

ASKS FOR LAW TO PROTECT JEWELRY STORE CUSTOMERS

Jewelers of State at Meeting Hear E. J. Jaeger of Portland Plead for Legislation Needed to Safeguard Their Business

In the shadow of the slogan, "The National Convention for Portland in 1911," the Oregon Retail Jewelers' association met yesterday afternoon. Nearly 150 of the jewelers of the state were present when the session commenced, and President F. M. French announced that it was the largest attendance recorded since the association was first organized. The address of the afternoon were remarkable for their fire and earnestness. Particularly pertinent were the comments of E. J. Jaeger of Portland, on legislation. Mr. Jaeger said in part: "There is nothing at the present time that the country is more in need of than proper legislation, not only city and national, but legislation among ourselves. The jewelry business today is sorely in need of legislation; that kind that will place behind the counter upon their honor, and instead of the general public looking upon the jeweler's profession with suspicion, imagining that they are being hoaxed, it will realize it is getting value received. A state, when a piece of jewelry marked 10 or 14 karat, is picked up, there will be no question about it being so, and when a jeweler sells a diamond as perfect, it should be exactly as represented and any deviation therefrom would be punishable by law."

Want Stringent Laws.
"If we had stringent laws regarding misrepresentation people would have no hesitancy in sending their 10-year-old child to a jewelry store to purchase a diamond or any other valuable piece of jewelry, knowing that they would receive full value, and the old story of having taken a watch to a watchmaker and having all the jewels stolen would be a thing of the past."

"Business men should consider it their duty to become more acquainted with legislative matters pertaining to their city and state instead of leaving it to the professional politicians, who, as a rule, have very little idea of the value of the city affairs as they follow it simply as a profession."

"Visit our courts, and see the professional jurors who hang around waiting for a job. These conditions are caused by the simple reason that the business man is willing to let them serve for he is always ready with the old excuse of being too busy to serve on juries. Our council and city officials should be composed of business men who would conduct the city affairs as they would their own business, thereby eliminating the cheap politician and ward heelers who have no interest, save greed, at stake."

Big Salaries Suggested.
"I believe our councilmen should receive salaries large enough to make it worth their while and compensate them for the time it requires. What kind of service can you expect to get for \$25 a month, the salary our present councilmen are receiving? A state of Portland could well afford to pay councilmen \$5000, thereby securing men of the highest ability who are capable of conducting city affairs as they should be, honestly and economically."

When C. H. Williams, of Condon, affirmed with enthusiasm that organization is power and jewelers of the nation must then be organized for protection both to themselves and their patrons.

STUDENT BODY HOLDS ELECTION

Spirited Contest Held at U. of O. and 461 Votes Cast—Best Man Wins.

University of Oregon, Eugene, May 11.—The varsity yesterday held its annual student body election. The polls were open from 10 to 2 and the voting was conducted in regular Australian ballot form.

In all 461 votes were cast. This was a much heavier vote than last year, due no doubt to the keen rivalry among the candidates. The campus has been a hotbed of politics for the last week and electioneering has been rife. During the afternoon, counting bulletins were issued at intervals to an interested crowd. At 5:15 the complete returns were announced as follows: Percy M. Collier of Eugene won out over two rivals for the presidency of the student body. Collier is a prominent debater and led this year's varsity team. He is also prominent in literary and Y. M. C. A. work. The contest for this office between the three was extremely hard fought. Verner Gillis, last year's varsity football guard, secured the vice presidency.

Miss Edith Woodcock of Portland, after an exciting race, captured the secretaryship. This position always goes to the women.

Of a field of five Raphael Gieseler of Portland and Phillip Brownell of Gardiner were elected to the executive committee.

Three of Oregon's best athletes were put on the athletic council which has control of varsity athletics. There were six candidates and the result was close. Charles Taylor of Vancouver, captain-elect of the football team, Martin Hawkins of Portland, the sprinter, and Ferdinand Henkle also of Portland, Oregon's famous southpaw, were the lucky ones.

Ralph Moores of Salem was elected editor in chief of the "Emerald," the college semi-weekly publication. C. A. Osterholm was chosen manager of the same paper and Phillip Hammond, the latter's assistant.

Dean Collins, an experienced newspaper man, was elected editor of the Oregon monthly, the literary publication. Ted Williams and Lee Hargens were chosen as manager and assistant respectively of the same paper.

Of seven candidates four were chosen as assistant editors of the monthly. They were: Birdie Wise of Astoria, Alma Payton of Eugene, Lucile Abrams of Eugene, Willetta Wright of Albany.

The newly elected officers will enter on their official duties with the new school year next September.

A sightseeing trip over the city in an observation car occupied this morning. The important feature of the afternoon session will be the election of officers. It was freely predicted yesterday that F. M. French of Albany would be re-elected as president and C. H. Williams of Condon, as secretary. It is also thought probable that Mr. Williams will be elected representative to the national convention, and authorized to invite the jewelers of the nation to meet in Portland next year.

