

PROGRESSIVES TO BATTLE AGAINST REGULARS IN IOWA

First Real Test of Strength in
Tomorrow's Primaries; May
Exert Influence on Other
States.

Des Moines, Iowa, June 6.—Politicians who have been watching for the national drift in Republican politics will await with keen interest the results of the Republican primaries to be held throughout Iowa tomorrow. It will afford the first real test of strength between the regulars and progressives and will doubtless exert considerable influence upon the Republican party conventions to be held later in Minnesota, Wisconsin and other states of the middle west.

The fight between the regulars and progressives for control of the state convention has been one of the fiercest ever known in Iowa politics. Iowa is now regarded as a progressive state. Her senators took the lead in the tariff fight, and were backed by insurgent congressmen from several districts. If the progressives succeed in controlling the state convention, the Taft administration is not likely to be endorsed, excepting possibly in the general terms, and Senators Dooliver and Cummins will be held up as reflecting perfectly the will of the Republican party in Iowa. If the regulars gain control, the Taft administration will be endorsed generally and specifically, and the work of the two senators thus discredited.

Extend Fight to State.
The fight between the rival factions is general all along the line. The more conservative of the progressive leaders were inclined to confine the fight to members of congress and to leave the state officers alone, but after considerable hesitation they yielded to the demand of the rank and file to extend the fight to the state officers. In pursuance of this plan former Lieutenant Warren Gash has been brought out as the progressive candidate for governor in opposition to Governor B. F. Carroll, who is making the fight of his political career for re-nomination.

But the most spectacular contents of all are those that are being made to return insurgent congressmen to Washington. Three districts in Iowa are conspicuously represented by Cannon Republicans. Walter L. Smith, a member of the old Cannon rules committee, represents the Ninth district, Captain J. A. T. Hull, chairman of the military committee in the house, represents the Seventh district, and C. A. Kennedy represents the First district. All supported Cannon measures and all voted for the Payne tariff bill. The other districts in Iowa, except the Eighth, which is represented by a Democrat, are progressive.

All Have Worthy Opponents.
In the Ninth district Congressman Smith is opposed for reelection on the ground that he is a Cannon man. In H. W. Byrnes he has a foe more worthy of his steel. Mr. Byrnes has served two terms as attorney general of Iowa, and it is believed by the progressives that he is as strong a candidate as could be put up.

In the Seventh district, Captain Hull is opposed by Judge S. F. Prouty, who came within 40 votes of securing the nomination at the last primaries. He is a close friend and adviser of Senator Cummins.

Captain Hull, who has represented the Seventh district for 20 years, is strongly entrenched in his political position. As chairman of the committee on military affairs, he has secured for Des Moines one of the finest military posts in the country. In addition he secured last summer the great military tournament for Des Moines.

But in spite of this, the progressives believe he will be defeated. At a banquet here last winter Senator Cummins declared that even if Captain Hull had been able to do much for Des Moines by making it a military center, he had lacked in other respects which might entitle him to reelection.

The contest against Congressman Kennedy in the First district, though it has not attracted so much attention, is regarded as almost as important as the fights in the Ninth and Seventh districts. S. Brookhart, a radical insurgent, is making the race against Mr. Kennedy.

PAYS \$12,000 FOR 40 ACRES GROVE LAND

Forest Grove, Or., June 6.—Forty acres of the Atwell fruit orchard located two miles southwest of this city has been sold to Alvin B. Craft, of Portland, for a consideration of \$12,000. Mr. Craft is a grain buyer and for many years was a farmer of eastern Oregon. He owns apple orchards in the Mosier apple district, and pronounces the Atwell orchard to be as fine as the Hood River orchards. The Atwell orchard is located on a high hill or ridge which contains several hundred acres, and in fact coming into prominence as an ideal site for orchards. John F. Forbis of Portland has a fruit and dairy farm of 385 acres on this ridge, and Professors C. E. Brady and H. D. Souder of O. A. C. have purchased land in the same locality and will set out orchards. Mr. Atwell retains 50 acres of his fruit lands, part already in young trees, and the balance of which will probably be planted to prunes.

NEWSPAPER DEMANDS THAT LORIMER GET OUT

O. HENRY, WRITER OF SHORT STORIES, CALLED BY DEATH

William Sidney Porter His Real
Name — Traveled Widely,
Wrought at Many Trades—
Death Unexpected.

