

FRA DIAVOLO IS WELL PRESENTED

Closing Week of Local Engagement of National Opera Co. Opens in Popular Opera.

Bubbling over with crisp music and amusing situations and splendidly presented by the National Opera company, Aubrey's "Fra Diavolo" should draw capacity houses at the Portland this week. Quite a few chairs were vacant at the opening performance last night, and it was difficult to guess why, for the company has certainly made good during its stay in the city. And "Fra Diavolo" is worth while.

This will be the last week of the National in Portland this season, unless arrangements be made for a return engagement of some kind, for next Sunday evening it begins a coast tour at Astoria.

"Fra Diavolo" is not only musical, it also tells a good story. The music is not so "catchy" that upon dismissal half the audience goes humming it down the street, but it is long remembered vaguely as a splendid dressing to irresistible comedy.

"Fra Diavolo" cannot be accused of monotony, for the cast is representative and the leads sufficiently divided to give everybody a chance. Miss Alma Hemmi as Zerlina, the innkeeper's daughter, of course, is the most important figure, and she won spontaneous applause and bouquets of roses over the footlights last night. Her opportunities in solo and ensemble work were many, and she scored in all. James Stevens as Fra Diavolo, the brigand, won new admirers, especially in his scene, "Most Charming Handsome Lady," to Lady Alcazar at the close of the first act, while disguised as Marquis of San Carlo, with whose charms and wiles the wife of Lord Alcazar is badly smitten, much to the annoyance and mental suffering of the English nobleman.

Maurice Darcy portrays Lord Alcazar and makes the most of the part, although his "fingering" sometimes suffers in the more exciting scenes. He threw the house into convulsions of laughter more than once, and especially at the climax of the bedchamber scene, when Fra Diavolo and two of his followers are discovered in an adjoining closet.

In the third act Fra Diavolo is again in the hills, a brigand chief, undisciplined and full of his liberty and anticipates much fun as well as profit at the scheduled meeting with Lord Alcazar, but he is betrayed and finally falls into the hands of his enemies, Captain Lorenzo and his carabinieri, who have been hunting the brigand for some time. Lorenzo wins Zerlina, with whom Fra Diavolo was in love, and all is well. Lord Alcazar's treasure is saved from the robbers and the newly-weds share it in the shape of a substantial wedding gift.

Pace Ripple, tenor, makes an ideal army officer as captain of the carabinieri and has several opportunities to ride his horse to its full range. Elvia Cox Seabrook did all that was required of Lady Alcazar, and C. M. Books as Matteo, the innkeeper, George Kunkle and Frank Preisch, as bandits and followers of Fra Diavolo, Nellie Andrews, as servant Povero, and Francesco as a rich young farmer, came up to every requirement.

"Fra Diavolo" does not overwork the chorus, but it has important parts at times. The sextette from "Lucia di Lammermoor" was given by Miss Hemmi, Miss Seabrooke, Pace Ripple, James Stevens, Maurice Darcy and Frank Preisch at the close of the second act. The familiar musical rom was splendidly rendered and proved a pleasant surprise and a much appreciated treat.

PEACH CROP TO BE FIRST CLASS

Especially Good in Vicinity of The Dalles and Ashland, Oregon.

The general prospects for a first class peach crop this season in the peach centers of Oregon are good, according to H. M. Williamson, secretary of the state board of horticulture.

"Around Ashland and The Dalles, in which sections more than one-half of the total peach crop of the state is raised, there is hardly ever a failure in the crop," said Mr. Williamson, "and this season the appearance now is that it will be larger and better than usual."

The fact that peach trees blossom earlier than most any other kind of fruit trees limits them mostly to certain districts. As far as discovered, the sections of country around The Dalles and Ashland are the most favored peach centers in the state. There is a limited area around Merlin, in Josephine county, which has been discovered to be a first class peach locality. The country around Hermiston and Echo is developing into a good peach raising section, but the fruit cannot be grown extensively there until the irrigation projects have been completed.

In the last three or four days strawberry raisers near Portland have found it hard to find pickers. The loganberry crop appears to be promising. With most other kinds of small fruit there is never much probability of failure unless a dry summer retards the blackberries. It is mostly a question of over or under production.

The unprecedented novelties of Halley's comet to date have been the throwing off of the fragment, A-1910, to come ahead as advance representative and press agent, the roller skating dash, circumnavigating the sun and cutting pigeon wings across the plane of the earth's orbit in four different ways, and finally making daring transit of the sun's face for the first time in the world's history.

As a blow to the conceit of those mundane residents who have fondly believed that the comet was doing it all while old earth occupied a box seat at the heavenly show comes the information that the exhibition would not have been so unique had the earth not kept on the move continually in order to get various viewpoints and, so doing, add to the breath taking features of the comet's "turn."

COMET WILL BE 71-2 DEGREES NORTH OF DOG STAR TONIGHT

To the Editor of The Journal.—Today's Oregonian published a cut of the sun and Halley's comet with remarks of an astronomer, which are confusing. The professor's telescope must have been "winked" to place the comet north of the sun, and out of focus to take a star for a comet. Halley's comet was in place, south of the sun's path, Friday and Saturday. Monday night it will be about 7 1/2 degrees north of Procyon, the little dog star. Its position has been figured out far ahead and it has always shown up according to schedule. Locate Procyon and look a little north and you will see Halley's comet Monday night if the sky is clear. Don't look west of the sun. It is promised, sit up all night to see it in the eastern sky, when it couldn't possibly rise in the east until after daylight.

Oklahoma Would Oust Oil Co.
Enid, Okla., May 22.—The suit brought by the state of Oklahoma to dissolve the Waters-Pierce Oil company, is on the docket of the district court for trial this week. The case is similar in all its important aspects to that successfully prosecuted some time ago by the state of Texas. In the present suit the state of Oklahoma alleges that the Waters-Pierce concern is a subsidiary to the Standard Oil company, and that its operation in Oklahoma is in restraint of trade and therefore a violation of the anti-trust law of the state.

MINISTERS PLAN FOR PROHIBITION

Methodist Pastors Discuss the Need of Organized Effort in Oregon.

"A Symposium on Prohibition" was the feature of the regular weekly meeting of the Methodist ministers of Portland and vicinity, held at the Taylor street church at 10:30 o'clock this morning. The exercises consisted of short addresses on various phases of the prohibition question, followed by a general discussion, participated in by the members of the association.

"Ruin Wrought by Liquor" was the subject of a ten-minute talk by Rev. W. H. Hampton, who said that whatever may be said of the effect of prohibition in other states, it had proved an unqualified success in the dry portions of Oregon. He cited numerous instances to show that the dry districts in the state are immensely prosperous and that in no case had the business of dry towns been impaired as a result of voting out the saloons.

"Responsibility of the Voter" was the subject of a 10-minute talk by Rev. W. J. Douglass, who said that the last election showed that 17,000 Oregon voters failed to register their votes on prohibition. He declared that these men must be personally seen and won over to the dry cause.

Rev. A. E. Ayres, of Woodstock, expressed the belief that Oregon, outside of Multnomah county, would stand by prohibition, and the fight must be made in the suburbs of Portland, where there are thousands of votes that may be won over to prohibition.

By rising vote the association pledged the Methodist ministers of this city and district to remain in the thickest of the prohibition fight until the close of election day in November.

Rev. C. E. Andrews read nine new articles of faith for the Methodist Ministers' association, which were immediately ponced upon by several members and motions made to table the articles. Upon being assured by Bishop Smith that Dr. Andrews' production was offered in a material vein, the motion quieted down and the regular order of business was resumed.
