Chief Ends His Life—Rather than submit to arrest and be returned to Portland on a lacy charge, Clyde Hill took his own life in a hotel at Baraboo, Wis., Saturday afternoon. Police had gone to the place to arrest him. Hill was wanted here for stealing jewelry from Mrs. Charles Dickie, 214 Morrison street, last April. Hill came to Portland and was visiting with the Dickie family. The jewelry consisted of heirlooms and was valued at \$150. He immediately left Portland, and went to the home of his parents at Baraboo. When he discovered the authorities were on his trail, he left the home and went to the hotel, where he killed himself. The marshal at Baraboo notified Captain Moore yesterday of the act.

Falls From Window—The infant son of Michael Salvino, 552 1/2 Front street, fell from the second story of the family home yesterday afternoon and suffered a broken hip and arm. The child is not expected to live. Mrs. Frances Le Grand, living in the room below, saw the child fall. When she reached the side it was unconscious. Patrolman Stark Lytle warned the parents several times that the child would fall from the window, but they paid no attention to the warning. The child is nine months old.

Seattle Man Hurt—William T. Elwell, 1528 Second street, West Seattle, who was injured Saturday afternoon in an automobile accident at Mount Scott, is still at the Good Samaritan hospital. His left ankle was fractured in two places. The accident happened when the driver of the machine lost control of the steering gear. The machine ran into a bank. Elwell jumped from the machine. The driver was uninjured. Elwell is a real estate dealer. He was looking over Portland real estate.

Young Woman in Trouble—Clara Weyman, a 30 year old girl, left her home at Berkeley, Cal., and came to Portland two weeks ago to get employment. Upon failure to do so, she resorted to visiting the grill rooms, where she met several men. Saturday evening, Anton Thompson complained to the police that the girl had taken \$20 and returned to give it up. She was arrested in a rooming house at Second and Yamhill streets, and is held in the city jail.

Says He Was Drunk—A fine of \$10 was imposed upon Peter Kahn, contractor, this morning in the municipal court for insulting two women yesterday in a rooming house at 282 1/2 Hawthorne avenue. The women were Mrs. C. B. McCarthy and Mrs. P. K. Smith. The husbands of the women called Kahn in the rooming house, and held him until the policeman arrived. Kahn pleaded that he was drunk.

SORRY THAT PLAN TO KILL FAILED

Italian Who Made Attempts to Wreck Cars Is Willing to Go to Prison.

"I no care for myself, no care for people. I put stones on trestle so many people killed. If I put them on level ground, maybe not many be hurt. Sunday lots of people travel, open cars, and run fast. Then I could find good place for rocks and kill many. If you no caught me."

Thus in a rambling statement to Deputy Sheriff Archie Leonard and W. P. Lillis, who arrested him Saturday night while he was rolling large rocks on the O. W. P. tracks at the end of a trestle near Niekum, where the O. W. P. crosses the Southern Pacific, did Frank Rinaldo tell of his plans for wholesale murder yesterday. He speaks broken English, and an interpreter is required to converse satisfactorily with him.

Both Leonard and Lillis declare Rinaldo is sane, but possessed of a desire to kill in revenge for a fatal wrong. They believe he is a desperate man of the anarchist type. Rinaldo frequently declares he does not care what becomes of him, and that he is well pleased to go to jail. His only regret is that his three attempts to wreck trains on the Southern Pacific and O. W. P. were failures.

At one time Rinaldo said he wanted to get even with the court. At another he said his leg was hurt by the Southern Pacific while he was a member of a construction gang. Again, he says he was moved to vengeance on the world at large because he had been wrongly accused of making an assault upon a 12-year-old Italian girl, after which he was ill treated by others of his race.

Rinaldo has signed a written confession and seems greatly pleased with the prospect of a term in the penitentiary. It is possible the courts will order an examination as to his sanity.

BRIDGE NEGOTIATIONS OBJECT OF MEETING

The advisability of adopting propositions made by the railroad interests in the roadway bridge negotiations will be discussed at a special meeting of representatives from east side improvement leagues, to be held tonight in the office of Judge M. G. Munly, Wells Fargo building. The committee consists of D. L. Povey, Joseph Buchtel, H. E. Riddell, E. S. Myers, H. Veran and H. Waterholter.

Propositions made by the O. R. & N. and Northern Pacific companies yielding rights of way over their properties in return for concessions from the city, have not been formally adopted by the city council. It was thought desirable by members of the council that some expression be received from the people before any formal action should be taken. Representatives of the North East side improvement association and other east side organizations will endeavor to arrive at some definite recommendation which they will submit to the council for its guidance.

"We did not arrive at any conclusion in this matter at our meeting Friday night because we did not think the people were sufficiently well informed to take any definite stand either for or against acceptance of the proposals," said Judge Munly this morning.

"Neither did we, as it was reported, go on record in opposition to the city's acquisition of Council Crest. The matter was but little discussed and failure to pass resolutions in favor of the purchase only came about because a representative from the Crest whom we expected to lay the matter before us did not appear."
