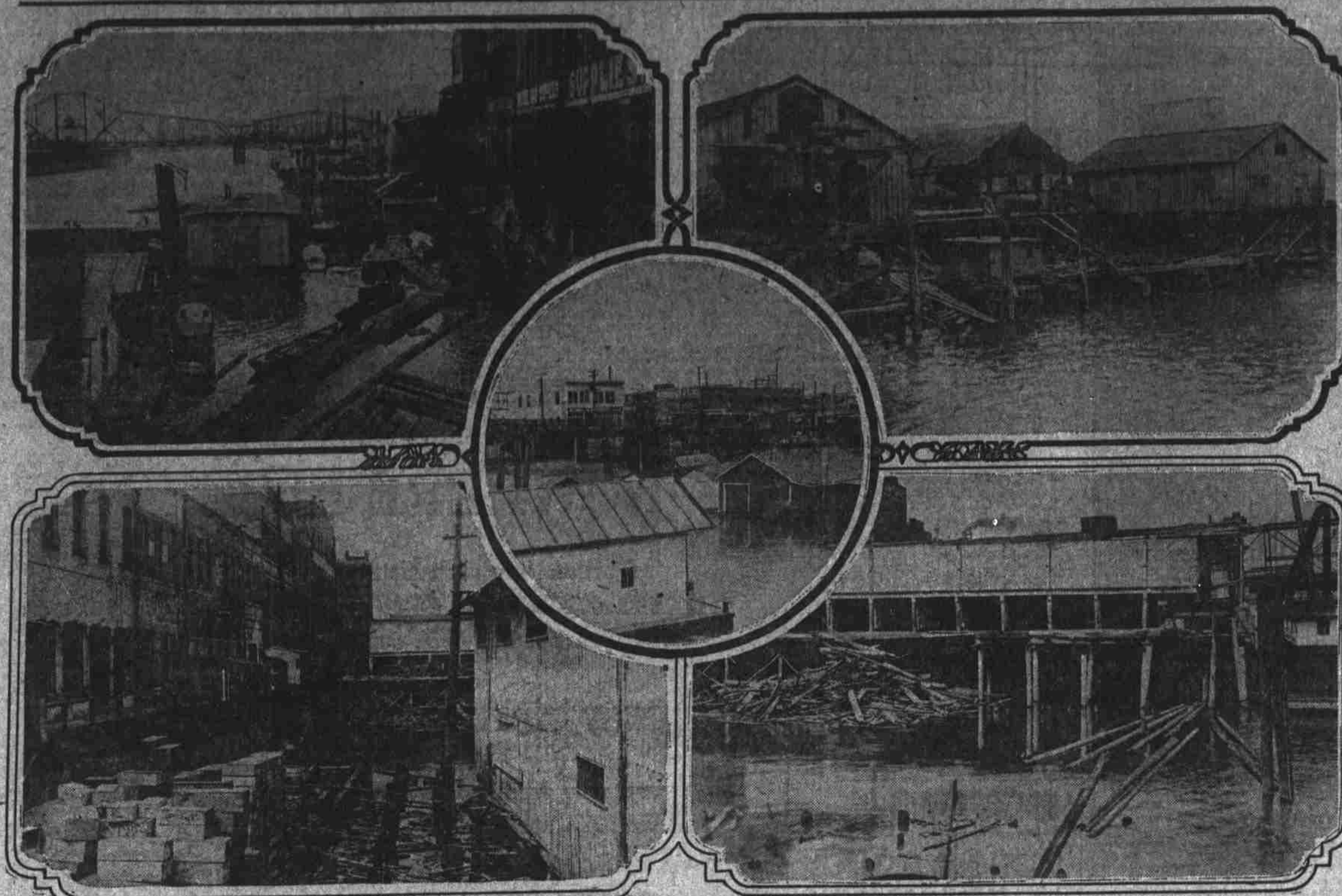


PORTLAND'S WATERFRONT MOST UNSIGHTLY OF ANY ON PACIFIC COAST

Experts have said that Portland may possess the finest fresh water harbor in the world. But, first, municipal docks must be acquired and the government thus given reason for spending millions of dollars in deepening the channel. Under present conditions Portland is said to have the most unsightly waterfront of any city on the Pacific coast.

