

WINDOWS ALSO IN HOLIDAY ATTIRE

Stores Vie With Each Other in
Arranging Pretty Displays
for the Festival.

Among the features of the decorations in honor of Rose Festival week are the window displays of some of the large stores. Several of the larger concerns apparently are vying with each other in putting in elegant window decorations. With more people on the streets than at any other time of year, the mercantile establishments throughout the city find it profitable to make their establishments look as attractive as possible, and hence are sparing no pains to make the windows, the connecting link between the public and trade, look as beautiful and artistic as possible.

The large establishments are naturally making the most pretentious window displays, but the small stores throughout the city are also falling in line, adding to the appearance of industry over the whole business portion of the city.

Grocers Decorate.
Acting on a vote at the last meeting of the Portland Retail Grocers' association, most of the grocers throughout the city are doing their share of decorating and are making their windows as attractive as possible.

Among the best window displays in the city are in the Meier & Frank and Lipman, Wolfe and company stores. These windows show the fine points of the decorators' art, leaving out the gaudy effect and bringing out the aesthetic effect.

On both Third and Washington streets the windows of the Lipman, Wolfe and company store are attractively lined with lattice work, running along the upper rear side and interwoven with sprays of red and white roses. Outside of the windows lining the inside of the sidewalk are fresh growing roses and geraniums.

On the Fifth street side of the Meier & Frank store, in the windows containing ladies' white dresses and summer hats, arranged artistically, red and white artificial roses and green plants are very tastefully placed. The general effect is one of coolness and Oregon's good old summer time.

Does Little Decorating.
On account of the sales going on, not much attempt has been made to decorate the Olds, Wortman & King windows. One window on the Fifth street side, however, is handsomely decorated with Rose Festival pennants and bunting in the Rose Festival colors, with roses inserted. The J. K. Gill company has probably the most original window of any. The window is provided with a fresh green lawn, on which are growing roses, geraniums and evergreens, and in the middle of which is a pond.

The large window in the Tull & Gibbs store, containing a big bell made of pink and cream colored roses, and other tasteful arrangements shows the result of considerable work and thought. Captain William Gadsby, of William Gadsby & Sons has adopted a unique and original method of display. He has spread valuable carpets on the sidewalk in front of the store and on this every half hour during the day parades John Smith, a Highland bagpipe player and dancer of fame.

Attracts Crowd.
To the tune of "Cook 'o the North" and "The Campbells Are Coming" and other plaintive Scotch tunes he marches up and down along the line of carpets 10 minutes at a time, attracting his share of the festival crowd.

In front of Ben Sellink's is a particularly attractive array of ferns and roses. The Kilham Stationery and Printing company has decorated one of its windows with lattice work neatly interwoven with roses. Two other attractive window displays are those displayed by Ballou & Wright and Sherman, Clay and company.

Probably the best entrance decoration in the city is that at the Commercial club. Japanese lanterns and parasols and Rose Festival pennants are arranged in the form of an arbor and over all rests an American flag.

