

VETO WILL MEAN UNITED PROTEST

Universal Voice of Disapproval
Sure to Follow Mayor's Veto
of Dock Ordinance.

Statements which Mayor Simon will make to a committee from the Chamber of Commerce and the Taxpayers' League will determine whether or not it will be necessary to call a mass meeting of protest, should the mayor veto the public docks ordinance.

Mayor Simon has never made it clear whether or not he is opposed to the principle of public control of the waterfront. He has stated that the principal reason for his disapproval of the ordinance authorizing the sale of \$500,000 public-dock bonds was because of the smallness of the amount.

Friends of the plan to establish public docks are convinced that Mayor Simon is not fully informed as to the necessity for the system. They mention that when it was proposed to improve the park system it was necessary to take Mayor Simon to another city in order that he might be shown the practical benefit of modern improvement.

The representatives of the commercial interests will urge upon Mayor Simon that if he vetoes the ordinance passed by the council Wednesday he will be going counter to the will of the voters, and will place Portland in the ranks of non-progressive seaboard cities which fail to provide for the greatly increased traffic that will follow the opening of the Panama canal.
