

### TELEPHONE RATES AT HOOD RIVER, OR. TO BE INCREASED

Patrons of Line Incensed at the Raise of Charges and It is Probable That a New Company Will Enter Field.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)  
Hood River, Or., June 3.—Telephone users throughout the city and valley are incensed because of the announcement by the Home Telephone company of the increased rates to go into effect the first day of July. In some instances the rates will be raised 75 cents per month higher than at present. Over 1200 phones are now in use by the Home company and the company figures that if they lose 100 phones as the result of the raise they will still have all the business that the plant can care for.

### UNION VOTES FOR NEW HIGH SCHOOL

Union, Or., June 3.—At the election here yesterday the city voted bond to the amount of \$50,000 for the construction of a new high school building. The proposition carried by a large majority. This is the second election held for the purpose of voting on the proposition. In the first election, which also carried by a large majority, the directors erroneously gave only 19 days notice, instead of 20, as specified by law, and as a result the second election was necessary. Architect and contractors are already in the field for the purpose of making bids on the building and it is expected work will commence soon.

### THOUSAND INVITED TO PRIVATE VIEW OF ART

More than a thousand invited guests are expected to attend the private view at the Museum of Fine Arts this evening at 8 o'clock, when the third annual exhibit of the Portland Architectural club will begin. The big traveling collection of mural paintings, art drawings, and various other fine pieces from the pens and brushes of celebrated decorators and designers, has been augmented by a large number of local exhibits, running from rare oriental rugs and tapestries to art panels in building brick. The exhibition will undoubtedly be the finest and most interesting of the kind ever given in the city. The doors of the museum, Fifth and Taylor streets, will be thrown open Saturday morning at 9 o'clock, to the public, and thereafter the collection may be viewed at any time between 9 a. m. and 5 p. m. through the week, and from 2 p. m. to 5 p. m. on Sunday, until June 13, when the exhibition will close. To assist in defraying the expenses of the museum, an admission fee of 25 cents will be charged during the morning hours and on Monday and Tuesday afternoons, all other afternoons being free.

### CHINESE LEADERS WARN FOREIGNERS

They Are Going to Start Something They Will Not Be Able to Control.

London, June 3.—All legations and consulates of China have been warned of an impending outbreak which it is feared will surpass the Boxer war. Missionary societies here are demanding that England intervene to prevent an uprising and to save the lives of white men and women.

The warning was sent out by Chinese revolutionary leaders, who declare they will be powerless to prevent attacks on foreigners when the uprising occurs. Secret societies throughout China, backed by the "triad," which is a combination of three powerful political organizations, have been preparing for months for an outbreak in the hope of overthrowing the Manchus dynasty and opening up China to commerce and instituting governmental reforms.

It is reported that the revolutionists have been supplied with arms, money and supplies from Chinese revolutionary organizations throughout the world.

Hearings are being held from time to time by the state railroad commission to ascertain the reasonableness of class rates on the Southern Pacific south from Portland. Residents of Medford, represented by H. C. Garnett, member of the Medford Commercial club, have given their testimony.

The hearing was held in the office of Traffic Manager R. B. Miller of the Harriman lines in Oregon. Others present besides those mentioned above, were E. Lane, merchant of Portland, and J. N. Toal, attorney for the transportation committee of the Portland chamber of commerce.

It was intimated by the Southern Oregon representative that Portland jobbers were being protected in the territory south of Portland, but Mr. Miller objected to this and furthermore expressed it as his opinion that Albany, for instance, is not entitled to terminal rates. Albany was particularly mentioned because that name was brought into comparison with Marysville, Cal., which has been granted terminal rates.

The next hearing will be held probably at Salem, upon the required five days' notice.
