recommend that an expert be secured to examine the books and the doing of the board of directors of School District No. 1 for the past four years."

"We wish, however, to commend the work of our present school clerk, H. H. Thomas. We believe he is endeavoring to establish a system which will be a great improvement over the present method. We believe if he gets the support of a board of directors he will be able to establish a system that will save School District No. 1 a vast amount of money."

SCHOOL GROUNDS
TO BE IMPROVED
George Otten, a pioneer landscape artist of Portland, was appointed yesterday by the building committee of the board of education to inspect the Glenwood, Irvington, Richmond, Peninsula and Portsmouth school houses and to make a report to the board at its next meeting, covering the sanitation of the structures. Mr. Otten will also recommend the expenditure of money for the beautification of the grounds of these schools. The board will spend \$20,000 in improving grounds.

The proposition of calling an international convention of the Iron Molders union next September, in Milwaukee, is being voted on. It is stated that an international convention costs the locals about \$75,000.
