

SAN FRANCISCO'S FAIR IS BOUND TO BE GREAT SUCCESS

California Congressman Cites Pleasures of Transcontinental Tour as Favorable to Pacific Coast Exposition.

(Publishers' From Landed Wire.)
Washington, June 4.—Representative Julius Kahn of California, predicts that the commission will act before the end of June upon the site of the national Panama exposition and that San Francisco will be selected as the place where the exposition will be held.

The California legislator admits that the New Orleans boomers put forth some sound arguments but nevertheless he says that he believes the Californians will win out.

When he falls to describing the Panama canal exposition Representative Kahn brings into play all of his eloquence.

Every day he is busily engaged in talking with the members of the senate and the house, urging them to declare in favor of San Francisco.

"Do you know a man or woman," said Representative Kahn today, "who has not said that it was his or her hope to visit California and especially San Francisco some day. Do you not know it is the dream of every school child? It is a wondrous theme, this trip to the Golden Gate, that it has held in its dream grasp the hearts of women and children of all times since it became known that there was a Pacific coast."

Why the Jamestown Fiasco.
The Jamestown exposition should have been a success. It was a fine exposition, but who wanted to see Jamestown? What was there to see, there but the exposition? Many had seen greater exhibitions and they were attracted there by the exposition part, and Jamestown had nothing to offer besides it. But think of the treat ahead of the visitor to San Francisco. Think of the glorious ride across the continent with stops in the beautiful cities of Chicago, Denver, Salt Lake and other places with their marvelous natural wonders. Think of the glories of the great southwest, and the splendid view that can be seen en route. And California itself is a land of dreams and romance. It is perfumed by the orange blossoms and the sunshine is always warm and glad. There is no doubt that there accomplished their greatest marvels."

SAN FRANCISCANS FEAR BOYCOTT BY ENRAGED CHINESE

city," said Gerstle, "and in a general way he told me of the complaints which the Chinese merchants of this city made against the immigration bureau. They are displeased because the offices of the bureau were removed to Angel Island, necessitating, they claim, a loss of much time to business for incoming Chinese merchants."

"In order to get at the facts concerning this alleged treatment of the Chinese, evidence will be laid before me and other members of the chamber early next week. If the Chinese sustain their charges we will take up the matter immediately with the government at Washington and do all we can to head off the proposed boycott."

Boycott Would Be Effective.
"We are promised that no action concerning the boycott will be taken by the merchants of this city until our committee reports its findings. The Chinese are determined to do something, claiming that they have been unjustly treated. There is no doubt that if they declare a boycott it will be effective, for the Chinese merchants in the Orient have a wonderful organization. If a boycott was declared no Chinese merchant would dare to purchase American goods."

Business Men's Excursion Deferred.
The decision reached by the chamber of commerce will affect the proposed visit of a body of local merchants to the Orient, which is scheduled for next month. If it is determined that nothing can be done because the charges made by the local Chinese are found not to be justified, the boycott in all probability will be declared and in that event it will be useless for the local merchants to take the Oriental trip.

STRIKERS YELL "SCAB" AT FASHIONABLE PATRONS

Spokane, Wash., June 4.—Police were called into the strike of the union waiters, waitresses and cooks who are fighting for six days a week and better conditions, late today, when a score or more of strikers gathered outside two of the most prominent restaurants, adjoining each other, near the heart of the city and began howling "Scab" at patrons and help. A squad of armed officers dispersed the mob before any serious damage had been done and Pinkerton and other detectives are stationed in various parts of the city tonight to watch. The strike has been on now three weeks and though nearly all the restaurants in the city were in the combine at the start, about half have acceded to the union's demands and have temporarily affiliated with the union in an effort to down the unfair unions.

DRAYMEN WILL NOT ARBITRATE; ALL UNION MACHINISTS STRIKE

Team Owners to Send East for Employers Call Strikers Fools, Men to Take Places of the Strikers. but Men Say They Are Sure to Win.

Every union machinist in Portland quit work yesterday. Only a half dozen machine shops continued operations, and these had recognized the demand of the union for an eight hour day and a wage of \$3.60. Business was suspended in all the important shops.

A copy of the schedule of hours and wages adopted by the Machinists' union was submitted to the head of every machine shop. The majority of them refused even to treat with the representatives of the union. A hearing of the union's cause was denied by the Manufacturers' association.

"You are making fools of yourselves. You are wrong. Go ahead until you wear yourselves out," was the answer sent by the manufacturers to the workmen.

