

G. O. P. WILL CARE FOR INTERESTS IN POSTAL BANK BILL

House Bill as It Stands Deals With Government and Depositors—Bondholders Now to Be Let in—Insurgents Out

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, May 23.—Tonight's caucus, which was expected to include all the Republicans in the house to consider the postal savings bank bill, gives evidence that it will turn out to be only a regular Republican caucus. The insurgents who were invited to attend and at first considered the invitation, will not be present. A few days ago some of the insurgents announced that they would not go to the caucus. Today it is declared that not one of the progressives will be on hand. The purpose of the caucus, it is learned today, is to consider the postal savings bank bill and come to a definite agreement on the provisions that will be supported by the regulars. The bill recommended by the house committee on postoffice and postroads will be taken to pieces and put together again with a number of new features incorporated. The bill as now recommended is a genuine postal savings bank bill. It has only the features requisite for the formation of a postal savings bank and is very unlike the measure adopted by the senate. As the bill now stands, the duties of the government and the privileges of depositors are about the only things included. It is up to the caucus tonight to insert the "necessary politics," which will take the form of some definite provision regarding bondholders and their rights and privileges. It is said the bill will really be framed in the caucus tonight. Amendments will be offered as soon as it is called up in the house that will include all the features adopted at the caucus and within a short time after consideration of the measure begins, the bill will look so much like the one planned at tonight's meeting that even Uncle Joe Cannon will not be able to see any difference. "The real house postal savings bank bill will be framed in the caucus tonight," said one representative. Another Republican representative, discussing the probable action at the caucus, said: "The present house measure is purely a postal savings bank measure. Only two factors are included—the government and the depositors. Tonight politics will be added, as was done in the senate, where the bill includes third parties—bondholders, and others."

FIGUEROA HELD FOR MURDER OF HIS WIFE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Santa Monica, Cal., May 23.—George Figueroa is in jail charged with the murder of his wife. His arrest followed the verdict of a coroner's jury that the girl "came to her death by a gunshot wound in the brain, homicidally inflicted, and the evidence points to George Figueroa as the guilty party." Mrs. Figueroa was found unconscious at midnight Thursday on the floor of her bedroom. She died the following day. Figueroa will be given a preliminary examination tomorrow.

Many Pass Examinations. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Hood River, Or., May 23.—Reports from the board of county examiners of Hood River county for the eighth grade pupils in the city public school report that out of 49 taking the examination 13 passed and 25 passed conditional who may finish their grades at the June examination.

OREGON ELECTRIC INCLUDES ALBANY

Company Accepts Franchise and Files Bond for Performance of Conditions.

Albany, Or., May 23.—The Oregon Electric Railway company yesterday filed its acceptance of the franchise granted by the city council to build its line along Fifth street in Albany. The company gave a \$10,000 National Security bond for assurance of faithful performance of the conditions of the franchise. This shows that they mean business. Under the franchise, the road from Salem to Albany must be completed and in operation within two years. It is hoped by the citizens of Albany in general that the Fifth street property owners will be unsuccessful in securing a referendum of the franchise, as the company has definitely declared that it cannot wait with the building of its line south from Salem and that if the referendum is invoked Albany will be left off the line. George McDowell, right of way agent for the company, who was in Albany yesterday has given an official public notice of the company's intentions.

COLUMBIA COLLEGE GRADUATING EXERCISES

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Milton, Or., May 23.—The graduating exercises of Columbia Jr. college will begin next Saturday night, when the Rev. Dr. Raymond C. Brooks of Walla Walla will give an address under the auspices of the college Y. M. C. A. The baccalaureate sermon will be preached on Sunday morning in the Methodist Episcopal church, South, by Rev. Edward Barber of Albany, Or. The annual musical and elocutionary exhibition will be held on Monday night, when President Martin will outline the plans for the coming year. The new college buildings are under way and are expected to be completed for the opening of the fall session. These buildings will cost about \$50,000.

HARRIMAN-RUMSEY WEDDING TOMORROW

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, May 23.—The marriage of Miss Mary Harriman, daughter of the late railway king, to Charles Cary Rumsey of Buffalo, N. Y., an artist and sculptor, will take place tomorrow at the Episcopal church at Arden, the country seat of Mrs. E. H. Harriman. The family is still in mourning for Harriman and the wedding will be a quiet one, devoid of the usual spectacular features attending a society match. Only the family and a few close friends will attend.

TAFT AGAIN HEAD OF UNITARIAN LAYMEN

JAPAN NEVER TO FIGHT AMERICA

Mr. Kechiba Murai Says Japan Has Figured Out Peace to Be More Profitable.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, May 23.—There will never be a war between the United States and Japan, according to Kechiba Murai, the J. Pierpont Morgan of Japan, who is in Los Angeles with his wife and daughter. Murai, who is the head of the Murai Brothers' banking house of Tokio and of various manufacturing and agricultural projects throughout Japan, is taking a six months' vacation. He declared today that the opportunity America afforded for a study of financial and industrial methods, had prompted him to spend his vacation in this country. "Almost every Japanese who visits America," he said, "tells you there will be no war with Japan. You listen and think his statement is merely a courtesy, because he is your guest. But he is right. Japan admires America, and in the main, American ideals. When America comes to know Japan better the admiration will be mutual. "Anyway Japan wants war with no one. She is beginning to have a keener realization that her destiny is to be worked out along industrial and other peaceful lines. "Talk of war between Japan and America is not worthy of a hearing.
