

TAFT WILL TALK TO GRADUATES AT VARIOUS SCHOOLS

President to Tour Two States
and Make Many Commence-
ment Addresses—to Visit
Daughter at Bryn Mawr.

Washington, D. C., May 28.—When
President Taft leaves for New York to-
morrow night he starts upon a series
of journeys which will set a new mark
in presidential oratory.

His missions are to be those of knowl-
edge-giving. He will import to the
graduating classes great truths which
may or may not help them when they
are lined up on the greater gridiron of
life. Brier respite will mark the erudite
junket.

As the president sits amid the splen-
dor of graduating halls and learns that
beyond the Alps lies Italy and that
Caesar was really and truly a greater
fighter than Napoleon, he will estab-
lish a new epoch in the lives of our
presidents. But first of all, he will go
to New York to review the memorial
day parade on Monday. Late Monday
he will be back in the national capitol
preparing for his second trip which
starts on June 2. The first commence-
ment oration delivered by President Taft
will be at the young women's school at
Bryn Mawr, where Miss Helen Taft is a student.

On the following day, he will deliver
a noon-day speech at the graduating
exercises of the Northern University
at Ada, Ohio. With the plaquards of
Ada still ringing in his ears, President
Taft will be hurried to Detroit in time
to speak the same night. The speech
in Michigan may embody some politics
for Senator Burrows is said to be meet-
ing some opposition that way. On June
4, President Taft will be shown the
beauties of Jackson and Monroe, Mich-
igan, from the quarterdeck of an au-
tomobile, and the evening of June 5
will again find him back in the Dis-
trict of Columbia.

On June 8 two orations will be made
by the president to the graduating
classes. One will be at Villa Nova
college in Pennsylvania and the other
at Lincoln college, an institution for
negroes not far from Villa Nova. An
automobile will convey the president
from one school to another.

To See Son Graduate.

At Villa Nova an honorary degree
of doctor of jurisprudence will be
conferred upon President Taft. Four days
later President Taft will journey to his
alma mater, Yale, and will witness the
commencement exercises in which his
son Robert will participate as an orator.
The Yale commencement exercises
will be the most interesting of all.
President Taft always speaks with
great feeling there, for his feeling for
the school is warm.

A dinner will be given at New Haven
for the president, after which he will
go to New York.

President Taft will make the open-
ing address at the biennial convention
of the National Republican league in
New York on June 24.

Lamont Men Fined.

I. C. OFFICIALS DEFY ACCUSERS

Ridicule Accusation of Rebat-
ing and Admit and Defend
Unloading Charge.

(United Press League Wire.)

Chicago, Ill., May 28.—Confident that
the investigation into their alleged rebat-
ing will not hurt them, Illinois Cen-
tral railroad officials ridicule the
charges by Edward G. Davies, the com-
mission merchant, who accuses that
company of granting concessions equiv-
alent to rebates to big shippers. Among
the big shippers named are the pack-
ers.

In one of the biggest of the cor-
porations involved a United States sen-
ator is said to hold a large amount of
stock. Donald Rose, freight traffic
manager of the Illinois Central rail-
road, made light of the charges and
said today that his company invited gov-
ernment investigation. He added:

"Mr. Davies desires publicity. We
are now taking steps to prosecute a
bill against him for several thousand
dollars in unpaid charges. The inter-
state commerce commission has decided
in our favor and we shall take proper
steps to enforce collection.

"The principal charge he makes is
that we add 1 cent per hundred pounds
for unloading freight that is shipped
in less than carload lots. That is true.

SPRINGFIELD GRANTS NEW LINE FRANCHISE

Eugene, Or., May 28.—The city council
of Springfield at its meeting last night,
granted the Portland, Eugene & Eastern
Railway company the franchise for the
construction of a street railway system
in this city, after many months of de-
lay. The company was given the fran-
chise two years ago, but allowed it to
lapse, and the council, after receiving
the application for a new franchise,
has been wary in regard to the matter.

While the company is given the privi-
lege of building on a number of streets,
it is probable that only Main street will
be used for the proposed line from
Eugene up McKenzie valley. Work on
the big bridge across the Willamette
river is being rushed and surveyors to-
day placed grade stakes on Main street.
It is said that Mayor Sutton may veto
the ordinance granting the franchise,
because the council had previously given
a franchise over the same street to the
Lane County Asset company, which in-
tends to build from Eugene through
Springfield and also to Cook Bay. Con-
struction work in Springfield is with-
held by the P. E. & E. company until
it is known whether or not the mayor
will exercise his veto power.