Under cheaply constructed docks the pilings have rotted and twisted and slumped. Refuse collects at the water's edge and foul smelling scum covers the water's surface.

Shanty boats are assembled between the bridges. Street urchins and criminals find refuge underneath the piers. Disease and dirt add to the general repulsiveness.

The advantages, commercial and aesthetic, that would be the certain result of tearing away the old hideous docks and substituting concrete built wharves for them has been pointed out. A boulevard might be built close to the water's edge. Well arranged lights

would add to the effect of commodious dignity. An advertisement for the Rose City worth millions in its permanence and practical benefit would thus be provided.

The people of Portland have already evidenced their ambition to rid the city of its unsightly waterfront. An appropriation of half a million dollars has been authorized. Only an unexplained delay in passing an ordinance providing for the sale of bonds remains in the way of making a beginning toward municipal ownership. While the years pass by in this unexplained delay, waterfront prices advance and bid fair to rise to an unreachable figure. Conditions on the waterfront are becoming as rapidly worse for with private interests and corporations in control not only of the waterfront, but the public streets that project into the river there is no incentive of law or competition to standardize construction methods or to embody any what building principles in any changes that may be made.

Council at its next meeting is expected to adopt the ordinance which provides for and authorizes the issuance and sale of \$500,000 public docks bonds,

since it has been put up clearly, both to mayor and council, that the people's will, as expressed at the ballot box in 1907, cannot safely be disregarded.

PUBLISHERS TALK ONLY ON POLITICS AND PROSPERITY

Roosevelt Stands Better Than Taft Is Opinion—Bryan in a Dilemma—Seattle Spirit Is Present.

(Publishers Press Leased Wire.) New York, April 30.—The two favorite subjects for editors are prosperity and politics. That was demonstrated here this week by the opinion moulders who were in attendance at the convention of the American Newspaper Publishers' association.

During the latter half of the week this city was the editorial center of the United States. Speaking of politics, Colonel Clark Howell of the Atlanta Constitution put it this way: "Scratch a publisher and you will find a political forecaster. Scratch the right publisher if he be also an editor and you will find a political forecaster who will cause you to rise up on your political toes, and who will send a thrill down your political spine and then up again while you wait."

Roosevelt Favorite.

The colonel warmed to his subject and spoke as follows: "If Theodore Roosevelt is not made for president he will split the solid south. He would carry perhaps six of the southern states. The south likes Mr. Taft personally, very much, politically it believes he has lost out. If Mr. Roosevelt were nominated I believe he could carry Georgia for one state."

Victor Roosevelt, accepted proprietor of the Omaha Bee, is a Republican and representative of Nebraska on national committee. Roosevelt sees the political situation in this way:

"Bryan is in a dilemma no matter what happens in the national arena. But nobody in Nebraska knows what is going to happen. We now have not only a direct primary law but the Oregon plan for selection of the United States senators. Mr. Bryan has recently advocated the county option plan for liquor selling. This is the stand taken by the prohibitionist who sees in it an advantage toward complete prohibition. Mr. Bryan also demands that they shall stand by the platform of their party. We must await developments."

Seattle Spirit Again.

W. W. Chapin of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, preferred the prosperity. He said:

"Seattle is the equal in public spirit of any other city in the universe and as for the Puget sound country, I can see nothing but prosperity. Seattle has moved one tenth of the total amount of earth that will have been moved in the Panama canal. In the grading of the city, it has been a big thing to plan, but our people are used to big things and are ready for great projects for the future is assured. There has been no reaction in Seattle. Other cities have felt a business setback following a big national exposition. It was just the reverse with us after the Seattle fair."

Cowles Talks Also.

W. H. Cowles of the Spokane, Spokane-Review also spoke of prosperity.

"The west does not want any disturbances, political or territorial in the far west, and particularly in China," said Mr. Cowles. "Our country is shipping flour to China and the trade is growing bigger every year. It is only a foretaste in our belief, of a tremendous commerce. The western country will watch with jealous eye