COUNCIL GRANTS DUCHAMP PERMIT

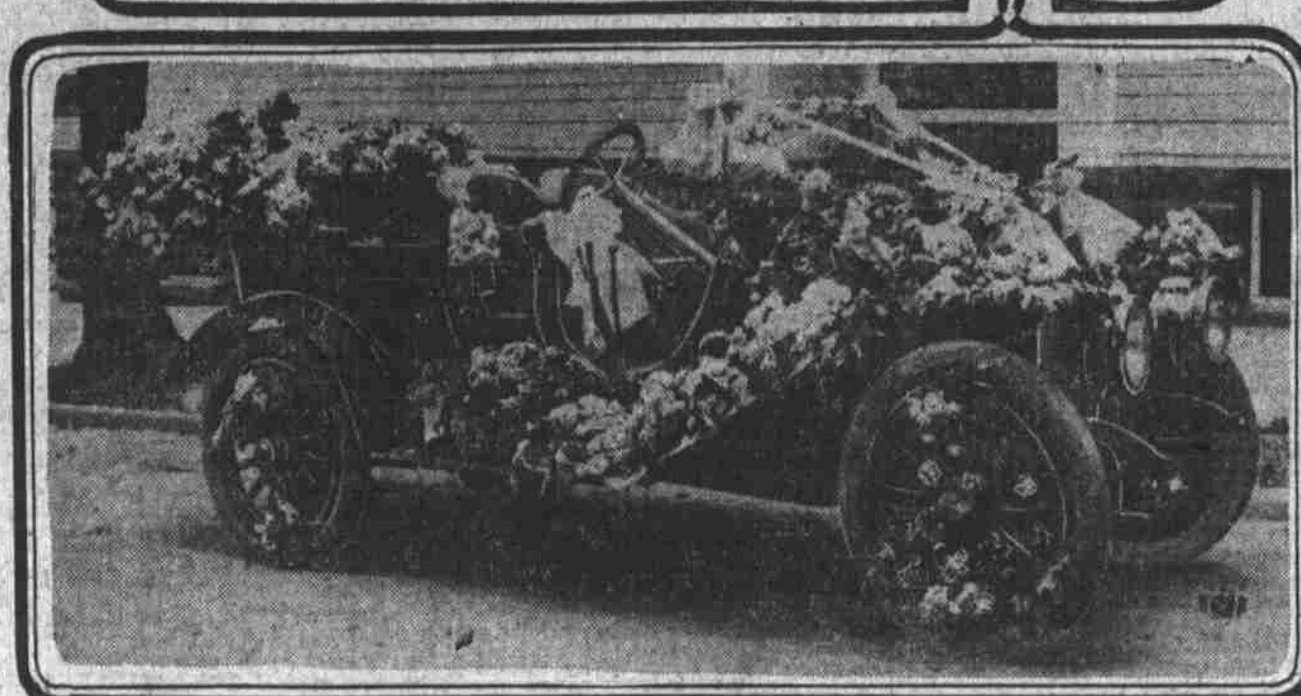
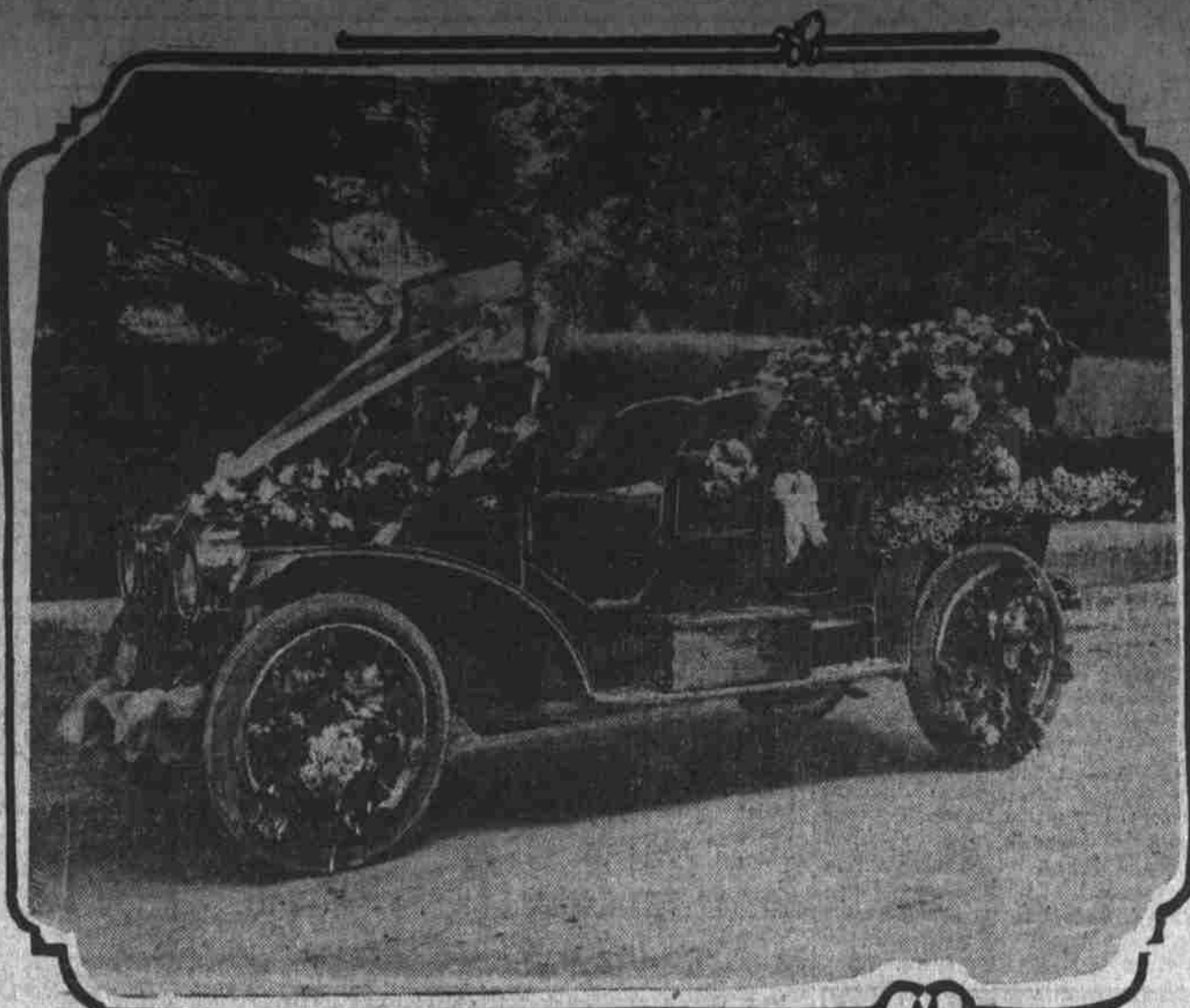

