

HOLIDAY AUDIENCE ENJOYS VAUDEVILLE

This Week's Bill at Orpheum
Has a Number of Good
Features.

An audience in holiday mood that was not disposed to be too exacting in its demands on those whose business it is to entertain, greeted the Festival week bill at the Orpheum last night, gave generous applause to several extremely mediocre acts; became enthusiastic over others and hurled a riot of applause at Peter Donald and Meta Carson, the Scotch comedian and his bonnie lassie, who are again presenting "Alex McLean's Dream."

That Portland appreciates this clever Scot, whose humor is inimitable, was evidenced by the enthusiastic reception accorded him; and that he in turn enjoys Portland was appropriately expressed in the curtain speech he was compelled to make. At any rate, prior to the appearance of this comedian in plays, the audience had had little else than the novelty of a "dog" act to stimulate its interest.

Mermals Come Last.
The closing act on the week's bill takes the money for grace and novelty, for Maud and Gladys Finney, as "The Mermals," made the best of the limited possibilities of a six by nine glass tank of water. Of splendid physical proportions, the two Finneys perform a series of under water stunts in full view of the audience that represent a new line of human effort in the vaudeville business.

Something new by way of a dog act is presented by Clow Zerk's canine comedians. All kinds and conditions of dogs are loosed upon the stage and at the direction of a trainer do a number of turns that are a credit to the intelligence of dogdom.

What seems to be a whole flock of people is drafted into service by Lewis McCord to present a breezy playlet, "Winning on Wind." The embarrassment of a prospective bridegroom posing as a man of wealth; the rantings of an obese mother-in-law-to-be and the shiny bald head of him who in her husband make possible the fun in the act, which races through at frantic pace.

La Toy Brothers as comedy acrobats open the bill and through a certain amount of ability are able to make up the handicap imposed by the fact that the newness of such a turn has long since been exhausted.

Miss Agnes Maher, as the American Tommy Atkins, is up on her toes most of the time while prancing through her act and withal performs some feats that do not appeal in a measure that represents the difficulty of their performance. R. J. Hamilton, banjo soloist, completes the bill. Mr. Hamilton would have it known that he is different from the rest, but this difference can hardly be said to be cast in his favor.

**MAN ROLLS FROM BED
AND FALLS TO DEATH**
While tumbling in his sleep this morning at 3:30 o'clock in a room on the third floor of the Bagley house, Third and Burnside streets, Joseph Stretch, employed by Gleibisch & Joplin, fell to the sidewalk and died an hour later at the St. Vincent hospital. Thomas McNeamera, his room mate, did not know the man had fallen until Patrolman Epps broke open the door.

According to the best information, the two men went to the room about midnight. Both had been drinking. Stretch slept beside the window, which was open, and no protection in the way of screening or grating. When Patrolman Epps reached his side, he was still able to talk. He said he must have rolled over in bed and fallen through the window, for he did not awaken until he hit the sidewalk. The man was suffering intense pain. He asked to be taken to a hospital.

His right arm and leg were broken and his chest badly mangled. He died an hour later. He had worked for the contracting firm for two years.

**COURT HOLDS MAN WHO
TRIES TO KILL MANY**
Frank Rinaldo, the Italian who made two attempts to wreck a Casadero car at Berkeley station, was given a preliminary hearing yesterday afternoon before Judge Olson of the justice court, who held the man to await the action of the grand jury. From the man's own testimony it is judged that he is mentally deranged.

Rinaldo was arrested Saturday night by W. P. Lillis, special agent for the railway company, and Archie Leonard, deputy sheriff. Rinaldo said he was determined to wreck a train at the Berkeley station. In failing two times,

13 NEW PRECINCTS FOR LANE COUNTY

Eugene, Or., June 7.—The commissioners' court of Lane county has created 13 new precincts in the county, making 43 now instead of 30 as before. Eugene is divided into eight instead of four. Springfield is divided into two instead of one. Cottage Grove will have four instead of two, and other changes are as follows: Armitage created out of a part of Springfield; Leaburg created out of a part of Galt Creek; Glenada created out of a part of Florence; Disston created out of a part of Bohemian; Durona created out of a part of Cottage Grove; Creswell divided into two precincts instead of one, and Marcola created out of a part of Mohawk.

AUTOISTS INJURED WHEN WHEEL BREAKS

Athens, Or., June 7.—Five autoists were injured here Sunday night. The car was being driven rapidly around a short turn when one of the wheels broke, throwing the passengers, all of whom were men, a distance of about 20 feet into a wheat field. Henry Booser and Ralph Cannon were thrown into a barbed wire fence and very narrowly escaped fatal injuries. Both received dangerous cuts about the face and neck. They were hurried to a physician who took 12 stitches in each one's anatomy. The rest of the party, York Dell, James Bryan and Henry Miller, were thrown clear over the fence and escaped with bruises.
