

CHIEF FORESTER GRAVES MAKING INSPECTION TOUR

Successor to Gifford Pinchot Arrives in Portland; Asserts His Policies to Be Those of His Predecessor.

Henry Selon Graves, chief of the United States forestry service, arrived in Portland this morning on an official tour of inspection. He intends remaining several days and will make a number of side trips into the district which is known as No. 8, and in charge of Forester C. S. Chapman.

President Hart appointed Mr. Graves successor to Chief Forester Pinchot in the midst of the Pinchot-Ballinger controversy a few months ago and Mr. Graves is thoroughly in sympathy with the policies of the former chief.

"The policies of Mr. Pinchot are being carried out in every respect," said Mr. Graves this morning, "and there is no intention to deviate therefrom excepting in cases where readjustments have become necessary as they would in any other line of endeavor as time progresses."

"My trip to the coast this time is strictly administrative," said Mr. Graves. "I intend to visit the headquarters in the various districts to meet the forces and to go over the various administrative questions that require attention in the regular routine work. This is the time of year when we make our plans for the fiscal year and look up and investigate how much of an appropriation will be necessary for carrying out the administrative problems that will come up during the year."

"My policies are identical with those of Mr. Pinchot and whatever changes have been made and might be made will not in any way affect these policies."

"The work of the forestry service is increasing every year and gains in importance in a corresponding degree. Our whole organization is being perfected from year to year."

"I have visited a number of our districts and have been very much pleased with the organization and the personnel, and the people in general have given us their hearty cooperation. Section 8, comprising Oregon, Washington and Alaska, and of which Portland is the headquarters, is a very important district."

Policy Is Conservation.

"The policy of the service is to preserve the timber, dispose of the mature timber and restore the forests in a way that the future requirements will be provided for as well as present."

"About 2500 people are employed in the forestry service, the greater number of them in the field. Last year the timber sales amounted to something over \$1,000,000 and more than another million was derived from grazing privileges. But this is not the most important work of the service. The forestry service has not only the administration of the national forests, it also has in charge the development of the forest interests all over the country. The promotion of practical development of forestry and cooperation with lumbermen and timber owners in state forestry work, forms an important part of the work, and we are carrying on extensive investigations which will form ground work for practice in the study of the growth of our forest. The service also studies methods for the protection, methods of reforestation, the uses of woods and many other subjects of similar character."

Services Established.

"The service has a good many nurseries and one is now being opened at Wind River on the Upper Columbia and which I intend to inspect this trip. There will endeavor to ascertain the best and least expensive method of reforesting denuded lands in the mountains of this district. The experiments will not only be of profit to the service, they will also serve as object lessons to private owners who desire to replenish tracts that might have been cut over or swept by fires."

After acquainting himself with the local work, Mr. Graves' inspection tour will probably be made. Forester Chapman returned from a trip into the Olympic reserve this morning.

PORTLANDERS TAKE OVER HOOD SYSTEMS

Hood River, Ore., May 6.—The Hood River Electric Light & Power Co. today transferred its light and water systems to the Hood River Light & Power Co. of Portland, of which J. D. Wilcox is president. Robert Smith, vice president, and Wirt Minor, secretary. The plant sold for \$112,000. The new company took charge today, and will at once proceed with the betterment of the water system and the building of an electric line through the valley.

The transfer of the electric and power plant at Hood River to the new company organized by Portlanders was forecasted about a week ago by The Journal, when the plans were outlined. Robert Smith, vice president, is of the Stanley-Smith Lumber company, which operates a large sawmill back of Hood River. The new company has ample power to operate an electric line into the fruit district and into the timber back of Hood River, and has also options on other tracts of land splendidly located for the building of additional power stations.

The projected electric line will open a vast district, which is said to be excellently adapted for fruit culture. The line will also prove of great value to the lumber manufacturing industry in the Hood River valley.

EX-POSTMASTER IS LODGED IN JAIL

Arrested at Dallas, Or., while at dinner with his family, William Hobson, former postmaster at Riparia, Wash., charged with embezzlement, was brought to Portland yesterday by United States officers and lodged in jail. He is accused of failing to account for about \$1000 after resigning from office. He made statements to the officers during the night. Charles T. Rieghel, assistant to the postmaster when he (Hobson) succeeded, for the charges, which he said were without foundation.

MEN WALK OUT ON CONTRACTORS

Union Carpenters Stop Work for McHolland Bros. Alleging Unfairness.

Union carpenters of the city have decided that it is impossible to make McHolland Bros. contractors, abide by union principles and yesterday all of the union men and some of the non-union workers, employed on the new Arlington club building, on a residence being built at West Park and Mill streets and on the new auditorium at the Oaks walked out. In all 48 men packed up their tools and left the jobs, trying up the work at the Oaks, leaving three men at the Arlington club building and stopping work on the residence.

The carpenters charge that McHolland Bros. are hostile to organized labor, that they are not employing union men and that they violated their contract at the Oaks by employing one non-union man and paying him less than the union scale.

Stop Work on Club Building.

The carpenters employed on the Arlington club building were the first to walk out, stopping their work at 8 o'clock yesterday morning. Twenty-one

men had been employed on the building, of which three were non-union men. On such time as the Auditorium can be completed, if it is not ready for the opening day.

J., May 6.—At a special meeting here today the stockholders of the Lake Superior Corporation voted favorably on the proposal to issue securities of the Alabama Central railroad company, a subsidiary of the Lake Superior Corporation, to the amount of about \$5,500,000, to finance the completion of the railroad to a connection with the main line of the Canadian Pacific. It is planned to complete the Alabama Central railroad from Hault, Ste. Marie to Josephine Junction and thence to Hobson, where it will connect with the Canadian Pacific. The extension will make available proved ore deposits and put the corporation in an independent position. The building of the road will also confirm the corporation's right to valuable land grants.
