

DROPS CASE TO PROTECT OTHERS

Woman Feared Certain Names Would Come Out if Assault Charge Pressed.

The charge of assault with intent to kill against S. C. Wing, a carpenter employed by A. J. Griffith, was dismissed yesterday afternoon in the justice court. No representative of the district attorney's office was present when the case was dismissed.

Mary Andrews, 325 Sixth street, caused his arrest, and charged he attempted to take her life. When Wing was arrested he declared the names of several people would be brought out in court who had been living questionable lives, and had conspired to place him in jail.

Mary Andrews said she would rather dismiss the case than have the names of other people mentioned. She refused to appear in the afternoon. Constable Lou Wagner arrested the man, and is now looking into the connection the other people had with his arrest.

Opened Store.

After securing the money, Charles and his wife opened a little store in Honolulu, combining the cream, hardware and notions in the general plan. The venture did not prove a very successful one, and Miss Elmer began to grow suspicious. She consulted friends, and at last gave the collection of the \$1000 over into the hands of a well known man in Honolulu, who began to make various attempts to collect the money due.

Charles, so Miss Elmer says, then came to her again and told her a story about the expected uprising of the Japanese in the islands, and so worked upon her fears that she consented to leave Honolulu, feeling that she should not desert those who had warned her of the threatened uprising. Miss Elmer gave Charles a second \$1000 to pay her agent and thus seemingly straighten up the obligation between herself and Charles.

She did this, Miss Elmer says, because she feared that her agent would not allow Charles to leave the island without the debt having been paid. In accordance with this arrangement.

Charles took the second \$1000 and paid it to the agent.

Tease Signed Note.

Mrs. Charles tore up the note which Charles had signed, saying that she took upon herself the payment of the debt, thus leaving Miss Elmer without evidence of the debt.

In spite of this transaction Miss Elmer gave Charles money to buy tickets for herself and the Charles family from Honolulu to Victoria, B. C., and thence to Portland. Altogether she gave them an additional \$300, thus making the total amount she had advanced \$1300.

Following the departure of Charles it was found that he had left many debts in Honolulu and the papers of that city printed the story of his operations there, including the strange loan, and subsequent still more strange payment of the \$1000.

Since coming to Portland Miss Elmer has made repeated attempts to secure the payment of the sums advanced, either in a lump sum or in partial payment, but having been unsuccessful she is now seeking some legal remedy by which she may recover the amount she says is due her.

Honolulu papers of January 13 and 14, 1907, gave a detailed story of the transactions which are the basis for the suit now filed by Miss Elmer and give the additional information that Charles left a note pinned to the door of his store, saying that he had gone to lunch but would return in a few moments. Instead of returning he stowed away on the steamship Moana and staid concealed until the ship was away from the harbor. He left many debts in Honolulu, according to the papers of that city.

hearsal for the great funeral pageant that will be held Friday.

Figures fail to give an idea of the vast throngs that lined the streets for the funeral procession or the great swarms of humanity that clustered in the windows of houses along the route and the thousands that occupied precarious perches on housetops, street posts and every ledge and arch that gave a footing.

Eleven thousand picked troops, the flower of the English army, formed an impressive border for the funeral cortege as it passed along.

The course was only a mile in length but apparently the greater part of London's population had gathered to view the spectacle.

The catafalque covered with black and purple draperies, surmounted by the crown and scepter of England and surrounded by draped English flags, was started from the palace at 11:20 o'clock and arrived at Westminster hall at noon.

Visiting Monarchs Not in Line.

As the gun carriage bearing the coffin moved slowly along company after company of soldiers came to present arms while the colors slowly dipped in silent salute. A cheer was heard from the crowded streets as the rumble of the heavy gun carriage wheels, the clatter of horses' hoofs and the light noise of carriages bearing the royal family of England and the heads of the British government.

Alexandra, of Denmark, the queen mother, widow of King Edward, rode in the first carriage, accompanied by her mother and the dowager empress of Russia. King George V and members of the royal household followed.

Then came officers of the army, council members of the army, members of the board of admirals, field marshals and admirals.

Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, commissioner of the United States, was not in the procession today. Neither was any of the line of European monarchs. Roosevelt and the visiting monarchs will appear in the final funeral procession Friday.

Short Service at Westminster.

When the coffin arrived at Westminster, the archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by Canon Wilberforce, conducted a short service in the course of the services the combined Westminster royal chapel choir impressively sang several anthems.

At 1 o'clock the services had ended. The body lay in state from 1 to 4, when it was viewed by those invited by members of parliament. After 4 o'clock the public was admitted and thousands took advantage of the opportunity to file by the coffin.

The decision of Earl Ferdinand of Bulgaria to attend the funeral of King Edward brings the list of monarchs who will be in the funeral procession up to ten.

Those who were privileged to witness the starting of the procession from inside the palace grounds today arrived early and silently took up the positions allotted them. There was an entire absence of bustle, and decorum prevailed everywhere. Inside the palace the royal mourners were joining in a last sacred service, and this completed, the casket was prepared for removal to the gun-carriage in waiting outside.

One of the last acts of the Queen Mother was to place in the coffin a little emblem of love in the shape of a bunch of lilies of the valley.

Historic Westminster Hall.

