

CHINESE ACQUIRE NEW SUPERSTITION

Led to Believe Killing of Hogs
on Ship Brings Contrary
Winds; Have Remedy.

(United Press Special Wire.)
Victoria, B. C., June 11.—The 500 Chinese who arrived here yesterday on the steamer Oanfa from Hong Kong, have added one more superstition to their already large stock. There is a saying among sailors that the killing of a pig aboard ship brings contrary winds. Many pigs were brought by the Chinese on the recent voyage and were killed on the way, and almost throughout the voyage the winds were contrary.

The killing began a few days after the steamer left port, a fine porker being slaughtered and dressed. The next day the wind blew hard, and someone told the Chinese they were responsible for it. Every time a pig was killed the wind was contrary and the Chinese were regularly informed that it was their fault. Finally there was a big killing, several fat swine being killed in one day. The next day there was a howling gale. The Chinamen were now sure that it was their pigs that were doing the damage.

It was at this time that Captain Lyett explained to the Chinamen who was in charge of his countrymen, that they did not kill the pigs in the proper way. "If they would always turn the head of the pig in the direction, that the ship was traveling," said he, "the wind would not be affected."

This was done the following day. The porker's nose was pointed in this direction and the wind immediately changed, and all the following day and the end of the voyage the gentle zephyrs wafted their craft on its way instead of delaying the passage.

POLICE SEARCHING FOR THE HUSBAND OF SLAIN ACTRESS

who married Mrs. Castle three months ago.

Porter Charlton was younger than his wife by 12 years. He was staying here under the name of Charlton Porter, and was posing as his wife's nephew. These circumstances have led the local authorities to suspect that Charlton became tired of his wife and murdered her.

The cottage in which the Charltons were staying near the beautiful lake of Como was ransacked today by the police. Every nook and corner of the building was searched and the police even undertook a cursory examination of the gardens and orchards nearby.

While the Como police were searching Charlton they are not overlooking the theory that he too may have been attacked and murdered. The cottage was left by the couple as though they had intended to return shortly. There was no indication of flight and the traveling clothes of the Charltons apparently had not been disturbed.

Russian Arrested on Suspicion.
While the police held to the theory of a possible double murder, they will keep in custody Constantine Ismailoff, a Russian, who was arrested near Togliatti. The Russian admitted that he knew the couple but denied any knowledge of the crime. He was subjected to a strenuous cross examination that had all the features of the American police "sweating system."

No clue was obtained from the Russian except inconsequential details as to the movements of the couple several days before they disappeared.

The active search for Charlton resulted in the discovery of many other details in connection with their stay here and at Molins. The proprietor of the Swiss hotel at Como admitted that he had ordered the Charltons from the hotel because of frequent beatings which, he alleged, Charlton had given his wife.

While the death of Stella Reid, whose mutilated body was found in the bay of Naples, remains a mystery, the police profess to see a connection between the two crimes. The refusal to reveal the reasons for their suspicions and it is believed that the theory is based on the similarity of the modes of murder.

Police Theories.
Following the receipt of advices from New York that Mrs. Charlton had planned to return there in the autumn, the police today gained possession of another incident in the chain of circumstances that is surrounding Porter Charlton with suspicion of wife murder.

The police here believe that possibly after a quarrel between Charlton and his bride, Mrs. Charlton may have threatened to leave him. This, it is thought, enraged Charlton and caused him to attack his wife.

Another theory considered by the police is that in one of their reported frequent quarrels, Charlton may have struck his wife a blow harder than he realized and killed her. Then becoming frightened, the police say, he may have fled.

Scores of rumors and theories were affixed today. The Italian and foreign residents on the lake shore have taken keen interest in the case and are doing everything in their power to aid in unraveling the mystery.

**WOMAN WRITES OF

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BRIEF HISTORY OF CHARLTON'S CAREER

Mrs. Mary Crittenden-Castle-Charlton, whose mutilated body was found in Lake Como, Italy, yesterday, was a Miss Mary Scott, daughter of H. H. Scott, a prominent merchant of San Francisco.

Mrs. Charlton is 18 years ago married Neville Castle, a wealthy man in San Francisco. She divorced her husband, and after the decree was granted moved to New York, where she studied for the stage.

Year after year for several years and became infatuated with William D. Craig, a New York lawyer. She alleged that Craig deceived her, and attempted to kill her. The bullet from her revolver was deflected by a fountain pen. The case never came to trial.

One year ago the woman married young Porter Charlton, 20 years of age. She was 31. The wedding took place at Wilmington, Del.

Mr. and Mrs. Charlton moved to Italy, where they remained up to the time of the tragedy. Charlton has disappeared, and while he is suspected by the police it is possible that he, too, may have been murdered, and his body thrown into the lake.

Neville Castle, former husband, is a government official at Nome, Alaska. Young Charlton's father is a lawyer in Washington, D. C.

Mrs. Charlton's nearest kin reside in San Francisco.

