## NURSERY HINTS

### What Should a Baby Weigh.

**O**F COURSE, there can be no fixed weight even for a perfectly healthy child, as there is as much variation at birth as afterward. Some children are born small, and yet are quite healthy and perfectly developed. The great thing is for the child to look plump and well, and to increase in weight steadily and consistently.

Still, it is useful to know what an average healthy baby weighs at certain ages. When born he should be about seven pounds. By the end of the first week a couple of ounces will probably be lost, but the following week will see a gain of four ounces. Each succeeding week the child should put on four or six ounces, and by the time he is three months old he should weigh about 11 pounds, by the fifth month about 14 pounds, by the sixth month about 16 pounds, and by the end of the first year a baby should weigh something like 20 or 21 pounds.

The next two years see less rapid increase, for a well developed 2-year-old child does not usually weigh much more than 30 pounds, and each subsequent year up to the seventh will see about four or five pounds added to the child's weight.

### Avoid Making Baby Perform.

Don't try to make a baby show off or "take notice" too early; he will only suffer for it later on. Babies under 3 months old should be kept as quiet as possible, and the fewer people they see the better.

### Children May Be Too Chubby.

Fat children are not necessarily healthy, but children should be round and plump and rosy. Plenty of milk is the best food, whilst excess of patent foods often makes a child over fat and puffy and pale, because they, as a rule, contain so much starch.

### One Possible Cause of Squinting.

When a baby is lying on the lap no one should be allowed to talk to him over his head from the back, as this is frequently the cause of squinting.

### Don't Tamper With Eyelashes.

The baby's eyelashes should not be tampered with in any way. A little vaseline gently applied to the edge of the lids is the only safe application to encourage growth of lashes.

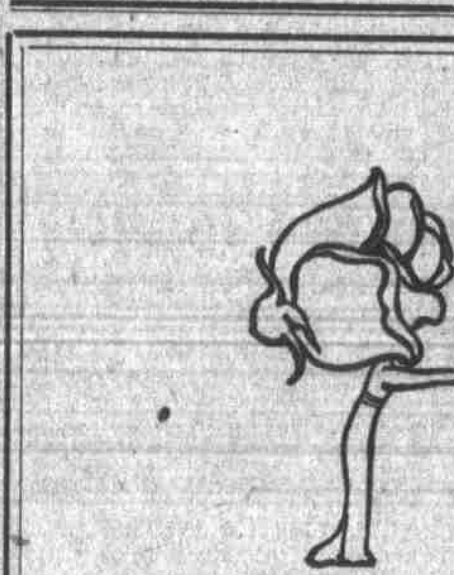

The large flat hat is a beautiful model upon which the hat strings can be placed with impunity. The drooping mushroom shape, with its quaint old-fashioned

Silk and chiffon, being more supple, are treated in a different way. They hang loosely from the sides of the shape, and are knotted and caught to the corsage. Some models have the bands tied at the back—a line that must be discreetly adopted.

It is needless to say that "beauty is its own excuse for being," for the hat does not rely upon the tied bands for its security. Modern women will never relinquish their hold on the villainous hairpin. So if you wish to carry out a note of your costume that is an echo of older times, and if your features are suited to the style, tie your hat with the bands.

**Origin of Sally Lunn.** EVERYONE knows what a Sally Lunn is, but few people have any idea how that particularly nice kind of teacake got its name. Sally Lunn was a Bath (England) celebrity who kept a cake shop which was a favorite resort for both youth and age in the old west country town. Sally originally carried out her cakes, morning and evening, in a basket with a white cover. Later on her small shop in Lilliput alley became a favorite haunt, and Dalmer, a baker and musician, seeing that it was a good thing, bought the business, composed a song, and set it to music. ## CENSUS SHOWS BIG GROWTH IN VALLEY

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Bristol, Wash., June 6.—United States census returns for the town of White Salmon and Binger and Fruit Valley precincts will show a tremendous growth in land development as well as in population in the past ten years. Where in 1900 there were about 200 people in the three precincts, which were then embraced in Fruit Valley precinct, there are now about 1400. Of these, perhaps, 200 are located in Binger precinct, while the remainder, it is closely estimated, are about equally divided between the town of White Salmon and Fruit Valley precinct, which surrounds the town on three sides.

In 1900 there were a few ranches scattered over a large area; now there are 500 or more, separate tracts set to fruit trees, a large part of which will first come into bearing this year. These tracts vary in size from five to 200 acres.

**New Prince of Wales Scheduled.** (United Press Lined Wire.) London, June 6.—The Duke of Cornwall will be created Prince of Wales probably on June 6, the sixteenth anniversary of his birth. The towns of Cardiff and Carnarvon will contend for the honor of the event if the creation takes place in Wales.

## CURTISS WILL MAKE LAKE SHORE FLIGHT

Cleveland, Ohio, June 6.—Glen Curtiss will attempt to fly in his aeroplane from Cleveland to Put-in-Bay or Detroit some time next month. For this feat he has been offered \$10,000 by John F. Farrell, Jr., owner of a syndicate of purses, with the provision that he start the flight in Farrell's park in Cleveland. According to George Gibbs, personal representative of Curtiss, Otto Carmichael of Detroit offers to give the aviator several thousand dollars to land in Detroit during the week of July 13, when the national convention of Elks is in session.
