RYAN'S HOMERUN
WINS FOR BEAVERS

Little Buddy Clouts Ball Over Fence With Two Mates on Bases.

Buddy Ryan's home run in the eighth inning yesterday with two men on bases and the score tied, gave Portland the game, 4 to 1, and the series over Los Angeles. The ball floated high over right field fence and brought to mind the memorable clout of Ota Johnson last year, when he won a game in the ninth inning off Young Koestner of these same Angels. Krapp pitched excellent ball and let the visitors down with two hits, while Wheeler suffered a murderous cannoning all afternoon. Portland scored in the first inning when Olson singled to left after Smith had been laid away in cold storage. Rappa's out put him on second, whence he scored on Gus Fisher's mighty smash to center for three bases. Casey made the last out.

Daley walked in the fourth, went to second on Bernard's sacrifice, took third on Howard's out and registered when Olson knocked down what looked like a hit by Dillon and made a low pop to first on the run.

Rappa opened up the eighth with a single and Fisher secured a walk. Then Casey forced Rappa at third. It was at this juncture that Ryan came to bat and arched the ball high over the right field fence. Score:

SOME DAY BE CLASSIC

Boston, June 13.--Barrett Wendell, professor of English at Harvard, and author of a number of works on literature, recently said:
"Mutt and Jeff may some day in the future be regarded as classic. The adventures of the genial Mr. Mutt and the credulous Mr. Jeff have furnished delight for many as a humorous portrayal of certain aspects of contemporary life. Of course, there is no absolute way of judging what the opinion of posterity will be upon any piece of contemporary work in literature or in art, but if Mr. Mutt and Mr. Jeff continue to entertain as they have done there is good reason to suppose that they will be classic."

"Just as our parents in the last century looked down upon the contemporary literature of their time and disesteemed the personal of books written by those whom we consider now among the lesser novelists, so some would perhaps today ridicule the claim of these two novel characters to distinction."

SQUAD AT SYDNEY

California Boys Warmly Received by Australians Whom They Will Meet.

Sydney, N. S. W., June 13.--The capital of the commonwealth pro tem, is in fete today in honor of the visit of the American rugby football team from Stanford university, California, and as the visitors from the United States and the New Zealand team, which is also here, move about the city the air is rent with the blood curdling war cries of the former and the ear splitting yells of the latter.

The local rugby union is entertaining the guests of the season. They have already been driven around the city and lunched at the club house, where President Calvert heartily welcomed the Americans, not only as Americans but also as representatives of the culture and athleticism of the universities of their country.

Strengthens Friendship.

The American consul declared the visit of more than mere sporting significance. It would conduce to the continuation and strengthening of the two greatest countries on earth. He was confident that if his compatriots won they would not brag and that if they lost there would be no heartburnings. Manager Burbank, responding, said Sydney was to footballers what Mecca was to the Mohammedans. The team looked forward to a successful trip. Their arrival at Sydney was the realization of their fondest dream. They would show that they were true sports, even though they did not know how to play rugby. They did not expect to win this time but they hoped to learn a lot. They would play the game for all it was worth.

Congratulations were exchanged on the stand the union had made against professionalism and the gathering closed with a repetition of the joyous college yells and war cries.

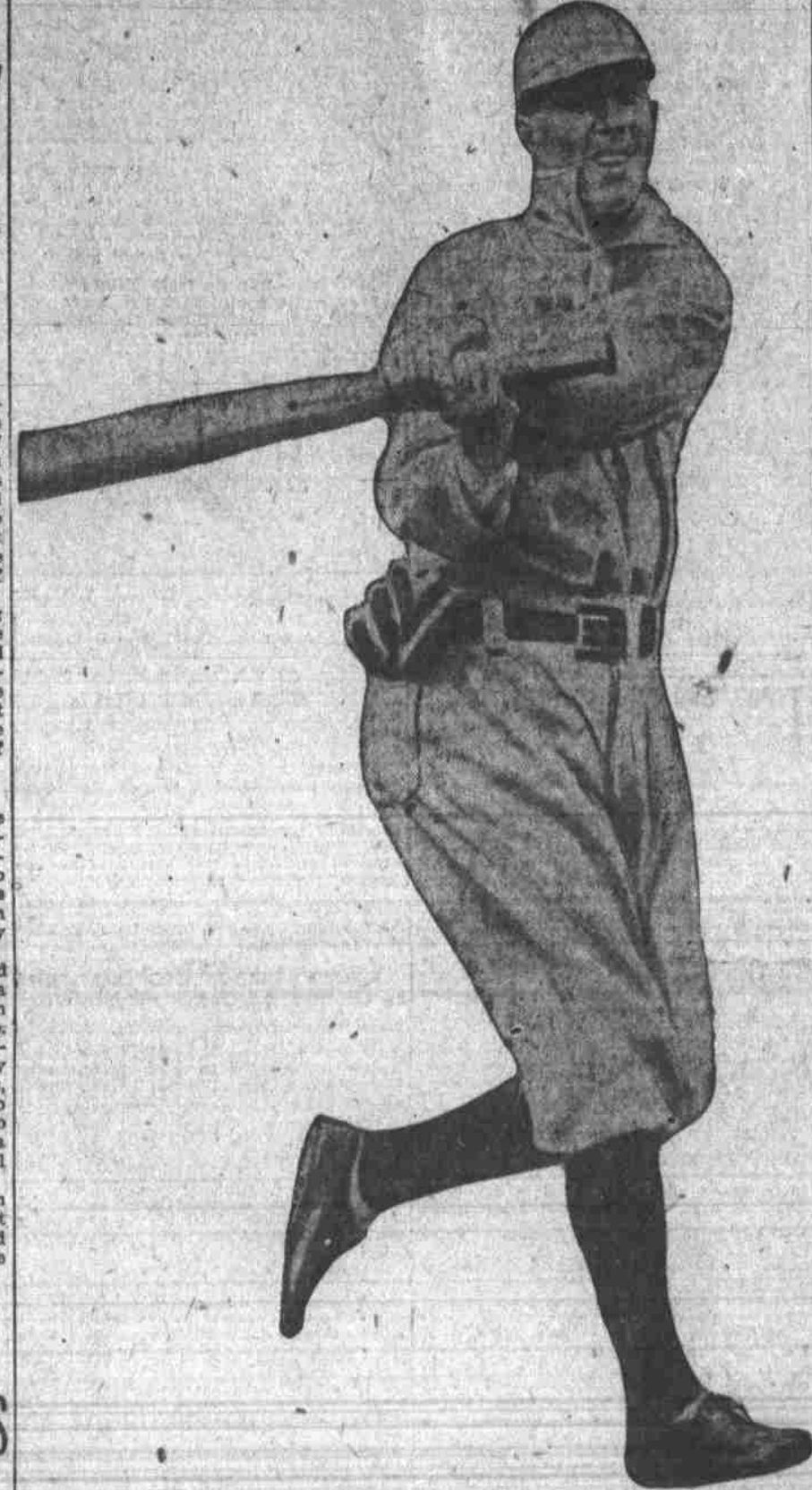
