

VETERANS OF WAR ENJOY MEMORIAL TALK BY PASTOR

Gather With Large Audience in
Centenary M. E. Church
Where Rev. C. T. Wilson
Praises Faith and Devotion

Centenary M. E. church was filled with an interested audience last night. In addition to the regular worshippers, Summer post No. 12, of the G. A. R., and the Spanish War Veterans, were present to hear the Rev. C. T. Wilson's memorial sermon which was founded on Hebrews xi, 13: "These all died in the faith, not having received the promises, but having seen them and greeted them from afar, and having confessed that they were strangers and pilgrims on the earth."

Patriotic Music.
There was patriotic music by the choir. In part Dr. Wilson said: "The thoughts of the nation are turning tonight toward the memorial service that with solemn and reverent observance we celebrate this week. At critical periods in the progress of the ages thrilling events occur, which send their influences forward, epoch-making, brightening and broadening in the judgment of history down to the last syllable of recorded time. Such an event was the Civil War of 1861. At a cost of treasure and blood and suffering, the sum of which may never be told, we secured as a people the two-fold boon of national unity and the natural rights of citizenship for all."
"The message I bring to you is in harmony with the feelings and sentiments of the hour. The devotion of the loyal troops will be compared to the pilgrim's faith, as set forth in Hebrews 11:13:

All Died in Faith.
"These all died in faith, not having received the promises, but having seen them and greeted them from afar, and having confessed that they were strangers and pilgrims on the earth."
"The eleventh chapter of the Epistle to the Hebrews introduces us into a sacred cemetery, filled with monuments inscribed to a host of heroes, of whom the world is not worthy. We pass the portals, and there stands before us a pillar erected to the memory of the first spirit of 'just men made perfect' who entered the gates of pearl and trod the bright pavement of the skies."

Track Blood on Snow.
"Sometimes I have become anxious for the liberties of the people and our free institutions. I remember that republics have been short-lived. I see the immense forces and multiplied forms of peril that threaten us. I see the fast-incoming army that lands upon our shores, threatening every right and privilege and with combining every hostile element of destruction."

In my dependency I go and walk the plains of Lexington and sit where Bunker Hill monument towers toward heaven, or yonder and skirt the shores of Lake Champlain, or yonder and walk the streets of Yorktown, or track the blood on the snows of Valley Forge; and there come up the deeds of the fathers; and I turn back knowing that all things are possible on this soil. But Doubt says: 'These heroes were of a former century and were the simple children of pioneer life, uneducated by prosperity and untaught by luxury. Then I turn to the great battlefields of modern strife: I lie down with the men about Vicksburg, where rebel shots ploughed up the ground and beat it into mortar; I cling to that stone wall across the field of Gettysburg, where every square yard was paved with the bodies of the slain.'

Goes to Prison.
"I pick my way through the wilderness to Richmond and back again to Appomattox; I go to Andersonville and Libby Prison and see men dying a hundred a day, stripped of every necessity, robbed, reduced to cadaverous skeletons, and pressed with every want. My hope springs to its feet. A race of martyrs has made our liberty secure. There is no measuring the power of such a people. The men who have touched the utmost limit of human endurance, sacrifice and suffering to protect our flag belonged to a race of martyrs, and there is no conquering such a spirit. Up went the flag, but many a brave man went down."

And the survivors of that terrible conflict are equally worthy of honor and gratitude. For every advantage we enjoy through our national government, for the unity of sentiment which binds all sections together now, for every dollar of prosperity, and every throb of patriotism, for every victory over Spain, and for every particle of respect among the nations of the earth, we should be grateful to the Grand Army of the Republic.

Lived Sacrificial Life.
"The men who left the schools and colleges in the best days of their life have lived a sacrificial life for 40 years since the war. A nation that could

forget them or turn a deaf ear to their needs would not be worth defending. "You all too well remember the call of the country to arms. The story of Fort Sumpter had been told and the young manhood of the land, trained under the broader ideas of Hamilton and Adams and Webster, that the nation was the unit of patriotism, forsook their plows, their shops, their merchandise, their professions, and rallied to the standard of the Union and stayed by their work until every star was restored to its field of azure. How strong they were, how devoted they were, how brave they were. And how much they needed these qualities to overcome the Grecian idea, that the unit of patriotism was the state, that had been so carefully and conscientiously fostered by John C. Calhoun, and to fix forever the Roman concept in the mind of the nation."

Left Bodies Behind.
"At last they came back, but not all of them; by hundreds of thousands they left their bodies in southern soil. As Christ died to make men holy, so they died to make men free."

"They died, but the ideas for which they contended live. African slavery is forever obliterated and the unity of the nation preserved, making possible our bearing of the white man's burden in the civilization of the world. And 37 years after William Shafter and Joe Wheeler, General Wilson and General Breckenridge, upon the same battlefield and under the same flag, were leading troops from north and south, both white and black upon a foreign soil in a campaign of mercy for the higher civilization of the world."

"While the sons of Vermont and Maryland, Dewey and Schley, swept two oceans with their flags, and by the thunders of the great guns blew from the seas the medieval misrule of Spain. We are no longer a province but a nation, whose mighty Christian influence the powers of the world must reckon with. And even Samoa cannot be Germanized or Anglicized, nor China dismembered without our consent."

Men Died for Country.
"But our present recognition by the nations of the world and our present ability to handle the lever of aggressive civilization was made a possibility by the men who from '61 to '65 poured out their lives to make a free nation a unit forever."

