To Discuss Bridge Case.—A second meeting to discuss terms of the proposals made the city by the railroad interests in the Broadway bridge negotiations will be held by east side citizens in the office of F. S. Myers, 327 Oak street, tonight. Members of the North East Side Improvement association who met in Judge Munly's office last night were unable to reach any agreement. A motion recommending acceptance by the city council of the terms proposed by the railroad interests was not put. Judge Munly saying that he desired other east side citizens to be heard from before formal action is taken. Councilmen Menefee objected to this, and arrangements to hold the second meeting were made, notwithstanding.

Gypsies Ordered to Move.—All members of the gypsy camp at South Portland were ordered to get outside the city limits this morning by Chief of Police Cox. This order followed the hearing in the municipal court on the charges against Louis Adams, who was accused of beating his common law wife, Marie Kozlovitch. The couple were fighting over their seven-month-old child. He was fined \$25. Charges of lewd cohabitation were to be placed against them this morning by Deputy District Attorney Hennessy, but the leaders of the gypsy bands promised to get out of the city.

Consulate Meeting.—Nineteen countries will be represented at the annual banquet of foreign consuls and attaches of consulates in this city Thursday evening. The foreign representatives will arrive here tomorrow from the Puget sound cities and Thursday evening the banquet will be held at the Imperial. The committee of arrangement is composed of E. M. Cederbergh, Norwegian vice consul; J. W. Matthes, Dutch vice consul; and Y. Numano, Japanese vice consul.

Display of Roses.—A fine display of rose pictures, by local artists, will be a feature of the "Rose Day" program at the Woman's club, Woodland street, craft hall, Tenth and Taylor streets, Friday afternoon. The pictures will be in place at 1 o'clock and all interested are invited to call and see them. The program announced for 3 o'clock will be given at 2 on account of the festive parade. Members may bring guests free of charge.

South Portland cars will switch at Third and Jefferson streets. Depot and Morrison cars will switch at Seventh and Morrison streets. Portland Heights, Twenty-third street and Tenth street cars will switch at Seventh and Washington streets.

Chops Finger.—Deputy City Engineer Merwin Pugh is carrying his hand in a sling as the result of a painful accident last Friday evening. Mr. Pugh was splitting kindling with a hatchet when he missed his aim at a stick which he was holding with his left hand and severed the index finger of that hand at the middle joint.

Scriber Given Time to Appeal.—J. W. Scriber, convicted cashier of the defunct Farmers' & Traders' National bank of La Grande, Or., which institution he was accused of wrecking, has been allowed 30 days in which to decide whether or not he will take an appeal. Scriber is out under bond.

Simpson Acquitted.—Frank Simpson was acquitted on a larceny charge in the circuit court yesterday afternoon. The testimony was heard by a jury in Judge Gantenbein's department. Simpson was accused of stealing \$50 from G. Verhaeghan, whom he met in a saloon in the north end. While they were playing cards, Verhaeghan said, Simpson's

hand wandered into his pocket. In the municipal court Simpson was convicted and given 150 days in jail.

Oaks to Sell Liquor.—Unless the city council overrides the liquor license committee liquor will be sold hereafter at the Oaks restaurant. The committee yesterday granted the proprietor of the eating place at the amusement resort up the river a license to sell intoxicants with meals.