REITERATES SCRIBER IS WILLING TO SERVE TIME

J. W. Scriber, who Friday was con-
victed by a jury in United States dis-
trict court, of wrecking the Farmers'
& Traders' National Bank of La Grande,
Or., of which he was cashier, could not
be found last night to verify the state-
ment of his counsel, L. H. McMahon,
that he will give up the fight and begin
service in the federal penitentiary.
However, Mr. McMahon, who gave the
statement exclusively to The Journal
yesterday, repeated the declaration. He
said Scriber lost fairly, and will go to
jail as soon as sentenced by Judge
Bean. General belief is that Scriber,
who is 54 years old, will not be sen-
tenced to serve more than 10 years.

HUMAN OSTRICH DIES AT MARSHFIELD

Graham, a human ostrich, died at his
home near this city. He came to town
recently and started eating beer gob-
lets and thin glassware. He did not
appear at first to have been hurt, but a
few days ago he contracted pneumonia
and died in agony.

TAFT MAY MAKE TRIP TO PANAMA

Will Probably Inspect Canal
After Fall Elections in No-
vember.

Washington, D. C., May 28.—President
Taft will make his first trip to the
Panama canal zone since his inaugu-
ration in November after the fall elec-
tions, if the president's plans are car-
ried out. The president has reached a
tentative decision to make a trip of in-
spection to the canal upon a United
States warship. He will be accom-
panied by Secretary Dickinson, Sec-
retary Meyer and perhaps Secretary Knox.

If the present arrangement is carried
out, President Taft will be away from
Washington three weeks. He will re-
turn early in December after congress
adjourns and will have a very inter-
esting and important report to make in
his message on the work done. The
last trip he made to the Panama canal
was in January and February of 1909,
several months before the inauguration.

EUGENE'S ROSE SHOW SUCCESSFUL EVENT

Eugene, Or., May 28.—Eugene's first
annual rose show, held here today by
the ladies' auxiliary of the Commercial
club, was a greater success even than
was expected. The display was the
greatest thing of its nature ever seen
in the upper valley and was viewed by
thousands of people all afternoon and
evening. Preceding the opening of the
display the big automobile parade, in
which 40 or 50 machines participated,
all beautifully decorated, was held on
the streets. S. B. Finnegan's machine re-
ceiving the prize offered by the ladies'
auxiliary for the best decoration. Nu-
merous prizes were awarded to rose ex-
hibitors.

MAN SAYS JAPS ARE FOUR FOOTED ANIMALS

Berlin, May 28.—The Japs are four-
footed animals, says the celebrated
French scientist, Professor Lannelongue,
in an article published in the last
number of the leading German medical
review.
His statement is based primarily on
an examination of Japanese feet. The
Japs run about at home generally with
naked feet or at the most in light slip-
pers. Their toes are developed in such
a way that they can be used as fingers.
The toes can grasp and entwine around
objects like fingers. The Japs can pick
up articles from the ground with their
toes. They catch mice with their toes.

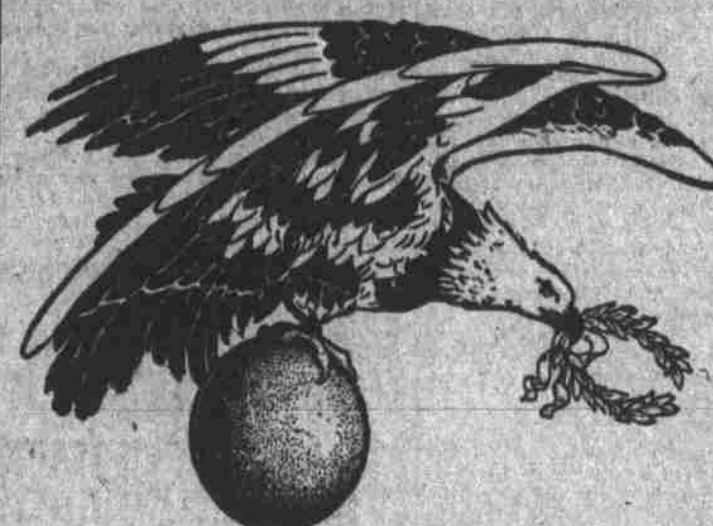