"Gentlemen, in these days of gray hairs we delight to honor the few that are left of you. And a thousand years hence the nation will celebrate your triumphs and decorate your graves. But gentlemen, your life at your period grows too serious to spend it in glorifying the past. A great future, more solemn than any life yet lived, is before us."

Life is not made up of great things, but of small accretions, and the whole presents the average quality of the units which form it, and the small self-denials. No good fruit is produced, but as a sequence to the conditions of selection, cultivation and care.

LAST SAD RITES FOR LATE JOHN C. HUSTON

Vancouver, Wash., May 30.—The funeral of the late John C. Huston was held at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon from the family residence, Eleventh and Washington streets, and the remains interred in the Masonic section of the city cemetery. The service was held at the home conducted by Rev. Otis E. Gray of St. Luke's Episcopal church, assisted by Rev. W. I. Eck of the English Lutheran church. The Elks lodge officiated at the grave and an impressive ceremony in accordance with the rites of the order was carried out. The Odd Fellows and Knights of Pythias paid their respects by attendance in bodies. The floral offerings were elaborate and very beautiful. A large wreath bearing the words "The Lucia," from the Lucia Lumber company, of which the deceased was a member, was especially beautiful.

To Protect the Birds.

Berlin, May 30.—Eighteen countries, among them the United States, are represented in the fifth quinquennial convention of the International Ornithological congress, which opened here today. The problem of preventing the extermination of birds, the bodies, wings and plumage of which are employed for millinery purposes, is one of the most important matters to be considered by the congress. The American representative from the National Association of Audubon societies has been instructed to submit to the congress a plan for uniform protection against the army of poachers that scour the earth to supply the millinery markets with the plumage of billions of birds. An effort will be made to bring about an agreement between Canada, the United States and Mexico, for the protection of the migratory birds of the North American continent.

Bishop Lawrence 60 Years Old.

Boston, Mass., May 30.—Right Rev. William Lawrence, bishop of the Episcopal diocese of Massachusetts, celebrated his 60th birthday today. Bishop Lawrence is a native of Boston and a graduate of the Episcopal theological seminary at Cambridge, of which institution he served as dean for five years previous to his election as bishop in 1882.

Hood River Store Robbed.

Hood River, Or., May 30.—The grocery store of Kincaid & Kinney was burglarized early Sunday morning and the safe blown open. The front door was broken down, but the cash box, containing several hundred dollars, was not entered. There is no clue.

ELECTION AND THE PRIMARY LAWS ARE SUMMARIZED

Secretary of State's Office Issues Salient Epitome for
Guidance of Oregon Voters
at Coming Contest.

Salem, Or., May 30.—The following summary of the primary and general election laws was prepared by the secretary of state's office:

1.—Candidates for state and district offices, to be voted for in more than one county, and for circuit judges and district attorneys, must file with the secretary of state, at the time of beginning to circulate their petitions, a copy of the petition for nomination, signed by himself, as evidence that said elector is a candidate for nomination by his party. The vote cast by a political party in each voting precinct for representative in congress at the last preceding general election is the basis on which percentage for petitions shall be counted, and need not exceed one thousand (1000) signers.

2.—Petitions for nomination for an office to be voted for in the state at large must be signed by at least two per cent (2%) of the party electors residing in each of at least one tenth (1-10) of the precincts in each of at least four (4) of the counties of such district, and need not exceed one thousand (1000) signers.

3.—Petitions for nominations to be voted for in districts comprising more than one county must be signed by at least two per cent (2%) of the electors residing in each of at least one eighth (1-8) of the precincts in each of at least two (2) counties in the district, and need not exceed five hundred (500) signers.

4.—Petitions for nominations to be voted for in districts comprising only one county must be signed by at least two per cent (2%) of the party electors residing in each of at least one fifth (1-5) of the voting precincts of the county.

5.—Petitions for nominations for offices to be filled by the state at large, or by any district consisting of more than one county and nominating petitions for judges of circuit courts and for district attorneys in districts consisting of a single county, shall be filed in the office of the secretary of state not less than 20 days before the date of the primary nominating election, September 3, 1910.

6.—The secretary of state shall certify to the county clerks of the several counties of the state for the arrangement of the names and other information upon the ballots, all the names of, and information concerning, all the candidates for nomination contained in the valid petitions for nomination which have been filed with him not more than twenty (20) days, nor less than seven (7) days before the primary nominating election, September 3 to 6, 1910.

7.—Vote cast for representative in congress, at general election of June 1, 1908: First district, for candidate of Democratic party, 14,841; for candidate of Prohibition party, 2188; for candidate of Republican party, 21,889; for candidate of Socialist party, 344.

8.—Vote cast for representative in congress, at general election of June 1, 1908, Second district, for candidate of Republican party, 25,579; for candidate of Democratic party, 12,865; for candidate of Socialist party, 3565; for candidate of Prohibition party, 2685.

9.—Vote cast for representatives in congress, at general election of June 1, 1908: First district, for candidate of Democratic party, 14,841; for candidate of Prohibition party, 2188; for candidate of Republican party, 21,889; for candidate of Socialist party, 344.

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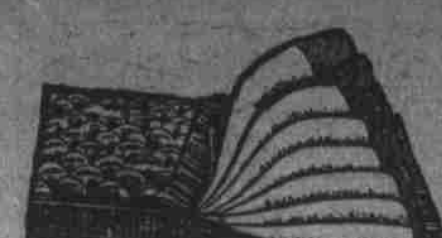
