

5,000,000 ROSES WILL GREET FESTIVAL CROWDS

When the quarter of a million or more visitors come to Portland next week for the fourth annual Rose Festival they will be greeted by more than 5,000,000 roses. George Hutchins, manager of the Rose Festival association, said today he believes more than that number of the queen flower will be picked in Portland for the show.

Everywhere will be roses. Thousands will be on exhibition at the flower show, at the exposition, all floats in the great gorgeous parades, and vehicles and automobiles will be decked with roses, and all over the city blooms will stud the landscape. More than 1,000,000 roses will be given to visitors.

Interest in the Rose Festival in the sound cities is intense. Hundreds of letters are being received each day from residents of western Washington, announcing their intention to visit Portland during the carnival, and inquiring about accommodations.

Tacoma Boosting.

Tacoma, too, is advertising the fair, giving added evidence that the festival has now assumed the proportions of a Pacific coast event and is no longer local to Portland. From California cities come inquiries and promises to visit the show. Showing how the festival is being advertised in Washington, officials of the festival association made public today a letter received from A. L. Sommers, secretary of the Tacoma chamber of commerce. Mr. Sommers said he is sending the letter to all members of the organization of which he is an officer. It reads:

"In answer to your communication, beg to state that we urge every one who can possibly find it convenient to attend the festival. We have received assurances from Portland that every courtesy will be extended to the citizens of Tacoma who may attend. We appreciate the efforts the Rose Festival association is putting forth in providing a pleasing, instructive and entertaining program, and we know that it will spare neither money nor effort to please the thousands of visitors who will be its guests."

Commands Much Attention.

"The Rose Festival has commanded the attention of the whole Pacific coast, and of the entire country, and deserves to be well attended. Beginning July 24 and ending July 30, Tacoma will have a military tournament. Thousands of dollars and months of hard work will be spent to make it a success in every way. We expect every section of the great northwest to be liberally represented and we want to see Portland send a large delegation. We therefore urge our citizens of Tacoma to go to the Oregon metropolis, attend the Rose Festival and each and every one appoint himself as a committee of one to advertise this tournament and invite as many people to come to Tacoma next July as time and convenience will permit."

A letter was received today from Judd S. Fish, secretary of The Dalles Business Men's association. The secretary said more than 1000 business men and their wives desire to attend the Rose Festival and will bring with them The Dalles band, which will participate in several of the parades.

Word was also received today from William McMurray, general passenger agent of the Harriman lines in Oregon, who said arrangements were being made to enter a "Harriman automobile," in which J. P. O'Brien, general manager of the lines in Oregon will ride, in the auto parade.

President Ralph Hoyt of the festival association, got word from the county commissioners, saying it is impossible to keep the drawbridge closed during the auto parade, which is to be held June 3, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. The line of parade is directed to the east

side, and the festival officials hoped the draws might be kept closed. But the commissioners are restrained by the government, which controls the channel, from closing the draws for any length of time.

Nevertheless, an effort will be made to induce vessel owners to postpone passage through the bridges until after the parade passes.

Idaho Delegation.

Idaho will send a delegation to the festival. Letters are being received by scores from residents of Boise and other Idaho cities. A special train will run from Boise, and thousands of visitors are expected from other points in the state. Montana, too, will send a large contingent, and many will come from Utah.

Extensive preparations are being made by florists and others to exhibit large displays at the rose show at the exposition building. Many have arranged to expend large sums of money for displays. Many private individuals, too, will spend large amounts of money in an effort to capture some of the rose show prizes.

As extensive as is the publicity already obtained for Portland and the northwest through the Rose Festival, officers of the association promise more.

Many Eastern Letters.

Manager Hutchins is in receipt of a large number of letters from eastern publications, the majority of which are horticultural journals, asking for photographs and descriptive articles of the Rose Festival. These, too, many newspapers and monthly magazines have requested pictures and stories of the rose show.

Portland is getting publicity all over the world through the festival. The cinematograph films to be taken by the Selig Co. will be shown in all civilized countries, and the publications in which the pictures of the parades and articles describing the festival, will go everywhere. Rose Festival officials estimate that Portland will get advertising worth many hundreds of thousands of dollars through the show.

St. Paul, May 30.—P. J. Gibbon, a prosperous stockbroker, killed his wife last night at her home by shooting her through the body and then killed Father E. J. Walsh, a priest in charge of the church of St. Augustine in South St. Paul, shooting him through the body and through the head. Gibbon alleges intimacy. He gave himself up at once and made a statement in which he acknowledged and even gloried in his deed.

Gibbon and his wife had been living apart for a year. He supported their eight children and visited them occasionally.

