

KILLS STRANGER BY MISTAKE FOR WIFE

R. M. Faulkner of Seattle Stabs William Harlin in Victim's Own House.

Seattle, May 13.—R. M. Faulkner, who it is alleged kidnapped his little girl from her mother and hid her away in Spokane in February, and since that time has been in and out of the courts of King county in constant trouble with his wife, is in jail today, facing a charge of murder in the first degree. Within 15 hours after he had told a judge yesterday that he intended to leave his wife alone and was released from the county jail, he had plunged a knife into the heart of William Harlin, a total stranger, under the impression that he was killing his wife. Harlin died a few minutes later.

At the same time Faulkner severely wounded William Lewis, a roomer at the Harlin home.

Following the discovery of the kidnapped child in Spokane, the baby and Faulkner were returned here. Mrs. Faulkner brought suit for divorce, and her husband, enraged, is alleged to have threatened to kill her. He was re-arrested and for the past two months has been in the county jail, unable to furnish a \$1000 peace bond.

Faulkner was released from jail at 1:15 yesterday afternoon, under his promise to behave. The killing occurred at 10:15 last night. For some time Mrs. Faulkner has been living in a house in the rear of the Harlin home, and the police suppose that by accident Faulkner entered the wrong house.

Knocking at the Harlin door, he brushed past Mrs. Harlin, who answered the knock, and dashed into a bedroom where her husband had just retired. As Harlin rose Faulkner drew a large pocket knife and plunged it into his victim. The one blow was sufficient and Harlin fell dying.

Hearing the scuffle, William Lewis, the roomer, ran out and grappled with Faulkner. The fight through the hall, down the steps and finally into the street, where Lewis got Faulkner down. Faulkner got one arm free, however, and stabbed Lewis over the right eye. Lewis fell back and Faulkner ran.

He was found an hour later, his hat, coat and shirt gone and the remainder of his clothes spattered with blood, and was arrested.

WILL CONTEST FOR \$1,000,000 IS ENDED

Oakland, Cal., May 13.—Mrs. Joseph Boardman and her young daughter are today in possession of the \$1,000,000 estate left by her husband, who died seven years ago. Since then the question of division has been in the courts. The will contest was settled by Judge Wells' decision in favor of the widow and her child, dividing the estate evenly between them.

Boardman left four wills, giving his fortune to Oakland charities. He had been declared mentally incompetent before his death and the wills were denied probate.

The estate was appraised at \$226,000, but the advance in real estate has since increased this to more than a million. The will contest has been before the courts several years.

FOR M'FARLAND FIFTY YEARS AT SAN QUENTIN

Martinez, Cal., May 13.—James McFarland, convicted of the murder of Frank Garcia at Livermore and sentenced to serve 50 years in the penitentiary at San Quentin, was taken to the prison today.

After the murder McFarland fled to San Jose, where he posed as a detective. He was arrested and returned to Contra Costa county. Later he developed symptoms of insanity and was placed in a hospital for the insane at Stockton. Two weeks ago he was brought here and was sentenced by Judge Latimer.

Mejia of Oakland, and Mrs. Cordelia G. De Moran of San Francisco. Mrs. Mejia, who is well known in San Francisco society, will sail tomorrow for Santa Tecla.

PASSENGER TRAINS DELAYED FOR HOURS

According to information received in the office of the superintendent of the Southern Pacific this morning, train No. 16, due to arrive here at 7:20 this morning, will come in 7 hours and 35 minutes late. No. 14, due to arrive here at 11 o'clock this morning, is reported 9 hours and 40 minutes late.
The trains were delayed in the Shasta division by a wreck, but as it occurred outside of the Oregon division no official reports were received by the superintendent here. It is supposed that it was a freight train that left the rails.

100 Students Take Examination. Baker City, May 13.—Final examinations for students of the eighth grade

are being held in all districts in the county today, and about 100 young people are taking the examinations. When the papers have been completed they will be sent to this city, where they will be graded by four teachers selected by County Superintendent Smith. The four persons to do the grading are: Misses Lulu Gages, Jennie Canning and Nevada Dyke of Baker City, and Professor Linden McCullough of Newbridge. According to reports from the teachers very few will fail.
