

DEATH'S SHADOW PARALYZES VOICE OF ECHO'S ECHOES

Eastern Oregon Publication
Faces Suspension Because
Owner's Parent Is Dying at
Duluth, Minn.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Portland, Or., June 4.—"Echo's Echoes," the clever publication that has "moulded public opinion" at Echo for several months, faces the first crisis in its prosperous career. Mr. and Mrs. Lewis E. Ward, respectively editor and manager, have been summoned to Duluth, Minn., to the bedside of Mrs. Ward's father, Judge McGindley, who is dying, and who has bequeathed to his daughter and son-in-law his property, interests, valued at \$200,000. He has made Mr. Ward president and general manager of his estate, which is incor-

porated, and Mrs. Ward secretary and treasurer.
Leth to leave the community that has through financial and moral support, placed them in affluent circumstances without first providing for the continuation of the newspaper's publication, Mr. and Mrs. Ward have sought to secure competent successors. But even though the plan has been offered for sale at a sacrifice, the scarcity of buyers still prevails.
Determined to reach the bedside of their father before death shall have intervened, Mr. and Mrs. Ward have decided to "close up shop." This action leaves Echo without a newspaper, a circumstance which the citizens regret immeasurably.

DECIDES BROADWAY BRIDGE CASE IN FAVOR OF PEOPLE

revealing the involved pleading in the amended complaint, said the court, "it was difficult to separate the recitals and conclusions of law from the matter properly alleged."
Judge Burnett caused a smile to go round the courtroom by enumerating the steps by which Dunway held the Broadway bridge amendment to be contrary to the United States constitution. He said the reasoning thus led by a contention from the city ordinance to the United States constitution, and the supreme court of Oregon has sustained the initiative and referendum powers in the Kaddery case.
The court held that proceedings by the city council calling for election on

the Broadway bridge before the date finally chosen had lapsed before the vote was taken, and did not invalidate it. So far as the objection based on alleged differences at different times in the description of the bridge and its location was concerned, Judge Burnett said this argument was one to be made on the hearing, but not to be heard in court. The people have the right to submit a vague ordinance if they so desire, he said.

Judge Burnett said it would be presumed the city attorney provided the ballot title as required by the city ordinance. The ballot title was fairly descriptive, the court said, so that he who runs may read. It was also held the people had a right to delegate the exact location of the bridge to the executive board.

There was a touch of sarcasm in the court's comment on Dunway's claim that the amendment providing for the bridge was not sufficiently definite. The court said he supposed an ordinance could have been passed fixing the weight of the eye beams of the bridge, the live load, the dead load, and many other things, but this was not done and it was not necessary.
In conclusion, Judge Burnett said he coincided with the earlier decision of three Multnomah circuit judges in sustaining a demurrer to Dunway's original complaint, not merely because it preceded the present hearing, but because it was founded in reason and entitled to respect.

No Hope for Statehood Bill.
Washington, June 4.—Friends of the statehood bill conceded this morning that there was practically no hope of the bill's passing at this session.

COURT TO PASS ON GYPSY MARRIAGES

Wandering Couples Must Show
Legal Knot or Face
Prosecution.

"The gypsy marriage law will not go in Portland," declared Attorney Frank Hennessy, deputy district attorney, this morning, in the municipal court, when the cases against John and Louis Adams were called. The two men are charged by the common law wife of Louis Adams with assaulting her, and other forms of cruelty.
"Every gypsy in the camp out there is violating the law, and will be arrested. If they cannot show marriage certificates or prove they are legally married, charges of lewd cohabitation will be filed tomorrow," said Hennessy. "The Egyptian marriage law may be all right among the pyramids, but not in Portland. If we allow such things here, Portland would soon be turned into a place like the streets of Cairo."

Bring in All Gypsies.
Deputy District Attorney Hennessy further ordered the police to bring in

all gypsies Tuesday, and take them before Judge Bennett. They are camped at South Portland, and the women tell fortunes in the north end.
Marie Hanfwich made charges Friday against her husband, John Adams, and his father, Louis Adams. The two men were arrested yesterday and are held in the city jail. She charged that Louis Adams stole her four years ago while they were camped at St. Paul, Minn. Her father is with the band, and this morning was in court. He has vest buttons made from 110 gold coins.

Mary Leahan, recognized queen of the gypsies, is the mother of 21 children. There are 15 boys and five girls. All are living. She has had two husbands. The woman has a letter to ex-President Roosevelt, which is signed by Mayor James B. Brown of Nashville, Tenn.
She also has letters from former Governor Gooding of Idaho, Cutler of Utah and Patterson of Tennessee. Another letter from Governor Haskell of Oklahoma states she is a woman of good character. The woman further has introductory letters from many mayors and sheriffs in the south.

HARVEY TAKES FRENCH LEAVE OF ROCKPILE

Sheriff Stevens received a telephone message early this morning saying that Harry Harvey had escaped from the stockade at Kelly Butte. The sheriff immediately organized a posse and was ready to start in pursuit of the escaped convict when he received a second message telling of the capture of the runaway prisoner. Harvey, who is serving a 160 day sentence for larceny, had concealed himself among the boulders

HABEAS CORPUS IN BROWNE CASE

Attorney for Alleged Briber Re-
buked by Court for Abusive
Language.

Chicago, June 4.—So bitterly attacking District Attorney Wayman and the Chicago newspapers that the court finally ordered him to eliminate personalities, ex-Judge Elbridge Hanney today argued for Lee O'Neil Browne in the habeas corpus proceedings brought to test the jurisdiction of the Chicago courts in relation to the bribery charges in connection with the election of William Lorimer to the United States senate.
As a result of the habeas corpus proceedings brought Saturday Browne's trial for bribery will be delayed several days. The case has been set for hearing today before Judge McBurney. A postponement was granted pending the decision of Judge Scanlan in the present hearing.
Wayman replied to Hanney. It is thought the decision will not be handed down for several days.

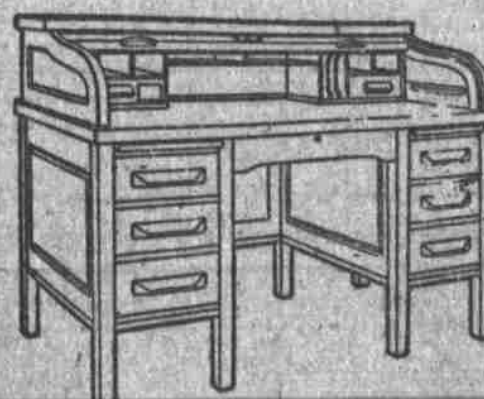