Mrs. Charlton was born at Elko, Nev., 24 years ago, and was educated at a private school in San Francisco. She was a cousin of the late President Harrison and a relative by marriage of the late Admiral Sampson.

The girl, as the niece of Mrs. Monroe Salisbury, then a social leader of San Francisco, attained popularity in the "smart set."

"Dear Lady—We both want to thank you so much for your wire, which was indeed most grateful, coming from a true friend. Mary has told me of your tenderness to her, and I hope some day that I may have the opportunity of showing to you my gratefulness and appreciation—for they are a rarity around this foul city in which that dear little girl has lived for the past nine years."

"I have taken a man's conceit and pride in the change which has taken place in her since our marriage, for we're pretty close pals and confessions is good for the soul. Our family motto is, 'One for all and all for one.'"

"We are going abroad about the 15th, to spend several years, and, if the Lord is good to us, to give our kiddies a start in the German schools, which are rated for their thoroughness and the industry which they instill into youngsters."

"We have a charming place here, which we are loath to leave, for here it is that we both shut the gate on the road to yesterday and drank from the cup that clears today of past regret and future fears."

"We were married under most delightful circumstances at Wilmington, Del., in the oldest active Episcopal church in this country, by a clergyman who had known me as a boy in Omaha, Neb., 15 years ago. Since we wished no publicity attendant on our marriage, and therefore took none of our friends, it was necessary to call in a 'best man' to assist Mrs. Clay as bridesmaid, who turned out to be Mrs. Ramsey, and while she had never known Mary, knew all her people."

"Mary has told me what sticklers you all are about 'family' and I shall leave it to her therefore to sing the praises of the Charlton tribe, which dates back to the year 1013."

"Again, my many thanks for your wire and the sincere wish that it may be my good fortune to know the person who has been so good to my wife."

SAYS SON WAS MUCH

It was a case of love at first sight," said Mrs. Castle. "Porter had known Mrs. Castle only about a month. He married her against the advice of his father and shortly afterward went to Europe to accept a position with a bank at Hamburg. He intended to travel in Italy and Switzerland for his health before going to Hamburg."

"We received a letter from Porter only last week and he devoted much space to describing his wife to us. From what he said we thought he loved her very much. Nothing would be more inconsistent with Porter's disposition than to suppose that he may have been connected with his wife's death. I believe he has met with foul play and this will account for his disappearance."

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CRISIS IN STRIKE EXPECTED MONDAY

Draymen to Employ All Teamsters Who Want Work—
Prefer Old Employees.

Monday the Draymen's association will discontinue its policy of "waiting" for the teamsters' strike to adjust itself. Aided by the Employers' association, strikebreakers will be employed and the transfer teams and wagons that have been idle for two weeks will be set in motion again.

"We will have men to go to work," declared President Sam Hermann of the Draymen's association, last morning. "We would prefer to let the old employees go back to work, but if they do not show up for duty we will have men ready to take and hold their places. We will give employment to as many men as we can get. There is a great mass of freight to be moved, and emergency action will be needed to get the transfer business of the city organized again."

Appeals for police protection were made a second time to Mayor Simon yesterday. Accompanied by members of the Draymen's association, M. C. Bland, president of the Employers' association, appeared before the mayor to state their belief that a policeman should accompany every wagon.

Although this demand was refused, the union men take it as a demonstration of the employers' intention to import strikebreakers. The union men still defy the employers to bring strikebreakers into Portland. The organization of strikers is perfected now to resist an effort to employ strikebreakers.

The events of Monday will determine how serious the issue really is. Union men were smiling this morning over a report that a man named Hall, one of their number, had been sent to St. Vincent's hospital, the result of a fight with W. T. Slater. Hall was present to testify for himself that he had not been seriously injured, and had not been in the hospital.

"Slater was driving for the B. & O. T. company, and he was in a hurry to get to work. He finally hit me, and I accepted the invitation, and two bosses of the transfer company referred the matter," said Hall, telling the story of the encounter. Neither was seriously injured. I was anxious to avoid trouble, as my wife is near death in the hospital."

missing American suspected of the murder of his wife, Mary Crittenden Castle-Charlton, collapsed today following sensational reports from Como, Italy, where Mrs. Charlton's body was found. Judge Charlton asked the state department to secure the reliable information. He expressed the fear that his son had been murdered by the person who had attacked his son's wife.

Consul Coughy of Milan today officially notified the state department of the identification of the murdered woman.

Planned to Return Next Fall.
New York, June 11.—Persons who befriended Mrs. Mary Castle-Charlton after her attempt to kill Attorney William Craig at the Waldorf-Astoria, said today that Mrs. Charlton had planned to return in the fall. Mrs. Charlton wrote to her brother, Captain Henry Scott of the United States army, on April 16 telling him of her marriage. Scott cabled to Italy for details and learned that Mrs. Charlton was in the fall, she was studying at the University of Pennsylvania.

his deputies are making efforts to discover if any cars are missing.