The neighbors say Mrs. Gibbon was a model wife. A mob of 3000 foreigners gathered to avenge the murders, but was helpless, the murderer having made himself safe within prison walls before news of his crime became public.

MAY REACH BIG
CASE THURSDAYOther Work Delays \$500,000
Suit of Receiver Devlin of
Oregon Trust.

Thomas C. Devlin's \$500,000 suit as receiver against the officers of the Oregon Trust & Savings bank, although set for trial in the circuit court tomorrow, is not likely to be reached until Thursday morning. Presiding Judge Morrow has other work marked out for the judges for the early part of the week, and has notified the attorneys in the bank case to be prepared for battle about Thursday.

The trial of the case is expected to last from two to three weeks. The testimony will deal with the financial and civil liability side of the transactions which were inquired into in the criminal trials of Walter H. Moore and W. Cooper Morris, the president and cashier of the defunct bank.

The defendants in the case are Moore, Morris, Henry A. Moore, Elmer E. Lytle, W. H. Copeland, Lonner O. Halston, Leo Friede and Albert T. Smith. They are accused of mismanagement and misappropriation to the extent of over \$500,000. A. E. Clark and Martin L. Pipes represent the receiver, the defendant's attorneys being Charles W. Fulton, John H. Hall, Manning & White, J. M. Long, Wirt Minor, Franklin T. Griffith, R. Citron, Sweek & Fouts, and Frank Schlegel.

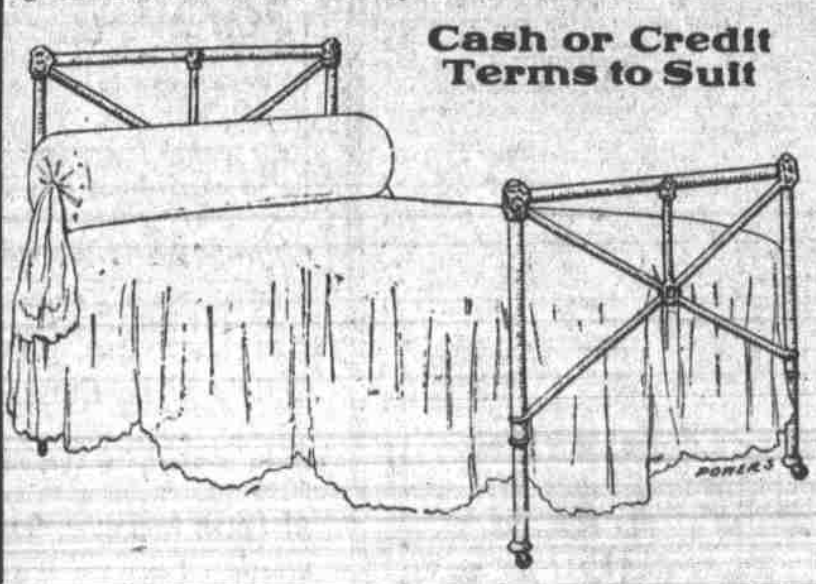

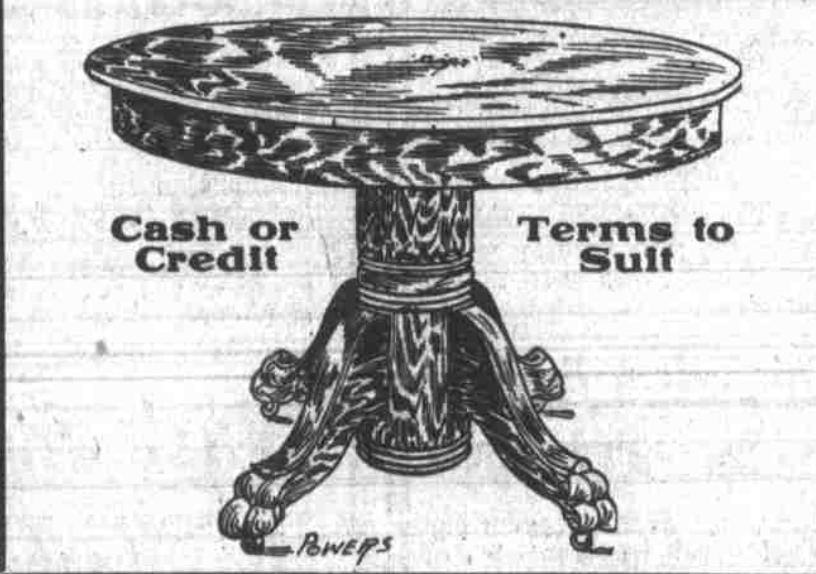
