PLAN FOR MEN'S MEETING SUNDAY

REGIMENTAL POST FOR BOISE, IDAHO. Boise, Idaho, May 21.—The war department is to spend \$100,000 on permanent improvements at Boise Barracks. Plans, specifications and orders to advertise for bids on numerous buildings, which will transform the barracks into a regimental post have arrived from the quartermaster's office at Washington. Construction must begin before June 20, as the appropriation comes out of the quartermaster's department for the fiscal year 1910.

franchise would compensate the Hill lines for the loss of the United Railways franchise. The proposed franchise of the Heights Improvement company to construct a carline from Twenty-third and Washington streets to Kings and Malibu Heights was favorably considered by the committee and the franchise was ordered sent to the city executive board for a valuation.

Councilman Belding insisted, before voting for the grant of the franchise, on a clause being inserted in it to provide for the operation of cars as late as midnight. Eleven o'clock had been the original hour mentioned. Councilman Belding suggested that the city

Council issue an order requiring the Portland Railway, Light & Power company to provide an all night service on all of its lines. Mr. Belding thinks that at least one car every hour should be run after 12 o'clock. The committee recommended the adoption of a resolution of intention to improve a district, comprising more than 100 blocks, between Sullivan's gulch and the Sandy road and East Twelfth and East Twenty-ninth streets, with glassing. The estimated cost of the big improvement is \$350,000. Hereafter viewers' reports must be made to the street committee instead of to the judiciary committee. A resolution to this effect was adopted on Monday.

New Town Near Weiser. Weiser, Idaho, May 31.—The Appleton townsite will be opened June 14. The new town is located on the P. & I. N. railroad, nine miles east of Weiser in the center of the splendid Crane Creek project, which comprises 22,000 acres. Journal Want Ads bring results.

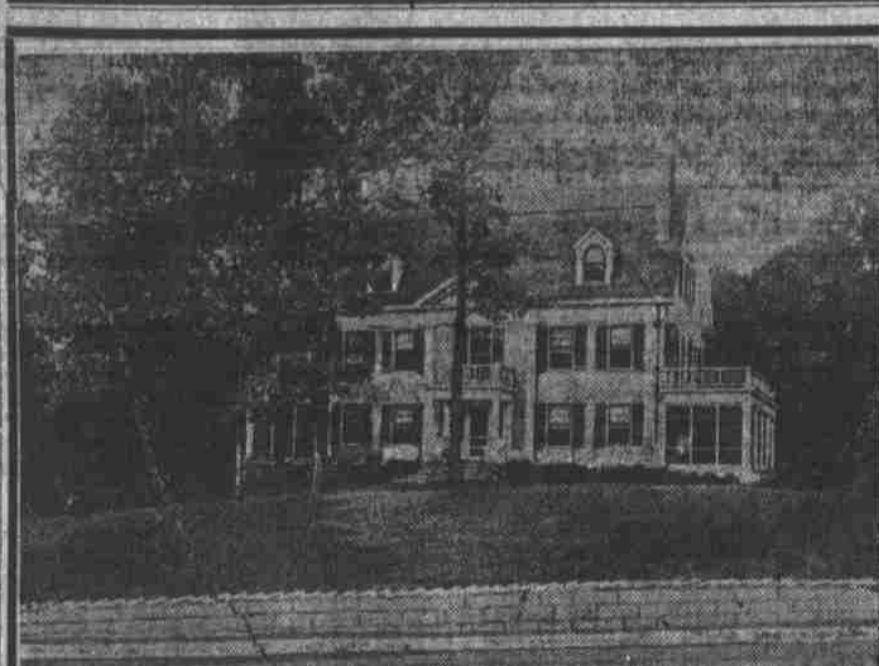
