Hegstrom Trial Opens.—Judge Gantenbein in the circuit court this morning took up the trial before a jury of the case of Pete Hegstrom and others against the J. W. Sweeney Construction company and others, in which \$2282 is claimed as a balance and damages on a contract for work on the Pacific Railway & Navigation company. The plaintiffs were subcontractors and allege they were compelled to quit the work in February by the breach of the main contract.

Uncle Sam Offers Jobs.—Examinations for an engineer in the Indian service to be held July 12-14, 1910, and a teacher for Indian schools has been announced by the government. Also examinations for sawyer and marine gasoline engineer, June 25, and for timber scaler, June 28. Salaries paid are from \$40 to \$50 a month. Z. A. COURT DISMISSES PERJURY CHARGE

Court So Passes Upon Merrill's Efforts to Secure Renewal of Liquor License.

Fred T. Merrill was freed from the charge of perjury in circuit court this morning in a decision by Judge Brough, who sustained a demurrer to the indictment filed by Logan & Stevenson and I. N. Smith. He was indicted on the charge of swearing falsely to an affidavit filed in support of his application for a liquor license for the Twelve Mile house last year.

Judge Brough held that perjury could not be committed in that sort of proceeding, inasmuch as the affidavit was not one required by law. Mr. Merrill was at the time fighting to renew his license, and his opponents alleged he had failed to comply with the law in the publication of notice in the newspaper published in the precinct in which the Twelve Mile house is located. Merrill then made affidavit that the publisher of the newspaper at Gresham had "practically refused" to publish the notice.

Upon this affidavit of Merrill's a perjury charge was based, the Gresham publisher declaring Merrill had not asked him to publish the notice. True or untrue, such an affidavit does not make perjury, Judge Brough declared. Another case in which Merrill is charged with selling liquor to minors was set for trial in the circuit court today, but was postponed until June 15 because Merrill is ill. Merrill participated in the parade yesterday, against the advice of his physician, who fears he is threatened with appendicitis.

FIRE CHIEF ADMITS FAST AUTO DRIVING

Fire Chief Campbell is charged in a police report with the fast and reckless driving of his automobile into a crowd of 2000 people last evening at Front and Morrison streets. The report asserts that he was going about 15 miles an hour, and the lives of several people were placed in jeopardy.

It was about 9:45 o'clock, when the crowd was the thickest, that the fire chief speeded south on Front street. Patrolmen West and Peterson were doing crossing duty. They saw the machine coming, and attempted to clear the way. The report further states there were about 100 automobiles and vehicles on the crossing at the time, and that Campbell swerved his automobile to the right to avoid crashing into an automobile loaded with eight women.

What caused the chief to make such a fast run at this time was a question in the minds of the patrolmen, as there was no fire on and this corner could easily have been avoided. He stopped his machine when ordered.

"I was driving too fast," said Chief Campbell this morning. "My wife and I had taken friends to the east side. Coming back we were talking and I failed to notice the speed. By applying the emergency brake I got the machine stopped, though it skidded a little. No one was in danger and the speed was nowhere near 15 miles an hour."

SAYS "STRONG ARM" WORK IS NOT HIS

Murray A. Pennock, who is alleged to be one of two "strong arm" men who held up and robbed Victor Pierson on March 9, went on trial on a charge of larceny from the person in Judge Burnett's department of the circuit court this morning. He is identified by Pierson as one of two men who held him and cut his clothing in search

for money. He says they went through him twice, and the last time found \$125 concealed in his coat.

The case is being prosecuted by Deputy District Attorney Page and the defense conducted by Sonnes Forts. The defense asserts the robbery was committed by another man, who escaped. Pennock was arrested by a policeman while he was running from near the scene of the holdup.

SUPREME COURT HOLDS FOR DESERTED WOMAN

Olympia, Wash., June 10.—The Washington state supreme court gives Mrs. Dora L. Pierce opportunity to compel her former husband, Charles R. Pierce, to contribute toward the support of herself and child. Mr. and Mrs. Pierce were living in Seattle and went to Victoria, B. C., to be united in marriage, in order to evade the Washington state law, which stipulates that six months must elapse after divorce before either party can remarry.

The woman had been divorced but a few weeks from a former husband and Pierce persuaded her to waive the statutory time by accompanying him to Victoria. Later the couple returned to Seattle, where Pierce left the woman, claiming that they had never been married, as they had not complied with the state law while they were residents of Washington. The superior court of Klaskan county declared the marriage void, and the woman appealed to the supreme court.

Here it was held that since the woman had married Pierce in apparent good faith and had lived with him until a child was born, an injustice would be worked on innocence by declaring the marriage illegal and making the child illegitimate.

The lower court was reversed and Pierce was ordered to pay for the support of the woman and child.