fair to postpone action on the report of the license committee, for by so doing, we would put Mr. Duchamp out of business, as the ordinance passed by the council at its last session, revoking the license of that gentleman, would become effective. He has a large sum of money tied up in the amusement features on the Crest and is entitled to remuneration if his business is to be destroyed.

"If the movement started for the purchase of Court Crest for a city park proves successful, the council will in no way hamper the purchase by

granting Mr. Duchamp a license at this time, all arguments to the contrary notwithstanding. At any time it can be shown that the city is ready to take over the property, the council can revoke the license. The fact that Duchamp has or has not a license will not have any influence on the market value of the hilltop.

Common People's Playground.
"From another point of view it would be unwise for us to close this amusement park as it is a source of great pleasure to thousands of poor people, who cannot afford more expensive amusements. The great crowds that patronize Council Crest, especially on Sundays, may not be as refined and as wealthy as the dwellers on the Heights, but nevertheless, they should have equal rights with those favored people and should be allowed to enjoy themselves in their own way. They are the bulwark of this nation and when a law making body infringes upon their privileges, it strikes at the fundamental principle of personal liberty."

Councilman Cellars made a strong plea for the continuation of the amusement features on the Crest and the argument he used was telling. He took occasion to criticize the action of mass meetings of residents of Portland Heights.

Referring to Duchamp, Councilman Cellars said that at this man's mention speakers had pronounced him "vile," yet that Duchamp is a law abiding man who has never been convicted of an infraction of the law.

Recalled Plank Episode.
"Compare this attitude with that of the same people when they publicly upheld the action of one of their own number who was convicted in the police court not long ago of a heinous offense."

Mr. Cellars was referring to an act of a resident of the heights who threw a plank across the rails of the streetcar company at a point in the steep declivity leading from Council Crest. The motive assigned for this act by the author was that he wished to stop the car so his sister could board it.

The fine levied by the police court judge for this rash act amounted to more than the combined fines levied for minor offenses committed at the Crest Park. Yet the residents of the heights raise a great hue and cry against the proprietor of the amusement features, and they approve the act of throwing obstructions in the way of a streetcar.

"I want to say to this council that tens of thousands of people visit the Crest weekly and I believe that the great majority of these are respectable, notwithstanding some reports to the contrary."

Danger of Obstructions.
"If, for one, would greatly prefer to take my wife and family for a visit to Council Crest to ride over the scenic railway there or enjoy some of the other amusement features to riding down from the crest in a streetcar and facing death because an enraged resident sees fit to obstruct the track to stop the car."

Councilman Cellars then suggested a solution of the question of granting the license and of purchasing the top of Council Crest by saying that it would be advisable to postpone action on the license committee's report for two weeks. "It is at that time, the residents of Portland Heights will meet again and agree to take park bonds at par the city could then buy the property and reimburse Mr. Duchamp for the loss of his business. I, however, am not in favor of selling bonds at 90 to make the purchase."

Councilmen Baker, Belding, Lombard, Dunning and Driscoll added to the argument expounded by the preceding speakers and expressed themselves as opposed to putting Duchamp out of business.

Governor Hay's Son Graduates.

The governor was in the thick of a sham battle here yesterday, when company D, of which his son is a member, took first honors for expertness in military strategy. Governor Hay was consulted by the general and marched with his son to the field.

COMES IN SEARCH OF HIS ESTRANGED WIFE; MINER FOUND DEAD

John Tatta, a miner who recently came from Kenneth, Cal., was found dead last evening in a rooming house at 208 Clay street. He had been searching for his wife the past three months, and had located her on the east side. The wife left him about six months ago, and took the two children. Tatta followed her to several towns along the coast, and recently learned she had come to Portland. He came here Saturday, and was stopping at the Clay street rooming house. Morris Zappi, his room mate, had attempted to effect a reconciliation between the wife and husband, but to no avail. Tatta had been suffering from heart trouble, and shortly after Zappi went to the room at 10 o'clock the man was dead.

