

\$60,000 BLAZE RAZES INGALLS

Mill Town on Astoria & Columbia Railroad Is Helpless When Water Is Gone.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Clatskanie, Or., June 1.—Sixty thousand dollars is the estimated loss caused by a fire last night which swept Ingalls, a sawmill town near here on the Astoria & Columbia River railroad. Five houses and the shingle and planing mills of the Oregon Lumber company were destroyed. The houses were occupied by families of employees of the lumber company.
The fire started in the engine room of the shingle mill. It was not discovered until it had been burning for some time, and nothing could then be done toward extinguishing it, as the flume which carried Ingalls' water supply had been burned. The fire burned until after midnight. Nobody was injured.
The Oregon Lumber company has issued no statement as to whether the mills and houses will be rebuilt.

ROOSEVELT TO SPEAK FIRST IN SEPTEMBER

Washington, June 1.—That the first definite utterance of Roosevelt on political matters will be made at the national conservation convention at St. Paul in September is the tentative arrangement. The Conservation association now meeting here has called Roosevelt in Europe an outline of the St. Paul program for his approval. His utterance there, it is expected, will be in support of the insurgent movement.

MAN JUMPS FROM TRAIN NEAR CANBY

Canby, Or., June 1.—O. Peterson, a laborer who was en route from Portland to go to work at Lebanon, jumped from a car window of the Roseburg local last night as the train was nearing Canby and was badly injured. He struck a fence on a cattle guard. One leg, a wrist bone and several ribs were broken. The train crew brought him to Canby, where he was examined by Dr. Dedman. He was taken to the Good Samaritan hospital in Portland for treatment.
Everything looks fine for the race meet to be held at the Clackamas county fair grounds, on June 4. Much interest is being taken in the meeting.

PARK BOARD AGREES THAT COUNCIL CREST SHOULD BE PURCHASED

splendid view obtainable from it belongs to the people.
"Council Crest, as a city park, should have been acquired years ago," asserted Dr. J. R. Weatherbee. "I am opposed to any haste that will compel the paying of an unreasonable price. But we should not obtain more, in any case, than the Crest itself. For other park purposes flat ground is better, and we would do well to acquire 1000 acres on the Columbia river, and there institute sociological gardens and all the other paraphernalia of a modern park. To show the way values are increasing while we wait, one park site that we considered buying which was at first offered at \$40 an acre, is now held for \$500 an acre."

"Buy by All Means."
"Buy Council Crest by all means," said Isador Lang. "As nature makes it public property in use, so it should belong to the people in name and deed. But I am opposed to paying a great price for the property. Let us buy it at a reasonable rate."
One of the most enthusiastic advocates of the transformation of Council Crest into a city park when its purchase was first advocated a year ago was Judge Martin L. Pines. Judge Pines said during a conversation yesterday: "I was in favor of buying Council Crest a year ago, and I am in favor of buying it now. But I am a little bit disgusted that there should be so much talk and no action. When we have decided that Council Crest should be made public property we should with the same decision set about acquiring it. Neither should the public be required to pay an exorbitant price."
"I, too, am much in favor of conducting negotiations for the purchase of the Crest so that we will only obtain so much as is needed for the view," said E. L. Thompson of Hartman & Thompson, who has been active in the agitation for taking the site out of private ownership. "So far as the price is concerned, why the city has power of condemnation, insuring that no more need be paid than it is worth."

CANADIAN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION MEETS

Toronto, June 1.—With many physicians and surgeons in attendance from all over the Dominion, the 42d annual convention of the Canadian Medical association opened in Convocation hall today, to continue through the remainder of the week. For extensiveness of preparation and elaborateness of detail no such assemblage has been held in Toronto in many years. The program provides for general sessions and departmental meetings each day at which will be presented numerous papers and addresses on subjects of medical and surgical interest. Outside of the discussions on professional topics the chief question to come before the convention

is that of Dominion medical registration. It is desired that the present regulations be changed so that a physician registered in one province may be permitted to practice his profession in another province without taking a second examination.

SPOKANE COUNTY DRY OUTSIDE OF CITIES

Spokane, June 1.—That part of Spokane county outside the incorporated cities is "dry" by an overwhelming majority. The complete count of yesterday's election shows the anti-saloon faction won by a vote of 1200 to 400. This will leave only a few "wet" spots in the county, Cheney having voted dry previously.
Local option elections were held in Adams county yesterday, with the result that the county, outside of the

towns of Lind and Riverville, is dry. Riverville gave a majority of only 12 for licensed saloons, while Lind gave the vote 25 majority.

Semi-Centennial of Homeopaths.
New York, June 1.—Hundreds of alumni of the New York Homeopathic Medical college returned to their alma mater today to take part in the celebration of the semi-centennial of its foundation. The fiftieth commencement exercises of the college were held last night and this morning special clinics were held at the Flower hospital, which adjoins the college and is under its control. At noon luncheon was served for the alumni, who were greeted by the dean, Dr. Royal S. Copeland, formerly of the University of Michigan. In the afternoon the alumni held their annual business meeting, which was followed by class reunions. In the evening all the alumni will meet at a smoker.