It is thought possible the car may be long to a visitor to the Rose Festival from Seattle. Ignorant of the fact that the country road supervised on treacherous curves any one driving rapidly might fall to make the turn and meet with the accident, which is indicated by the appearance of the trestle today.

Only a heavy body moving rapidly could have carried the car over the trestle. It is built strong enough to withstand ordinary shocks. The place of the accident is about one-fourth of a mile south of the Vancouver ferry slip. The county road trestle is independent of the street trestle.

The Vancouver chief of police answered an inquiry made this morning by Sheriff Stevens saying that no automobiles were missing there. So far as has yet been learned no local cars are missing.

Was Thomas Flyer.
The wheel guard that was brought to the surface by the grappling hook was that of a Thomas flyer. This may be a valuable clue to the identity of the owner of the machine. The current in the slough is so swift and the water so deep that it is very difficult to work the grappling. At one time the men in charge of the work thought they had located the machine, but the hooks brought up part of a stump of a tree. There is a possibility that the machine was one of the 40 touring cars that came here from Seattle to take part in the Rose Festival. The supposition is that the unfortunate auto party was speeding to meet the Vancouver ferry.

Many of the Seattle party went home via Kelso but the report is that half a dozen of the car owners decided to make the trip by way of Vancouver.

The planking near the scene of the accident shows signs of an effort to bring a machine to a sudden stop. The marks of auto wheel are plainly shown on the plank. The planking is undoubtedly saw. His error too late and desperate effort to avert the machine from the curve. The trestle takes a sharp bend at the point where the accident occurred and at night it would be easy to become confused in approaching it especially if a machine were making much speed.

There will be no means of checking up the Seattle machines for some days, as it was the intention of the party to make a slow run home, after leaving the Oregon side of the river. Local garages have few machines that have not been accounted for, but it is said that machines frequently remain out over 24 hours, and nothing can be definitely ascertained until tonight.

**GEMS SELL READILY
AT PUBLIC AUCTION**

Buyers for half a dozen jewelry houses and a few outside bidders crowded around an auctioneer at the west door of the courthouse this morning to buy diamonds and other jewelry belonging to the estate of the late Amanda W. Reed. The bidding was spirited and there seemed no scarcity in the money market.

The gems of the collection were a pair of large uncut diamonds, which were started at \$1000 and finally sold to A. C. Feldenheimer for \$1630. A ring with emerald set and a diamond on each side went for \$750, and another ring with a large sapphire flanked by diamonds sold for \$550. Many smaller pieces of jewelry and several furs were sold. The total of the sales approximated \$10,000.

The sale was conducted under an order of Judge Cleeton in the county court. The heirs being unable to agree upon the disposition of the jewels, they agreed to a public sale, and Martin Winch, the executor, obtained the necessary order from the county court.

WHITE RIBBONERS PLAN BIG PARADE

Temperance Workers Say the
Demonstration Is Necessary
to Blot Liquor Traffic.

That Portland should have in September a monster temperance parade, such as has been held in other large cities, to arouse enthusiasm to surpass any demonstration of public sentiment yet witnessed in the northwest was the definite decision of temperance workers at last night's banquet in the Third Presbyterian church, East Thirteenth and East Pine.

Mrs. Unruh, state president of the W. C. T. U., in speaking of the great parade, said in part:

"The parade will be a combination of all temperance organizations and all individuals interested in the stamping out of the liquor traffic. The demonstration will be after the manner of those held in San Diego and Chicago. The parade in Chicago was led by General Frederick Grant. One of the features of this parade, as described by Miss Brehm, was a wagon filled with mothers and babies, intimating the necessity of caring for the children. Of course, the occasion and nature of the parade is such that children are an important feature and make a striking and touching appeal."

Banners, music and symbolical representations will be other features. Miss Brehm said that these parades have always aroused the greatest enthusiasm and interest. So far as known, the organization will be left to some individual to be chosen as soon as a permanent committee can be appointed. The parade will represent a union of all temperance workers and forces.

**50 MEASURES NOW
UP TO THE PEOPLE**

Proposed Amendment Provides for Cities Regulating Sale of Liquor.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., June 11.—N. C. Dickinson and Phil Metcalf, Jr., presented a petition at the office of the secretary of state late yesterday afternoon for filing which proposes to amend the Oregon constitution so that cities and towns may have complete control over the regulation of the sale of liquor. If this amendment is adopted it will exclude all cities and towns from the operation of the present local option law.

The local option law provides that the vote of the majority in favor of the prohibition of the sale of liquor will also prohibit the sale of liquor in the cities of that county notwithstanding they may have themselves voted to allow sale of liquor. If one county alone is not sufficiently large to accomplish the result, counties may be grouped and voted in bunches.

The petitions presented for filing yesterday contained more than 4000 names. It is the 15th measure that the people will be called to pass upon at the next general election in November.

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