HAS SPOOK SWEETHEART; WIFE WANTS A DIVORCE

PARADE OF HORSE AND CARRIAGE IS EVENT TOMORROW

Long Procession of All Kinds of
Vehicles to Form at Twelfth
and Morrison Streets at 2
O'clock.

Route of Parade.
Line of march for horse and carriage parade tomorrow afternoon—Parade forms at Twelfth and Morrison streets and follows the following route over the city streets, starting at 2 o'clock:
From Twelfth and Morrison down Morrison to Fourth; up Fourth to Main; down Main to First; down First to Morrison; up Morrison to Third; down Third to Pine; up Pine to Seventh; up Seventh to Alder; up Alder to Sixth; down Sixth to Oak; down Oak to Fourth; up Fourth to Stark; up Stark to Fifth; up Fifth to Washington; down Washington to Fourth; up Fourth to Alder; up Alder to Fifth; up Fifth to Morrison; up Morrison to Sixth; up Sixth to Yamhill; up Yamhill to Twelfth and disband.

The Horse and Carriage parade, one of the special features of the festival program, will be given tomorrow afternoon commencing at 2 o'clock. It will form at Twelfth and Morrison streets and be ready to start at 2 o'clock, and will follow the same route taken by the Spirit of the Golden West parade, as shown by the routing at the beginning of this article.

The Horse and Carriage parade, which is under the management of the Portland Hunt club and the Riverside Driving club, will be one of the most beautiful spectacles of the week. It will include in its line more than three miles of decorated horses, carriages and miscellaneous vehicles, which with the gaily costumed riders and drivers will make a wonderfully beautiful showing.

The grand marshal for the parade will be H. L. Pitcock. His aides will be Ralph Jenkins, F. O. Downing and Joe Muehe. Following them will come the Portland Hunt club, gay in its red jackets, and under the direction of Dr. William Wood. Next will come the children's division of the Hunt club with the boys and girls mounted on ponies. This division will be under the charge of H. Keron.

Following the children's division will come the Riverside Driving club, E. House, marshal; then the miscellaneous division under the direction of Sam Kramer. The street cleaning department entries, the postmen, the miscellaneous horsemen and the special floats division will close the parade.
The entries for the horse and carriage parade are expected to meet at Park and Morrison streets at 1:30 Thursday afternoon, and the parade to start promptly at 2 o'clock.

FEARS TARDINESS; RUNS BEFORE TRAIN

Hood River, Or., June 8.—The new Hood River hotel had a formal opening last night, to which the citizens were invited, and to which several hundred responded. The Hood River orchestra discoursed music while the guests spent the evening in dancing and feasting. The new hotel is one of the finest and best furnished hotels in the state east of Portland.

PINCHOT TALKS AGAINST BILL

Says Land Withdrawal Measure Operates Directly
Against People.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Washington, June 8.—Believing that the administration land withdrawal bill, if passed in its present form, would operate directly for water power interests and against the interests of the people, Gifford Pinchot said today that he would continue to oppose it. Speaking of the measure Pinchot said:
"The bill empowers the president to protect enormously valuable power sites on public lands by means of withdrawal. This is well. It also provides that if minerals are found on these sites they can be taken away. Should false mineral claims be made, the burden of proof would rest on the government."
"The Alaska coal lands should not be disposed of unless the temporary leases are now withdrawn. But even so, the withdrawals would expire upon the adjournment of congress. It is important that a bill containing further withdrawals should be passed immediately. If properly amended, this bill should pass."

KLAMATH-NATRON ROAD IS RUSHED

Trains Can Be Run to Hazel Dell
This Fall, Says Chief Engineer Hood.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Eugene, Or., June 8.—Chief Engineer Hood of the Southern Pacific was in Eugene last night after having made a trip over the route of the Natron extension toward Klamath Falls. He said another contract for construction of this line would be let at once at the Klamath Falls end of the line.
The purpose of letting the contract at this time is more to give the contractors a chance to get supplies and materials in before the winter, rather than for any real hurry in letting more road work.
Hood found the work of building the line was being rushed by the Utah Construction company from this end of the line. He said rails would be laid east from Natron in a very short time. It is fully expected that trains can be run as far as Hazel Dell, 40 miles from Eugene, this fall.

Plans are under way for placing all the trunk telephone lines between Boston, New York, Philadelphia and Washington underground.
