ROOSEVELT STUDIES NEEDS OF POOR

Berlin, May 13.—That Theodore Roosevelt intends to apply himself to the study of social conditions when he returns to the United States was indicated today when he substituted visits to model tenement houses for the poor, old people's homes and insane asylums, for other features that had been on his program. He inspected each place closely, making copious notes. He has gathered statistics regarding such institutions and has announced his intention of making similar studies in England.

His voice today is considerably improved, and he has suffered no great inconvenience, following his lecture yesterday.

The German people are surprised and delighted at the democratic attitude of both the Kaiser and Roosevelt. The genuine friendliness of their companionship, in which formality and tradition have been cast to the winds, has created favorable comment among all classes. Some persons are wondering what might have happened in the way of precedent smashing if the Kaiser had not been restrained by the decorum imposed by his mourning for the death of his uncle, King Edward of England.

LOST BABY WITHOUT FOOD FOR 39 HOURS FOUND NEARLY DEAD

A. E. T. Buckell, who lives next door to Mrs. Wood, had been found. He had learned it from a telephone message sent by friends at the Oregon Electric depot. She dropped to the floor in a dead faint.

Suspected Gypsies.

Mr. Wood was not at home. Early this morning he started back to where the gypsies were camping near Fulton. He had expressed it as his belief that the gypsies had stolen the baby, who was left unguarded by the mother, who walked a short distance to attend a real estate auction at Kusa. He was determined to find out if they had kidnapped the child.

"We were eating breakfast this morning," said Mrs. Sampson, "when my husband and I both heard the child's cries. I at once said, 'That is the lost baby.' My husband ran down to the little creek and found him lying in the water, his little face half covered and his mouth open. I believe the baby had wandered so long and had become so thirsty that he was trying to drink the water from the pool into which he had fallen."

"When my husband picked Kenneth up his body became rigid. He thought he was dead. As for me, I had been under such a strain helping in the search that I broke down and cried like a baby when my husband brought the little body into the kitchen. I never expected to be able to get him back to his mother alive."

Given Warm Milk.

Mrs. Simpson bravely undertook to return the child to his mother, unaided. Her husband could not leave his work. All along the way she was helped by persons who had read in the papers of the baby's strange disappearance.

At the depot warm milk was brought to feed the baby. In the morning, clamped close in Mrs. Simpson's arms, his body had become much warmer. At first he could not be persuaded to take any nourishment; then, as the milk was introduced into his mouth with a spoon, he suddenly became very much alive, insisting first upon feeding himself, and then grasped the glass in both hands and drank as long as he was allowed.

Dr. Buckell found that Kenneth's temperature was at 96, although his cheeks were flushed and his forehead hot. He thought, however, that here would be no danger of pneumonia, and that the baby would recover from his experience with few serious consequences.

MOTHER SHOWS SLIGHT INTEREST IN RECOVERY OF HER LOST CHILD

That Mrs. Tracey A. Wood took her child to Kusa station Thursday afternoon with the deliberate intention of losing him is the belief of J. B. Lee, of Portland, who conducted the real estate auction which Mrs. Wood attended. Mr. Lee and others related this morning suspicious circumstances as reasons for their belief that Mrs. Wood's intentions were criminal and that if any one loved her it was for the purpose of helping her to carry out her intentions.

Mr. Lee said: "I don't feel sorry for the woman, but I do feel sorry for the people who attended that sale. Some of those women—yes, and some of the men—haven't slept since. I don't know when I have grieved so much about anything. The vision of that poor child, unloved and unwanted, being left alone to wander and starve until it died, has almost unnerved me. Mind you, I don't say that the intention was for it to die, but everything makes it look as though she intended to leave it. I saw the woman getting on the car at the Oregon Electric depot Thursday, and I noticed that she was paying but little attention to him," said Mr. Lee.

Wanted to Leave Baby.

"When she reached Kusa she wanted to leave the child at the depot, but some one prevented her from doing so. Then she left the child under a tree a good ways from where the people were. I would give \$50 to know for certain that Mrs. Wood was in that crowd, but I can't believe that she was. I saw a woman there whom I took to be the baby's mother, but it afterward proved to be another. There were only 23 people there altogether, and I do not see how I could have missed seeing her if she had been there."

"I'd like to believe that she really fainted when told that her baby was gone, but there was something that seemed phony about that. I know that soon afterward she was laughing and talking. Some one said: 'Why don't you telephone your husband?' and she answered mockingly: 'Why, do you think I walk four blocks to telephone him?'"

Mother Indifferent.

"Why, if my wife had been told that one of our boys was missing, she would have been a corpse by this time. She would have worried herself to death. And there is another thing that puzzles me. How is it that the child is reported when found this morning as not being in a serious condition? Remember, it is but a baby, and if it had wandered around in the cold, exposed to the cold of two nights, and scratched by undergrowth, it seems to me it would have been almost dead. I don't believe that baby was wandering in the cold all that time. The people of the neighborhood and many who attended the sale would certainly have found it had it been there."

One of the searchers stated this morning that Mrs. Wood sat on a stump yesterday chewing gum, while her husband anxiously looked for the baby. Instead of asking whether he had found any trace when her husband returned, Mrs. Wood is reported as saying pettishly: 'Didn't you bring me anything to eat?'

Showed No Emotion.

Although Mrs. Wood was notified that her child had been found as soon as Mrs. Simpson reached the city this morning, she had apparently made no effort to make arrangements for the care of the baby. When The Journal's automobile drew up the house seemed empty. The door was locked. Mrs. Wood took several minutes to answer the ring at the doorbell. She was leisurely arranging her hair when she appeared and had made no effort to improve her rather disheveled appearance. She betrayed absolutely no emotion when she saw the child. Mrs. Sampson, who had held the baby in her arms all the way to Portland and during the trip to the Wood home, warning him with her body, and jealously guarding him from curious people, said:

"If my child had been lost for three days, I would be anxiously brought home. I would be beside myself with joy. My eyes, I am sure, would not have been dry as hers were."