New York, June 6.—The funeral of William Sidney Porter who wrote under the pen name of "O. Henry," will be held tomorrow from "the little church around the corner." Interment will be at Asheville, N. C. The writer died yesterday at the Polytechnic hospital after an operation.

O. Henry was known throughout the land to lovers of short stories. He began writing for a newspaper in Texas. Later he wrote Sunday stories for a New York paper and after that gained fame as a short story writer for magazines. Before he became successful as a writer Porter was a cowboy, sheepherder, druggist and traveler.

Indirectly through his journeys Porter took his pen name of O. Henry. While living in Central America Porter acquired the easy going ways of the residents. When he returned and began story writing the dolce far niente habit was strong, and viewing his full name, William Sidney Porter, in that light he concluded that to write it and to read it would require too much exertion.

Thereupon Porter resolved to acquire a terse cognomen. While experimenting he discovered that the easiest letter in the alphabet for him to write was "O." Then he decided that "Henry" was a brief enough last name and as O. Henry he is known to thousands of readers.

Porter's death was unexpected. Mrs. Porter had been summoned when his condition changed for the worse but she did not arrive until after he had passed away.

OREGON LAND CO. SEEKS INJUNCTION

Attempt to Stop Railroad Construction in East End Is
Not Successful.

Vale, Or., June 6.—Construction trains of the Malheur Valley railroad are now running 10 miles toward the new town of Brogan, which is situated 24 miles north of Vale. According to a statement of Engineer D. H. Ashton, the rails could be laid to Brogan within the next 10 days if railroad laborers could be secured. Men are quitting every day and agents are after new gangs. Under present conditions, Mr. Ashton states, Brogan will not be reached before July 1.

Injunction Not Served.
The Malheur Valley railroad right of way passes through the Eastern Oregon land company's holdings and although an agreement was made with the Eastern Oregon company, the land company through United States Marshal McDonald, Saturday attempted to serve an injunction on the railroad officials. When asked relative to the injunction, Engineer Ashton stated that work would go on without interruption so far as he was cognizant. "They tried to locate the railroad officials here, but did not find any," he declared. "The men were served," said Ashton.
Ed O'Donnell, one of the promoters of the Willow river irrigation project, who obtained the right of way for the railroad through the Eastern Oregon land company's holdings, yesterday stated that it was a scheme to hold up the Willow River irrigation company for water.

PEEPING TOM FOUND HANGING FROM TREE

Seattle, June 6.—Women and children of Youngstown, a suburb, who have fled inside at nightfall for the past three weeks may venture out again tonight, their fear of a "peeping Tom" dispelled.
As a small posse was returning from a search for the man in the woods last night they discovered the body of a man hanging from a tree tied by a piece of heavy wrapping cord.
The man's pockets were stuffed with hay and his body was covered with only a pair of overalls and a working shirt. The general appearance of the body confirmed the belief that the man was insane, and is the same that has terrorized the timid of the neighborhood for weeks.

TOLEDO VOTES TO BOND FOR SCHOOL

MAN IS KIDNAPED AND THEN ROBBED

Seattle Citizen Tells Lurid Tale
and Police Believe Him—
Robbers Chauffeurs.

Seattle, June 6.—F. J. Wilson declares today that he was kidnaped at one of the city's busiest corners Sunday morning, thrown into an automobile, drugged, robbed of everything on him and left unconscious in the brush back of a brewery in the southern part of the city.
Wilson was standing at the corner of Yeater Way and Occidental when two men alighted from an automobile, approached him and asked the time. He looked at his watch, he was seized and thrown into the car, he declares. One of the men threw a handkerchief over his face, supposed to have been soaked in chloroform, and Wilson knew no more until he awoke in the brush. His gold watch, a diamond pin, a pocket book containing valuable papers and a few dollars in cash were missing. The police are inclined to believe his story. Wilson thinks the men were chauffeurs.

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GRAND CENTRAL STATION PASSES

New York, June 6.—The Grand Central railway station, built in 1911, will be closed at midnight tonight. Monday the work of raising the structure will begin. The tearing away of the main part of the old station is the beginning of the last part of the work of erecting a new station, one of the biggest in the east. The work, which has been going on for months, is considered one of the biggest feats in terminal construction ever undertaken by railroad engineers. The new station has been under process of construction on the site of the old without interrupting the train service. The station has been in constant use. The wreckage system has been completed and a signal added to the old station was built which will be used while the old station is being torn away and the new one constructed. The Grand Central station is used by the New York Central and the New York, New Haven and Hartford roads. Besides the trunk line trains an enormous suburban traffic is handled through the station.
