

QUAKE SHOCKS IN CALIFORNIA

**Sacramento Valley Is Jarred
About 8:40 but No Damage
Is Reported.**

(United Press Special Wire.)
Sacramento, May 6.—The weather bureau reports a slight earthquake shock here at 8:40 this morning. No damage is reported.

Hanford, Cal., May 6.—A sharp earthquake was felt here this morning at 8:42 o'clock. The duration was from 2 to 4 seconds. The vibrations were southeast to northwest. No damage is reported save for dislodgement of dishes and bric-a-brac.

Fresno, Cal., May 6.—A slight earthquake shock was felt here early today. No damage is reported. The quake rattled dishes and swung chandeliers.

Kern City, Cal., May 6.—A series of earthquake shocks were felt here early today. The first tremor was felt at 8:41 o'clock and was followed by three others at intervals of about 10 seconds. The quakes were light and no damage is reported.

GREAT CROWDS LISTEN TO EVANGELISTS PREACH

SCHEMES OF WALL STREET IN DRAMA

**Audience Not Greatly Enthused
by "His Last Dollar," Play-
ing at Bungalow.**

David Higgins in "His Last Dollar" played to a small house at the Bungalow last night, riding upon the wind of race track popularity, without achieving anything that really savors of that fascinating fever. That the piece and its presentation failed to arouse much enthusiasm was to be expected. A popular priced attraction with Stair & Nicolai as its sponsors belongs elsewhere than in our most exclusive playhouses. At the Bungalow theatre, "His Last Dollar" would be a very excellent bit of dramatic fare.

The piece is five acts of Wall street manipulations with race track trimmings and a weave of southern romance, strongly tinged with "paying the mortgage on the old farm" and "saving the heroine from the villain's clutches" methods and insinuations. There is a hero and a heroine. He has nothing but money and is up to his eyes in Wall street schemes, with a false friend as a pilot. She is penniless with a dying father back in Kentucky, and with one hope of redeeming her fortune, a race horse named Mongrel. There is a villain and a villainess, whose melodramatic thrills threaten to completely envelop the hero, the heroine and Mongrel.

All Kings on Braid.
The plot swings along to the day of the race with the hero's success or failure in Wall street, in fact, the future of the four principals, hanging on the result. Mongrel's jockey is disabled just before the race, the hero takes his place, and wins. The day is saved and much sentiment squandered upon the usual ending. There is a banker father and a well dressed mother, a Hebrew broker, an ingenue and a juvenile, who are dragged in occasionally as escape valves of excitement when the fumes of the plot become too oppressive.

David Higgins is a good actor, and has an easy, drawing manner that commands respect. In the role of Joe Braxton he does a nice bit of legitimate acting. A large and subdued company surrounds him, and with few exceptions presents a diversified array of bad actors. Miss Elise Milford made a charming little ingenue; she is quite unspoiled and her performance free from those irritating affectations synonymous with the word "ingenue." Only a shade less interesting was Harry Wilson, the juvenile. More of these two delightful youngsters would have been welcomed.

OBJECTS TO COST OF PAVEMENT

**Property Owner Objects to Be-
ing Assessed Because Pav-
ing No Good.**

J. N. Davis, a property owner who will have to pay a part of the cost of an asphalt pavement laid on Hawthorne avenue, between East Fifth and East Fifty-fourth streets, objects to being assessed for his share because he doesn't believe the pavement is of much account. He says that a gardener employed by him went out and scooped up some of the pavement with a common hoe, the surface having been rendered soft and crumbling by reason of the frost last winter.

In a written protest which he presented yesterday to the street committee of the city executive board, Mr. Davis set forth a number of other reasons why the pavement should not be accepted in its present condition. City Engineer Morris stated to the committee that the pavement is a good one, in spite of the remonstrance. The pavement was laid by the Barber Asphalt company, which has, if the remonstrances of property owners are well founded, put in a number of inferior pavements. A petition from the laborers of the city engineering department for an increase of wages from \$2.50 a day to \$75 a month straight time, was not granted by the committee.

CALIFORNIA PANAMA BOOSTERS AT CAPITAL
