

STATE GRANGE ON RECORD FOR TRUNK HIGHWAYS

To Connect All County Seats,
Counties to Bond, Build and
Maintain—To Coordinate
With Electric Lines.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Oregon City, May 12.—The Oregon State Grange has gone on record as favoring a system of trunk roads between the principal cities of the state, the expense to be met by the issuance of bonds by each county through which the road passes. A discussion extending over two hours this morning covered every phase of the good roads question in Oregon and a ringing resolution was passed endorsing the plan of county supervision and county payment. The grange has carefully considered electric railways as means of transportation in some parts of the state and has plans made for public highways to connect with them, the object being to in no case parallel the electric lines with improved public roads.

There is strong indication that the effort to form an alliance between the grange and the labor unions of the state has been abandoned. A resolution has been passed practically opposing any close alliance with organized labor and the sentiment of the grange is strongly opposed to single tax and the short hours of labor advocated by the labor unions. There is a strong effort being made to impress upon the farmers of the state that the interests of organized labor in the cities and of the farmers are largely opposed to each other.

The morning session was given up practically entirely to routine matters and the action on good roads, and the afternoon session will be devoted to the adoption of resolutions from the legislative committee. Indications are now that the grange will not be able to adjourn before midnight, or later.

COMMITTEE REPORTS ABSORB ATTENTION OF DELEGATES TODAY

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Oregon City, May 12.—After being in session two days the state grange took up hard work for the first time this morning. The sessions opened at 8:30 despite the fact that the secret work last night kept the session until near midnight. At the opening the courtroom was well filled, and the early cars from Portland brought a score of delegates and visitors.

Reports of the legislative and executive committees are being received today. The legislative committee is the important body of the grange, and its consideration of any matter is usually the consideration of the entire body. This committee has given serious consideration for two days on resolutions opposing the assembly, favoring state prohibition, new tax laws and the rehabilitation of at least one normal school. The report of the committee is being considered by the grange today, item by item.

In matters of internal business the executive committee is the power of the grange as a body. The work of this committee has to do with organization, finances, meetings and public gatherings in which the grange has part. The report of the executive committee is lengthy and will require a great deal of the time of the body in its careful consideration.

The constitution has been amended by fixing new salary appropriations. Hereafter the state master will receive \$200 a year; secretary, \$400; lecturer, \$200; treasurer, \$25; other officers and

delegates, \$1 per day and traveling expenses.

Oregon City, May 12.—One of the most interesting features of this meeting of the State Grange was the address of A. T. Buxton, who has just concluded his second term as master. Mr. Buxton dwelt at length upon the condition of the order throughout the state, declaring that it should stand in the rural community for all that the commercial club stands for in the urban community—better civic life, improved social environments, industrial development, higher standards and a healthy interest in all matters pertaining to the farmers' political welfare. The speaker deprecated the wholesale admission to the grange of men whose interests are not primarily identified with agriculture.

Advantages of Road Bill.
In discussing needed legislation Mr. Buxton dwelt at length on the subjects of good roads, taxation and the proposed constitutional convention. He said in part:

"Under the resolution adopted at the last session of the State Grange, the subordinate granges have during the past, been devoting some time to the study of the Johnson road bill, embodying the combination of state, county and local effort in road improvement. Without desiring to be understood as particularly favoring this measure, I feel that it is far preferable to the idea of county bonding, which is being widely advocated, for the following reasons:

"First—It provides for the distribution of the cost in a manner that seems most equitable and just to all concerned.

"Second—It will usually insure better supervision and greater uniformity in the construction and improvement of roads.

"Third—It provides for the improvement of more restricted areas at one undertaking, thus giving less opportunity and less temptation for the misuse of funds than where a larger amount is raised by a bond issue covering the whole county.

"Fourth—The local initiative provided for in the Johnson bill, will insure greater local interest not only in the improvement itself but also in seeing that the money is wisely expended.

"Fifth—This same local initiative will go far toward insuring the improvement of the most essential roads first—that is, those needed for market purposes.

"Sixth—Under the county bonding system those interests which have been the chief factors in pushing the good roads campaign—the manufacturers of road building machinery and the automobile clubs—would at once bring all the pressure possible to bear on the various county courts to induce them to construct a connected line of highly improved, expensive automobile roads running through the state from north to south and, as far as possible, from east to west. These roads would be built at the expense of the whole county and with many important sections of the county necessarily neglected.

**HEINZE ACQUITTED;
REJOICING AT BUTTE**

New York, May 12.—Frederick Augustus Heinze was acquitted last night of charges of misappropriation of the funds of the Mercantile National bank, when he was president of the institution in 1907. He was also cleared of the charge of over-certification of checks of his brother's firm, Otto Heinze & Co. Heinze issued this statement last night:

"I have been ready for trial every day since the first indictment was returned two years and a half ago. This delay has cost me between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000. The ruination of my credit seems to have been the object most viciously aimed at.

"However, I still have some of the best copper properties in the world, and I intend to devote my whole attention to them."

Butte, Mont., May 12.—Frederick Augustus Heinze's acquittal in New York yesterday was made the occasion for a great celebration by friends of Heinze here last night, when a large crowd headed by a band paraded the streets and sang songs in praise of Federal Judge Hough of New York and in derision of District Attorney Wise, who prosecuted Heinze. Wise was hanged in effigy and his figure was then burned in an immense bonfire in the center of the city. Fireworks were set off, amid constant hurrahing. A great homecoming celebration is being planned for Heinze.

New York, May 12.—Prosecutor Wise announced today that the cases against F. Augustus Heinze, acquitted last night on charges of having violated federal banking laws, had not yet been ended.

Wise declared that he intended to prosecute F. Augustus Heinze and Otto Heinze as well as Sanford Robinson and Carlos Winterfield on charge of having spirited away the books of the United Copper company.

LONG ISLAND GETS 1910 AVIATION MEET

New York, May 12.—The international aviation meet of 1910 will be held on Long Island, according to an announcement by the board of directors of the Aero Club of America. The site has not been determined, but in all probability it will be either Hempstead Plains or Belmont Park.

It is announced that satisfactory arrangements with the Wright brothers have been made for the use of their patents during the exhibition. The Dayton aviators demanded \$25,000 for the privilege and 4 per cent of the gate receipts.

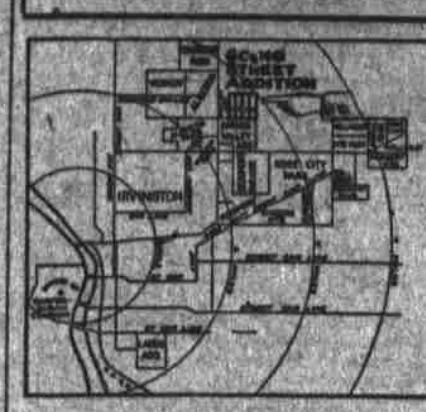
