CAPE GRACIAS

Madriz, Aided by Honduras, Captures One of Insurgents' Two Ports.

Colon, June 14.—Cape Gracias, the only port besides Bluefields that was held by the insurgents, is in the hands of the Madriz administration forces under General Vasquez. The port was captured yesterday, according to delayed dispatches received today. It is on the Honduras border, and the dispatches assert that Honduras troops assisted the forces of Madriz.

President Madriz today sent a protest to President Taft against the attitude of the American navy. He said:

"I am unable to reconcile the attitude of American naval commanders with the principle of neutrality proclaimed in international law."

The Roosevelt conservation policies. It has been noticeable that the Pinchots have paid little heed to these attacks, proceeding on the assumption that the animus back of the misrepresentation would be understood by the people at large, who would not be deceived as to the true significance.

Therefore, in the absence of defense against these attacks, the anti-Roosevelt-Pinchot writers have grown rather bold, and have gone to degrees of misrepresentation which have amazed all who knew the facts. It was assumed that in some instances these misstatements by writers who send matter from Washington, were not properly understood by responsible editors in the home office of the newspapers; the incorrect assertions, however, have been now carried so far as to seem to justify exposure. In doing this, I have selected a subject familiar to the people of Oregon, together with a specific instance local to that state.

A short time ago President Taft signed a proclamation eliminating from the Wallowa national forest, in eastern Oregon and restoring to public entry 203,425 acres of land. These tracts included lands in T. 1 and S. 8, R. 47 E., T. 1 and S. 2 N., R. 45, 46, 47 and 48 E., T. 3 N., R. 42 E., T. 4 N., R. 42 and 43 E., T. 5 and 6 N., R. 46 E., and T. 6 N., R. 47 E. In addition, a strip of land from one-half mile to three miles wide is eliminated along the southern boundary of the forest, in R. 42 to 47 E., Section 6 and the west half of S. 5, T. 4 N., R. 42 E., are transferred from the Wallowa to the Wenaha forest, the area having been isolated from the Wallowa by the large eliminations.

Other restorations of lands to public entry which have been withdrawn for national forests were made, aggregating about 3,000,000 acres. These restorations were made beginning soon after Pinchot left the forest service and have continued down to the recent past.

When the first of these restorations was made there was announcement in this rest form:

"Following conferences between Secretary Wilson of the department of agriculture and Secretary Ballinger of the department of the interior, lands which had been withdrawn for national forests have been recommended to be restored by the president; the restorations aggregate more than 3,000,000 acres."

This announcement was amplified to create the impression that here was a reform of forest administration, and that now that Pinchot had left the service, the people of the west were receiving the first benefits of the dismissal of the former forester, and that the benison of the triumph to Ballingerism over Pinchotism was thereby made apparent.

The truth is—and it is admitted at the forest service now under Forester Graves—that every acre restored at the recommendation of the two secretaries was restored as the result of surveys initiated by Pinchot when he was forester; that from the beginning the Pinchot policy had been to make these surveys as rapidly as possible after money had been provided for them, and that public announcement was made to that effect many times before Pinchot was dismissed.

Every acre, thus restored, then, would have been restored at the exact time it was actually restored, for the surveys had been completed, the legal papers made out and in the regular course of office events the time had come to restore the lands.

The very maps which formed part of the papers used in making these restorations bore the "O. K." of Gifford Pinchot, who, while yet forester, had approved the restorations to be made.

Yet not enough fairness and honesty was utilized to do the former forester simple justice; while, on the contrary, the impression was given, and deepened by additional letters from Washington correspondents and editorials in prominent newspapers, that these restorations were the first fruits of the

THIRTY JAPANESE

RUN OUT OF TOWN

Citizens of Darrington, Wash., Make Short Meter of the Asiatic Peril.

Darrington, Wash., June 14.—Sunday there were 30 Japanese in Darrington. Today there is not one in or near the town.

A mob of 100 white men yesterday marched on the Japanese, practically all of whom were employed by the United States Lumber company, gave them an hour to gather up their effects, and then accompanied them to the station, and saw them aboard a Seattle train.

The Japanese arrived here three weeks ago from Seattle, the first large party of orientals ever brought into the town. Saturday night a mass meeting was held, and yesterday's action was planned. The Japanese offered no resistance and there was little disorder.

Darrington is a town of 400 people in the extreme northern part of Snohomish county, about 40 miles back from the sound, the terminus of a Northern Pacific branch line.

Seattle, June 14.—Kinsiro Hayashi, Japanese vice consul in charge of the local consulate, today refused to discuss the driving of 30 Japanese out of the town of Darrington. After repeated requests for a statement, Mr. Hayashi stated that he would get as far as he could to protect against the treatment of the mikado's subjects. He admitted that he had wired a consular agent at Everett to investigate the case thoroughly and that he would communicate with the embassy at Washington.

WILL ARGUE LAND DISPUTE ON FRIDAY

The hearing of argument in the case of the Eastern Oregon Land company against the Malheur Valley Railroad company has been set for Friday morning by United States District Judge Bean. This is the case in which the land company is seeking a permanent injunction restraining the railroad company from building an extension of the Yale railroad over the lands formerly embraced in The Dalles wagon road land grant.

The grant lands were purchased some time ago by the Eastern Oregon Land company. The railroad company commenced the construction of its road through the lands and the land company secured a temporary injunction. Friday the attorneys for the two corporations will argue for and against the proposition that the temporary injunction be made permanent.

Cool Pioneer Killed.

ADVENTISTS CLOSE SUCCESSFUL MEETING

After one of the most successful series of meetings ever held, the western Oregon conference and campmeeting of the Seventh-Day Adventists, held in Mount Tabor, closed Sunday. At the close 35 converts were baptized at Milwaukie by the elders of the conference. The most important action taken in the closing session was the division of the conference into the western and southern Oregon conferences. The new

southern Oregon conference will include all that portion of the state west of the Cascade mountains and as far north as the northern boundary of Lane county. Klamath county is also included. The new conference will take one third of the membership—about 600 members—and one third of the personal property. The personal property, consisting of tents and other paraphernalia, was divided at a meeting of the division committee yesterday afternoon.

By the division of the conference the western Oregon conference retains Laurewood academy, near Gaston, and the southern Oregon conference receives the

Royal Intermediate academy at Cottage Grove and the Gravel Ford academy at Gravel Ford. F. S. Bunch retires from the presidency of the western Oregon conference and takes the same position in the new conference. F. A. Hanson was elected president of the western Oregon conference to replace Mr. Bunch. The conference just closed was attended daily by about 1000 people, and there were on the grounds 120 tents.

Forty carloads of sheep were shipped in one day from Joseph and Enterprise—17,000 head.

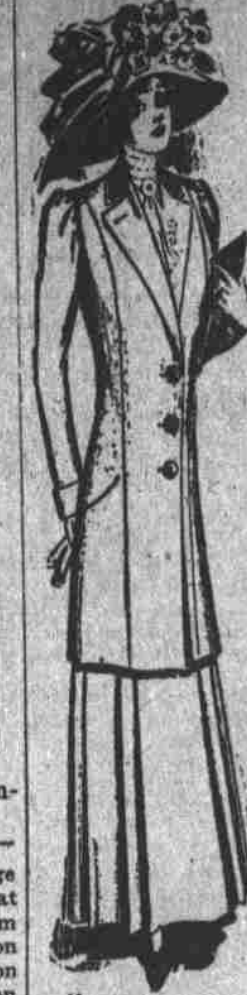
