**Marriage of Talemans.**—Another wedding of 30 members for jury service in the circuit court during June was ordered this morning by Judge Morrow. The names were drawn from the regular jury list and make a total of 100 members summoned for this month. A venire of 30 ordered yesterday for today about 1 o'clock. The sheriff and three of these offered such good excuses they were allowed to go by the court. This left only seven jurors, and there were not enough talemans left to start the trial of Gordon Dickie, alleged leader of the St. Johns riot, which was continued until tomorrow morning.

**Condemnation Suit On.**—A jury was completed in Judge Tamm's court this morning for the trial of the condemnation suit of the city of Portland against William Hayhurst and his wife. Shortly before noon the jury was taken to Mt. Tabor to have a look at the Hayhurst land, which the city wants for park purposes. It is located on the southwest slope of Mt. Tabor and is valued at \$30,000 by the owners. The city viewers fixed the price at only \$2000 for the four acres comprised in the tract.

**Sue for Fees.**—Suit for \$100 as attorney fees has been started in the justice court against Walter Moore, recently on trial in the bank cases. Attorney A. W. Lafferty caused the suit to be brought. Attorney Lafferty charged in his bill that Moore engaged him as an attorney to act in a \$25,000 deal that was pending. The bill cites that Attorney Lafferty caused Moore to have several conferences, and that the alleged \$25,000 claim against Moore was settled out of court. Soon after this Moore engaged other counsel and did not pay Lafferty. He alleges \$100 is due.

**Woman's Club Meeting.**—One of the features of the "Rose day" program at the Woman's club tomorrow afternoon will be an exhibit of rose pictures painted by Portland artists. The exhibit will be in place at 3 o'clock and visitors in the city are cordially invited to see it. The program will be at 3 o'clock instead of 3 as usual, owing to the festival parade. Roses in profusion will be used in decoration and small maidens will offer each visitor choice blooms. Club members may bring guests free of charge.

**Entertain With Dance.**—Gring Lodge No. 16, Sons of Norway, entertained last night with a concert and dance at Christensen's hall, Elveth and Yamhill streets. It was the first entertainment of the newly organized lodge. The attendance was large and the program was much enjoyed. It included a chorus by the Norwegian Singing society, address, C. F. Helberg; vocal duet, the Thronsen twins; soprano solo, Miss Olga Goldberg; recitation, T. Trulsen and soprano solo, Miss Rose Robinson.

**Mail Carriers in Parade.**—Assistant Postmaster W. E. Williamson today received authorization from the postoffice department in Washington, D. C., permitting the suspension of city delivery tomorrow afternoon, thus allowing the carriers to participate in the horse and vehicle parade. Despite the suspension of delivery, the general postoffice and all sub-stations will be open during the afternoon.

**Six Months in Jail.**—Six months in the county jail was the sentence imposed on Charles A. Tennant by County Judge Cleaton yesterday afternoon on a charge of non-support, to which he pleaded guilty in the district court. Tennant was paroled by Presiding Judge Morrow after pleading guilty to immoral conduct with "Bobby" Pulliam, a variety actress. While Tennant is doing his six months on the rock pile the county will pay his wife \$1.60 per day for her support.

**Butcher Fined.**—A fine of \$10 was imposed upon Charles Rudeen, proprietor of the State meat market at First and Salmon streets, this morning in the municipal court. He was accused of conveying meat through the city streets without having it covered. Mrs. Sarah A. Evans, market inspector, made the charge.

**Potter Pleads Guilty.**—George Potter pleaded guilty to the charge of jury bribing yesterday afternoon in the circuit court, as had been announced he would do earlier in the day. Judge Morrow continued the time for sentence in

definitely in order to investigate the details of the case. Potter has confessed that he offered a juror in the Yee Quong murder trial \$200 to prevent conviction, and said he was to get the money from Ju Gai, a Chinese.

**Office \$50 Reward.**—A reward of \$50 has been offered by Dr. E. M. Hutchinson for information that will lead to the arrest of a reckless automobilist who ran down his son while riding a pony. The accident happened at Sixteenth and Washington streets. The driver of the machine threw on the power and ran away after striking the animal. The boy was unhurt, but the pony was bruised about the shoulder.

**Safe Cracking in Charge.**—A man pointed out yesterday by Marshal E. J. Bates of White Salmon was arrested and accused of blowing the safe of the White Salmon postoffice last week. The man gave the name of Walter A. Meyer, and said that he was a druggist. Marshal Bates followed the man on the street, and asked Detective Price and Carpenter to take him into custody. He is being held for further identification.

**Husband Well Armed.**—Alleging her husband beat her black and blue last Saturday and she is afraid to live with him because he keeps two revolvers and a rifle in their home, Justine Schneller has begun suit for divorce in the circuit court from Gustav Schneller. She asks for her former name, Justine Haganan. She was married in April, 1909.

**Widow Dies.**—Michael Peterson, who came to Oregon in 1882, died last Saturday at his home, 351 Thirteenth street, at the age of 81. The funeral services were held Monday and the interment was in the Riverside cemetery. Mr. Peterson is survived by a widow and two children, Mrs. Lou Clark and Frank C. Peterson, both of Portland.

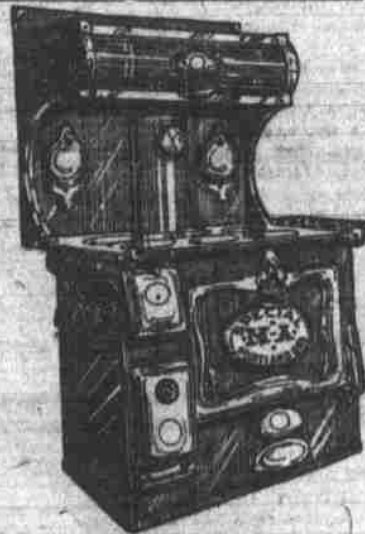

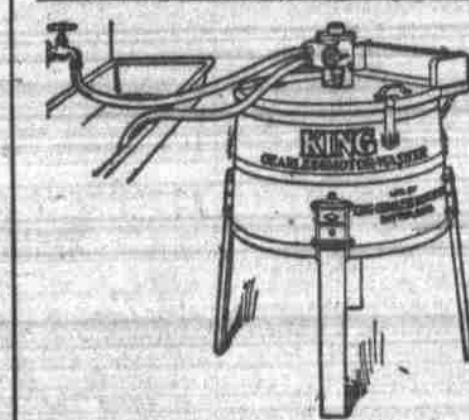
