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ANNUAL SHOOT FOR GUARDSMEN

Rifle Competition of O. N. G. Scheduled for July 12-14 at Clackamas Range.

The annual rifle competition of the Oregon National Guard will take place July 12 to 14 on the new rifle range at Clackamas station, near Oregon City. Every company of guardsmen in the state will be represented by a team composed of its best shots.

Portland will furnish six teams, one from each company of guardsmen stationed here. Eugene will send two teams, and one team will come from each of the following interior points: Astoria, Salem, Albany, Baker City, Pendleton and Woodburn.

The match which will determine who is the best shot in the state national guard will be the hardest fought contest of the competitive meet. This contest, which is known as the state individual, is expected to bring out a large number of contestants.

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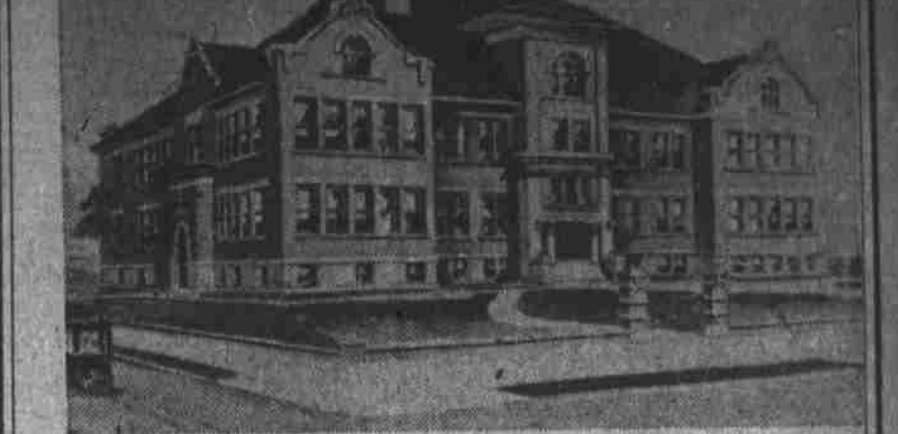
