### NEW HEAD WILL NAME MANAGERS FOR TWO LINES

Wickersham May Remain in Charge of United Railways; Manager for Oregon Electric to Be Appointed Shortly.

### HILL ENTHUSIASTIC OVER WILLAMETTE VALLEY SOIL

Says Portland Destined to Become City of Many More Thousands.

John F. Stevens, president of the Oregon Trunk, will for the time being have charge of the Oregon Electric and the United Railways lines. In other words, he will have under control all of the Hill construction work in Oregon. It is expected that Mr. Stevens will soon announce the official appointment of general managers of the two electric lines. Apparently L. B. Wickersham will remain general manager of the United Railways, and the only position, therefore, to be filled will be that of general manager of the Oregon Electric. Guy W. Talbot having resigned to take the management of the Portland Gas company's affairs in this city.

John T. Flynn to Tell People of Portland of Necessity for Popular Control of Their Waterfront.