The ranks of the strikers were greatly increased by yesterday's additions. "We shall win this strike," declared Business Agent Carlson of the machinists. "We have the right and we have the power. The employers cannot get along without us, and it is money lost to them to continue defiance. The strikers in Tacoma, Seattle and Los Angeles are meeting with success. Most of the men are working on union terms in Tacoma. All the railroad machinists are working, but our union has nothing to do with this branch."

The Portland Automobile Dealers' association, in a special meeting held yesterday noon in the Commercial club hall, voted in favor of an open shop for all the machinists in their employ. Many machinists in the last day of the strike have left during the last day or two in sympathy with the strike and the dealers met yesterday to take a vote on the proposition that they might act concertedly. C. F. Wright, president of the association, said last night that all the auto dealers will remain neutral to the strike, neither antagonizing or favoring any one.

ferred to arbitration under the Erdman act. About 22,000 union men were involved, but all the firemen, whether members of the union or not, will get the increase. It is estimated that 27,000 men will benefit by the award.

There are about 22,000 employed on at freight depots and wharves from 7 o'clock in the morning until 6 o'clock at night.

Captain of Police Baty has assigned police control of the strike situation to Sergeant Riley, who is keeping a reserve of 12 men at the station throughout the day, ready for an emergency. The police that they will not be investigators of any violence or riots. They demand only that nonunion men not drive teams for the transfer companies, which are affected by the strike.

The strikers maintain that they are ready to go back to work at any time when the employers agree to the union schedule and recognize the closed shop policy.

BRANDEIS' REMARKABLE MASTERY OF BALLINGER-PINCHOT AFFAIR

Washington, D. C., June 4.—Louis D. Brandeis, attorney for Louis R. Glavin in the Ballinger-Pinchot investigation, has been one of the most important figures in the public eye since the "turn of the year," yet never before has his picture appeared in a daily newspaper or periodical in connection with the case.

He is a Boston lawyer with a brilliant record, and he has given absolutely all of his time free of charge to conducting the case for the conservationists, with one exception—the time required to go to Springfield, Ill., to argue before the supreme court in support of the validity of the Illinois law limiting the hours of employment of women in that state. He won the case, after 20 years of effort by progressive persons to procure recognition in the courts of the humanitarian principle that women who must work shall be protected against oppression by rapacious employers.

For this work, involving months of hard application, Mr. Brandeis accepted no fee—gave his services according to the tenets of Blackstone, who taught that a lawyer primarily was a servant of the common weal, and owed to society his every possible effort to uplift.

The unusual feature, however, is that none of these facts were given by Mr. Brandeis, when he was asked for his photo for the Ballinger-Pinchot case, and simply explained how he got into the case.

"January 31 received a telegram, asking me to go to New York to confer regarding the Ballinger case. I went, and the next day tentatively accepted the task; then I saw some clients for whom I was to begin an important case in court to last a month, got their consent to turn over that case to my partner, and began the study of the testimony pertaining to the case here at once, and two weeks later the hearings began. Everyone knows what has happened since that time."

Has Learned Land Law.
It is said that when Mr. Brandeis took up the study of the case, he scarcely knew a land location from an entry; his practice had been in New England, where, of course, Uncle Sam hasn't a rod of public domain remaining. Yet, to the astonishment of everyone who heard him, after the investigation had begun, and without notice that it would be required of him, he passed in the taking of Glavin's testimony, and without a line of notes before him, outlined the whole case, giving names, dates, amounts and facts with error in no slightest detail. It was pronounced to be one of the most remarkable performances of quick absorption of previously unfamiliar facts and of mastering a line of practice never before brought to his attention.

Mr. Brandeis was asked, at the conclusion of the hearings: "Were you a member of the National Conservation association before you got into this case?"

"No," he answered, "I was working for the conservation of human resources. Now, of course, that means the same thing, as conservation in its broadest interpretation comprehends conservation of human resources, as well as conservation of natural resources that human resources may be conserved."

It has been noted that the Boston lawyer is somewhat of a dramatist. Late in the hearings, he permitted the

proceedings to drag, until even his friends were saying the case was falling down. Then, by clever work, he extorted admissions from high officials in the last days of the testimony-taking, and that which seemed destined to be a colorless ending because of technicality in its exciting character, culminating in the "lifting of the lid" by Stenographer Fred Kerby.

BENSON PRODUCES TAME BERRY WITH FLAVOR OF WILD

Horticulturists of Portland are interested in a new species of strawberry which has been developed by C. A. Benson of Silverton. Mr. Benson, who is a large berry grower, has succeeded in producing a fruit that has all the flavor of the wild strawberry and the size of the domestic berry. He obtained the new fruit production by crossing pollen of the wild berry blossoms and those of the cultivated berry. The new addition to the berry crop will be known as "Benson's Oregonian."