The members of the association will be the guests of the wholesale jewelers at a banquet to be given in the Commercial club this evening. ROOSEVELT DISOBEYS DOCTOR AND GOES TO MANEUVERS

Doerbert. A slim battle concluded the maneuvers.

During the afternoon Roosevelt motored about the city, taking in the principal points of interest. When he returned he ordered another treatment for his throat. Professor Frankel expressed the opinion that Roosevelt would be unable to deliver tomorrow's address, so thinks the colonel will not be able to speak above a whisper.

Tonight Chancellor Von Bethmann will give a dinner in honor of the Roosevelt. It was intended to take the place of the state dinner planned by the Kaiser before the death of King Edward.

Although the British embassy sanctioned the Kaiser's attendance at the maneuvers today, saying it did not reflect on the genuineness of the Kaiser's grief, the wisdom of the action is generally doubted here. The chancellor was among those who objected before the trip to Doerbert, but Kaiser Wilhelm refused to listen to the chancellor's advice.

Trust Buster Frank B. Kellogg arrived here today and will have a conference with Roosevelt. It is thought the conference will be one of the most significant of any of the meetings the ex-president has had with his old political friends while in Europe.

latest proposition of the railroad company to Mayor Simon and the committee from the council had not formally been designated as final, it nevertheless contained an enumeration of all the concessions which the railroad expects to give the city.

Proposition Unsatisfactory.

It is known positively that the proposition last made by the O. R. & N. company to the city is as little satisfactory as was the first which the people promptly condemned when it was made public. When Mayor Simon said this morning, "Between now and the next session of council we will have some definite statements to make concerning an immediate policy of procedure," the statement was easily construed to mean that the mayor expects to waste but little more time in continuing the negotiations with the railroad, when the city's power of condemnation can apparently be more quickly and economically exercised.

Mayor Simon added: "Any announcement of plans at this time would be premature. We are not the less determined, however, to acquire the right-of-way for the Broadway bridge as speedily as possible."

Forbes, who is a licensed balloon pilot, has had wide experience in aeronautics. He has sailed in a number of national balloon races. He was considered one of the most expert manipulators of balloons in the United States. He has already traversed the country in which the accident occurred yesterday. He has had a number of narrow escapes in the past, but never a serious accident.

Friday Harbor Goes Dry.

Friday Harbor, Wash., May 11.—Friday Harbor voted "dry" in yesterday's local option election, 37 to 36. This will mean the closing of three saloons, each of which pays \$100 license.

The "dry" credit their victory to Rev. Billy Sunday, who came from Bellingham with a party of 50 in a specially chartered steamer Monday to combat the liquor men. When Sunday arrived the saloon men closed their bars and embarked for a neighboring island on a picnic. The saloons here are the only ones in San Juan county. Their licenses expire June 1.

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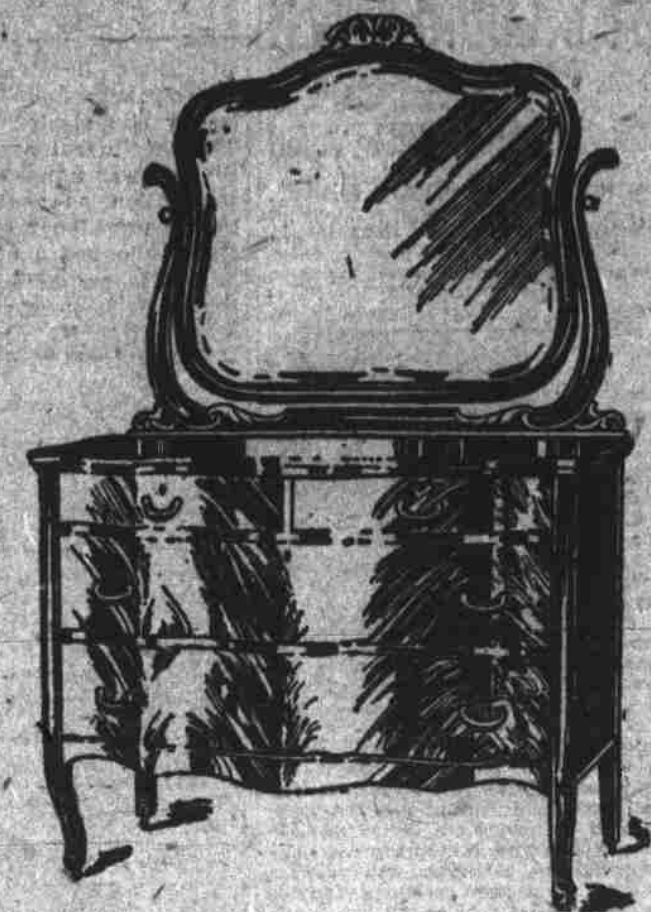
