MAZAMAS ISSUE NEAT BOOK ON COMING CLIMB

The Mazama society, Oregon's club of mountain climbers, has issued a booklet descriptive of the forthcoming trip of its members to the "Three Sisters," and environs, according to the announcement, the start for the summit of the Three Sisters will be made at 8:30 a. m. August 3.

On a previous occasion, says the announcement, the Mazamas made a start for this most neglected and unknown of Oregon's group of snow capped mountains but owing to a miscarriage of the pack train but four members of the society carried out the program.

One of the principal objects that the Mazamas have in view in exploring the "Three Sisters" is to explore and name the glaciers on the three peaks. No authoritative information is at hand regarding the number of glaciers on the peaks. One geological survey indicates that one glacier on each peak, but as two of the mountains are of equal height with Mount Jefferson, which has several glaciers, it would seem probable that there are a number of these unexplored and unnamed rivers of ice on the sides of these peaks.

The Mazamas were organized on the summit of Mount Hood in 1894, and regularly each summer since then have scaled some one of the snow clad mountains of the Pacific coast.