Westminster hall, where the late king's remains will lie in state during the next two days, is the only section remaining of the great Westminster Palace, which was destroyed by fire in 1834, and is now used as a vestibule to the houses of parliament. The hall was begun by William Rufus in 1097, and was destroyed by fire in 1291. In its present form it is the work of Richard II, who had the walls buttressed and the wooden roof added in 1393.

The ceiling is one of the most remarkable specimens of timber architecture in existence, both as regards beauty and constructive skill. The hall has been the scene of many stirring events, and no other hall in all England is so rich in historical associations. Here it was that Oliver Cromwell took the oath as lord protector of England, and here, too, was held the great coronation dinner, celebrating the coronation of George IV. The hall was for many years the center of the English law courts, and it was also used for great festivals, the lord mayors being sworn into office there for the last time in 1859.

to east of the sun, and the earth moves in opposite direction.

Some persons predict that when Mother Earth flirts with the tail of the comet tomorrow there will be strange and unusual doings. All things electric will dance frigid jigs. The most faithful compass ever depended upon by expert surveyor will not point toward the North Pole; telephone bells will ring, and strange messages will be received over telegraph wires on account of the presence of the mysterious visitant from the stars.

But in the same breath the observers predict that none need seek the shelters of caves or cyclone cellars, since the tail of Halley's comet has no malicious intentions whatsoever. The weather, however, may be completely upset; rain may fall where the sun should shine and snow drift in the valleys where more than gentle rains is never known. Today the tail of the comet is approaching the earth at about 160 miles a minute according to the speed of John McNulty, expert of the government hydrographic office at Portland. Mr. McNulty has also completed a calculation showing that at 24 minutes and 29.3 seconds past 5 o'clock tomorrow evening the comet will be directly in front of the face of the moon, and the earth in the middle of the tail.

"I hardly think it worth while for

surveyors and electrical workers whose efficiency depends upon the nicety of their calculations to work tomorrow," said Mr. McNulty. "If, as is stated, the fall of the comet is composed of electric ions there will be some very remarkable manifestations of electrical phenomena. For this reason I have asked all telegraph, telephone and wireless telegraph companies to report to me if they experience any unusual conditions. I should like reports from others engaged in electrical work. There will undoubtedly be fluctuations of electric currents with variations in all magnetic fields."

The electric ion spoken of by Mr. McNulty is defined by Webster as being "one of the elements which appear at the respective poles when a body is subject to electro-chemical decomposition."

Electricians say, too, that these ions are exceedingly active little bodies, and stir things magnetic up whenever they come around.

Watch All Night.

On the roof of the Customs building will be found tonight a man watching the weather. At every other weather station in the United States men will be found watching the weather through the nights and days until Halley's comet has again whirled itself off into the gusty outer space.

"For we hardly know what to expect in the way of climatic disturbance," said Director Beals of the weather bureau, this morning. "There may be vivid aurores-borealis, and strangely-luminous clouds may be seen. Vapors may condense and rain fall where rain is a stranger; in places there may be snow and cold. Unusual reflections from the clouds and from the dust particles may also be noted. It is not often that the earth passes through the tail of a comet, and we want to know exactly how it feels."

While astronomers do their best to make the earth resemble a hedgehog's back, bristling with telescopes, others who read divine significance in the coming of the comet will be thoughtful, and many of them will hold meetings of devotion.

Legends Make Appearance.

One of the evangelists in Portland distributed today posters which read: "Get close to God. The comet is coming."

Then, too, there are the many sects who take to themselves the privilege of dating the time for the world to burn and be ended, who say the comet has come to perform that very function.

In almost humorous contrast to the trepidation of these is the advertisement of a local dance hall manager:

"Dance any day, 25¢ happy until the comet comes and gets you. Stay awake until you know the worst. Music and dancing from 8 p. m. until the comet declares its intentions."

A teamster had posted on the back of his horse the following comforting legend: "Don't worry. After all the comet may miss you."

COLUMBIA PROFESSOR BELIEVES NO INJURY COMING FROM COMET

Shelton Press Landed Wharf.

By Harold Jacoby Rutherford, Professor of Astronomy at Columbia University.

New York, May 17.—"Will the comet injure the earth tomorrow night? I think not."

"Comets have struck the earth before and will continue to strike it in the future."

"In the museum of Natural History in New York there is a meteor weighing 27½ tons. There may be several like this in the head of Halley's comet and if the head struck we would have some local disturbance at least."

"However, the head will not come closer to the earth than 14,000,000 miles. Astronomers disagree on the figures but agree on these facts."

"Perhaps the tail may be long enough to reach the earth, and astronomers feel fairly sure that the tail will be long enough. We know the comet's head is solid. We also know that the tail is less dense than the air in the best vacuum we can make with a mercury air pump."

"The molecules in the comet's tail will be separated from each other by several cubic feet, so there should be no fear of ill effect from Halley's comet."

Pharmacy Board Files Report.

Salem, Or., May 17.—The annual report of the state board of pharmacy shows there are a total of 853 regularly licensed pharmacists in Oregon. The report was filed today and covers the year ending May 12, 1910. Of 191 applicants examined during the year 73 were registered as pharmacists and 30 as assistant pharmacists. The total receipts of the board from applications, examinations, fines and licenses were \$1238.15 and total disbursements were \$3646.85 leaving in the treasury \$1308.30.
