

TO BEGIN WORK ON SANITARIUM

State Commission for Treatment of Tuberculosis Holds Session.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., June 3.—At a meeting of the state commission for the treatment of tuberculosis held here yesterday, after an automobile trip to the beautiful location of the proposed sanitarium, it was decided that the work of remodeling the old Minto school buildings for sanitarium purposes would begin next week and it is expected that one sanitarium will be in readiness to receive patients by September 1. Plans and specifications for remodeling the buildings, prepared by Architect Louis Hazeltine, were accepted by the board. Dr. H. J. Clements, who has been selected to superintend the new institution, was authorized to purchase equipment and supplies and prepare a plan for the open air cottages for the use of the patients. Dr. Clements has made a tour of the most modern equipped tuberculosis sanitariums in Oregon and Oregon's will be up to date in every particular. Many inquiries for treatment, are being received by George Rodgers, secretary of the tuberculosis commission.

OREGON PIONEER OF 1851 DIES AT DAYTON

Dayton, Wash., June 3.—William T. Stott, an Oregon pioneer of 1851, died here today aged 64 years. He had been ill for only 10 days. The funeral will be tomorrow, the Rev. B. C. Miller officiating. He was born in Indiana but came to Portland when a boy. In that city he received his education, coming to Dayton 25 years ago to teach school. He later took up a homestead near town and died recently. He was a brother of Dr. J. S. Stott of Portland; Mrs. S. E. Fleck of Madras, Or.; Mrs. Mary Turner, and Miss Emma Stott of Walla Walla. He leaves a wife and four children, all living at Dayton.

LITERARY COLONY IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA

Santa Barbara, Cal., June 3.—Mrs. Robert Louis Stevenson's purchase of 12 acres of beach land at La Brea, between Summerland and Carpinteria, is said to preface the founding of a literary colony at that settlement. The property purchased by Mrs. Stevenson adjoins land owned by Stewart Edward White, the author. It is reported that Lloyd Cabot, Mrs. Stevenson's son, will be one of the charter members of the colony. Nearly two score writers and artists of national or sectional reputation have been wintering in Santa Barbara. Many of them are said to be included in the plan.

GENEROUS JACQUES CHEERS FOR RIVAL

Hearty Congratulations From French to English Aviator on Channel Feat.

Paris, June 3.—Count Jacques de Lesseps, the aviator who recently flew across the English channel from Calais, landing near Dover, today wired his congratulations to Captain Charles Stewart Rolls, who yesterday flew across the channel and back again in one continuous journey. "The success of Captain Rolls," said De Lesseps, "leaves nothing in the way of channel aviation. The captain was successful in what I myself attempted to do, the crossing and recrossing of the channel in one flight. He is entitled to every praise the feat deserves. The next attempt probably will be a flight from England to Germany across the North Sea. That is something well worth striving for and I expect to see it accomplished within a year."

BLERIOT TAKES HIS SKINNING GROSSLY

Paris, June 3.—Commenting on the new world's record for a continuous flight across the English channel and return established by Captain C. S. Rolls, M. Bleriot, the French aviator who first crossed the channel from France to England, today said: "There was nothing sensational about Captain Rolls' flight. His success was due to a well behaved motor and perfect weather conditions. I will not say that I expect to cross the North Sea, as reported, for that would give some other fellow a chance of beating me out."

WICKERSHAM PUTS ANTI-RATE MATTER UP TO SHIPPERS

The shippers are preparing to take measures to keep the rates from going into effect. On the other hand, the railroad enjoined by the federal courts from allowing their rates to take effect are meeting to form plans to fight the case. Commercial Bodies Will Confer.
The leading commercial organizations of 15 cities will meet here Tuesday to decide whether they will seek injunctions or whether their fight against the rate increase will take some other form. Following a statement today by the attorney general that the government would fight the railroads provided the proper complaint was made to the department of justice and evidence was filed showing collusion among the railroads in increasing rates, it is considered likely that the commercial bodies will file complaints at Washington. It is possible, however, that the shippers themselves may bring injunction

suits on other grounds than those under which the trust suits are filed. Another important meeting in the rate fight will be held here Monday. Railway Restructuring Reported.
It is reported that many of the roads are cancelling orders for improvements and rehabilitation and that they may drop many employees. The Santa Fe, it is declared, is planning to discharge 2000 men, and the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul is considering the dropping of 3000 men. It is further declared that the tentative action of the railroads indicates that the fight may injure business. A hard fight between shippers and railroads just now, it is intimated, would not only result in litigation, but might mean a falling off in tonnage which would entail a loss on the railroads. That the railroads expect a long and bitter fight is indicated by the measures being considered to cut down expenses at once.

WIND STORM HELPS COLUMBIA ORCHARDS

Dayton, Wash., June 3.—Hundreds of dollars worth of good was done by yesterday's violent wind storm, according to fruitgrowers here, who assert that nature completed the job of thinning the heavily burdened fruit trees at a time when fruit men had just commenced the task. R. E. Peabody today said the wind had blown off all of the diseased fruit and puny apples, leaving the trees thinned properly. In some localities the peach trees suffered, the wind sweeping the fruit off the limbs, doing some damage.

AUTO CATCHES ON FIRE ON FERRY

Gasoline Explodes and Boat's Fire Extinguishers Used to Put Out Flames.

Vancouver, Wash., June 3.—Car No. 607, and owned by Portland parties, caught afire on the Vancouver ferry this morning and for a time the car was in imminent danger of complete destruction. The fire originated from an explosion of gasoline and ignited with the floor of the boat. The ferry fire apparatus was brought into use and the fire extinguished with much difficulty. The car was raised off the boat by hand on the Washington side of the river.

FIND BODY OF MAN DROWNED IN RIVER

Salem, Or., June 3.—The body of Claude Gaby, of Eugene, who was drowned near Buena Vista about two miles above Salem in the Willamette river last Saturday, was recovered yesterday. A passing steamer, it is supposed, had caused the body to rise and when discovered it was inflated and lodged against a snag near the scene of the accident. It was badly decomposed and was taken to Independence where it was placed in a sealed casket for shipment to Eugene. Gaby with a companion was on a trip down the river in a launch when the launch turned over suddenly, throwing both in the water. He leaves a wife and son.
