Cooking School at Christensen's Hall.—Miss Tracy will give her first lesson Thursday, May 12. Miss Tracy's cooking school, which will be conducted under the auspices of the Portland Gas & Coke company, will open next Thursday afternoon at Christensen's Hall, Yamhill and Eleventh. The Gas company has for several months been promoting their patrons to open a cooking school, but Mr. M. Baber has been waiting until he could offer the best, not simply a demonstration of gas stoves, but an educational institution, where all branches of cooking will be taught. Miss Tracy has a reputation here as in other large cities, of being an expert, a teacher of ability and practical in her demonstrations, so the ladies may expect not only new recipes, but simplified methods acquired by experience and study.

Colonel Duncan Here.—Colonel and Mrs. Walter Duncan, commanders for the Pacific coast and northwestern regiment, with headquarters in San Francisco, are in Portland to inspect the local city. Rev. Matthews, the pastor of the church, is making an energetic campaign among his own people as well as among the whites. He says the colored people will stand by in full force, and will sing, pray and pay to their full limit. Let all who are in sympathy with the struggling home mission work come.

Effect of Notices.—An owner may post notices upon his property stating that he will not be responsible for work done there unless authorized by himself and it will hold, but such notices upon buildings have no effect, according to a decision handed down yesterday by Judge Morrow in the case of Fuller & Co. against McLaughlin. The decision makes the mechanics' lien law operative where work was done by the owner but by some other person is done on buildings. The wording of the statute permitting the posting of notices is obscure, said Judge Morrow, and does not expressly permit the posting of notices of this sort on buildings.

Excavating Machine Baked.—East Salmon street, between Thirteenth and Fourteenth, was practically blocked last night by a large excavating machine belonging to Paquet, Giesbach & Joplin that was stalled against the curb when the operator tried to guide it past some building material on the opposite side of the street. In trying to extricate the 4000 ton machine the driving wheels worked themselves so deep into the pavement that it required considerable digging this morning to get the machine out. In excavating over to the one side of the street, the machine plowed a deep furrow in the pavement for a distance nearly half a block.

Hinson Succeeds Brougher.—The White Temple had a new pastor, permanently engaged to succeed Dr. J. Whitcomb Brougher. Dr. W. B. Hinson, of San Diego, at a meeting of the congregation held last night, formally accepted the call of the church and was given an unanimous rising vote of support by the members of the congregation. Dr. Hinson came to Portland May 1, to consider accepting the call which had been sent to him some time before. He has found conditions satisfactory and made his definite announcement last night. His salary is to be \$8000 a year.

Look for Stolen Cow.—The family cow of Mrs. C. E. Cradin, 941 Emerson street, was stolen early yesterday morning from a vacant lot near her home. A horseman was seen to be on the lot a few minutes before. He is believed to have stolen the animal.

Death of Mrs. Tobey.—At Riverside, Cal., on Wednesday, April 27, occurred the death of Mrs. William Tobey. Her illness, pneumonia, was of a few days' duration. She had many friends in Portland and eastern Oregon. Mr. and Mrs. Tobey lived for 11 years in Olney, Or., and for the past two years had resided in Portland at 255 Fargo street. Two months ago they went to Riverside, Cal., where Mr. Tobey had purchased an orange grove. Beside her husband and two young daughters, Milla and Wilma, Mrs. Tobey leaves a mother, Mrs. J. C. Hildreth, and sister, Mrs. Alice Blakely, both of Carthage, Mo., and another sister, Mrs. Irvin Johnson, of Detroit, Mich. The remains were laid away in the cemetery at Riverside.

Seek Damages for Burns.—The case of Frank De Brun against the Portland Railway, Light & Power company is being tried before Judge Getens in the circuit court today. De Brun alleges that he was attempting to alight from a car at Williams avenue and Crosby street on the night of December 23, 1909, when the car was suddenly and violently started, throwing him on his head. For the injury done his spine and head he prays for damages in the sum of \$1800. The case will probably be concluded tomorrow.

Poor Farm Sale Concluded.—The check of B. M. Lombard for \$10,000 was accepted today by County Clerk Fields as part payment for the county poor farm. The balance of \$119,539 is in notes payable in two, three and four years, and of \$25,000, \$25,000 and \$19,500, respectively. Five thousand dollars of the total purchase price of \$154,539 was paid a year ago, since which time litigation has prevented the completion of the sale. The county officials consider the transaction as extremely profitable for the county.
