## DAKOTANS COME TO LOOK OVER OREGON

### Parties Scheduled at Intervals Up to July 16—Thousands Are Interested.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, May 21.—Dr. H. W. Coe, of Portland, who is here, has a telegram from Fargo, dated May 18, from P. E. Ball, vice president of the Columbia Land company, saying: "A party of 30 left yesterday for Stanfield, Or. Minot sends a special May 21, Grand Forks a special June 2, Valley City a special, to Hermiton June 2, and Fargo a special June 7 and another July 16." Coe says there will be several cars intervening. The special mentioned as having left Fargo was No. 15. The landseekers will be taken to Stanfield and Hermiton on a six days' tour, stopping at North Yakima, Seattle, Portland and Hood-River to show them what sort of country they are going into. Coe says 500 persons have left Fargo since August and that 1000 more will go before the summer ends. Coe is here to offset reports injurious to the Umatilla reclamation project, which have been carried to the officials. He has succeeded in confirming previous claims that the Umatilla project is one of the best the government has inaugurated.

## O. A. C. PREPARES FOR BIG JUBILEE

### Quarter Centennial Will Be Fittingly Observed With One Week's Festivities.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., May 21.—Never before since the early days of the college has there been such a spirit of anticipation and expectation for big things for the college as there is at present. The coming Quarter Centennial and Jubilee seems to be the chief cause. Some five thousand invitations are to be sent out to the people of this and neighboring states. These are now being mailed by the dozens each day. The program is not entirely completed as yet, but a part of it is known. The senior play "The Man on the Box" is the beginning of the celebration week. This comes on the evening of Friday, June 10. On Saturday, the eleventh, the 1910 class day exercises take place in the forenoon. This afternoon is taken up with student repunions of the various organizations. The evening of the same day promises to be one of the best functions of the celebration. This is the Annual Junior Promenade, and judging from the efforts put forth by the present class the ball is to be one of the swiftest events of its kind ever held at the college. Sunday morning Rev. Dr. F. W. Champet, rector of Trinity church, San Francisco, will deliver the Baccalaureate sermon to the graduating class. Union services will be held in the Armory on Sunday evening. Monday and Tuesday Big Days. Monday and Tuesday are the really big days of the celebration. The forenoon is to be taken up by class reunions and alumni dinner. Historical exercises will take a part of the afternoon the remainder being given over to the students. It has finally been arranged that the cadets will have a sham battle on the campus in which there will be some six hundred taking part. Seventy-three in the evening will find the students engaged in the greatest pageant ever witnessed in the west. The men of the college are to be dressed in broad capes of orange and black, the college colors, while the girls will don fancy costumes and will do many fancy dances in a hollow square formed by the men. The same evening President Kerr will hold a reception in Waldo Hall, this being followed by the alumni reception and ball in the gymnasium. Tuesday morning the alumni will hold their annual business meeting in Shepard hall. At eleven o'clock the Jubilee exercises are to be held in the new armory, the principal oration to be delivered by Honorable W. F. Herria, class 1878, now chief counsel of the Southern Pacific system, with residence in San Francisco. In the afternoon preceded by an academic procession on the campus will be held the commencement exercises, address by President James M. Hamilton, president of the Montana Agricultural college. The final of the whole week will be the great college dinner in the gymnasium. ## FISHERIES CASE TO BE SETTLED

### American Delegation Goes to The Hague to Meet British Representatives.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, May 21.—The American delegation to The Hague conference, to be held by representatives of Great Britain and the United States over the settlement of the Newfoundland fisheries case, sailed from here today for The Hague. The delegation that will present the claims of the United States in one of the most important disputes in which the country has ever been involved, is headed by Senator Elihu Root of New York, formerly secretary of state. In the party is George Turner of Spokane, Wash. The fisheries case involves the right of Americans to fish along the Newfoundland and north Atlantic coasts in equal footing with citizens of Newfoundland and Canada. These rights were affirmed to the American fishermen by the treaty of 1818, but recently Newfoundland restricted the American fishers without the consent of the United States. The cases involve the adjudication of millions of dollars' worth of fishing rights. Twice a British-American war has been threatened over the questions at issue. New Lakeport Hotel Opening. ## CHEHALIS SPENDING \$120,000 ON STREETS

Chehalis, Wash., May 21.—Chehalis has just perfected plans for public improvements to cost \$120,000. Of this sum, \$80,000 will go into a sewer system and about \$120,000 into street paving. The expenditures of \$200,000 for public improvements at one time marks a record in the history of the city, which is just now growing as never before. The streets to be paved are Market street from Park to Main, \$25,000; Main street from Market to the Northern Pacific railroad, \$82,000; Chehalis avenue from Main to Ninth street, \$37,000; Poisson from State to Louisiana, \$25,000.
