

EPISCOPAL CHURCH OPENS CONVENTION

Small Attendance Because Being Held Outside of Portland; Much Business.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., June 15.—The twenty-second annual convention of the Oregon diocese of the Episcopal church met in Eugene this afternoon, and will continue in session over Saturday. Bishop Seaboard and a large number of delegates from Portland and other Oregon points arrived on the afternoon train and the convention was called to order immediately afterward. Some 25 clergymen and 50 or more lay delegates are here or expected in tonight and tomorrow. The attendance will be smaller than usual for the reason that this is the first convention that has been held outside of Portland for 20 years. One of the matters to come up at the convention is the adoption of a new statement of the tenets of the diocese, a matter laid over from last year. Considerable discussion is expected before the final form is adopted. Delegates are also to be elected to the national convention in Cincinnati next October.

SUIT AGAINST DUNSMUIR THAT INVOLVES MILLIONS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Victoria, B. C., June 15.—What promises to be the most sensational lawsuit in the history of the province will come to trial June 21, when Henry Croft and others will bring an action against James Dunsmuir and nine other defendants claiming \$4,600,000 for alleged conspiracy respecting an option on lands in the Esquimalt and Nanaimo districts. The defendants are owners of lands in cranberry, strawberry and oyster districts. The plaintiffs claim they obtained from the defendants options on these lands, commenced their development as coal mines and negotiated for the sale of their rights. They allege that the defendants conspired in granting a second option to cloud their registration of the first option, in order to prevent competition in the coal producing business in which they claim, defendant Dunsmuir has a monopoly. The defense is a denial of these allegations in toto.

TEN-YEAR-OLD BOY KILLS BROWN BEAR

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., June 15.—Ernest Morton, the 10-year-old son of O. Morton, a farmer living on Bear creek, near Creswell, holds the record in this county for being the youngest bear-killer. While out in the woods with his dog a few days ago he ran across a young brown bear and the dog tried to run a half mile to a neighbor's house and, securing a rifle, returned to where he saw the bear. The dog was faithfully watching at the foot of the tree and Ernest, taking aim, fired twice, bringing the bear to the ground with the second shot. The rifle was so heavy that he was unable to bring it to his shoulder, but secured a good aim nevertheless.

PROPHET TELLS WHY HIS PROPHECY FAILED

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, June 15.—Frederick A. Starr, professor of anthropology in the University of Chicago, who predicted that Theodore Roosevelt would never return from the African jungle alive, has explained why his prognostications were wrong. He says Roosevelt did not penetrate the portion of Africa that it was at first announced he would visit. Had he done so he would have encountered poisonous swamps that would have killed him, Professor Starr says.

VALE MAN QUITS BANKING BUSINESS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Vale, Or., June 15.—At a special meeting of the directors of the United National bank of Vale held today Elwood L. Clark tendered his resignation as cashier. He will devote his time to the promotion of irrigation projects in eastern and central Oregon. During his five years' incumbency as cashier Mr. Clark brought this banking institution to the front, and today it stands among the strongest banks of eastern Oregon, with deposits aggregating \$500,000.

RICH WOMEN SUED FOR DIRECTING A BOYCOTT

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, June 15.—A suit for \$150,000 damages is pending in the United States circuit court today against Mrs. O. H. Belmont, Mrs. Carola Weatherhoff, Miss Ives Millholland and other society women who gave assistance in the shirtwaist makers' strike. The suit was filed by A. Sitomer & Co., under the provisions of the Sherman act. He alleges that the defendants levied an illegal secondary boycott and that he was ruined. He places his actual damage at \$20,000.

HINDUS CLAIM MAN IS GRAFTER

Interpreter at Seattle Immigration Office Charged With Exacting Bribes.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, June 15.—Affidavits on file in the local immigration office charge E. S. Jolley, Jr., official interpreter of Indian languages for the United States immigration department, with demanding bribes from Hindus entering the country, and of the refusal of the immigrants to accede to his demands, or having so misinterpreted their answers that they were refused admission to the country.

With the affidavits is filed a petition for a rehearing of applications for admission to the United States of 15 natives of India who arrived on the Minnesota June 4. The Hindus allege that Jolley demanded 25 pounds from the party, which they refused. He was summoned from Vancouver to examine the immigrants.

REAL ESTATE MEN AT NATIONAL GATHERING

Minneapolis, Minn., June 15.—More than 500 delegates representing practically every section of the country are in attendance at the annual meeting of the National Association of Real Estate Exchanges, which opened its three days' session here this morning. The morning session was devoted to the registration of delegates, the meeting of the executive committee and various routine matters. In the afternoon session the delegates were welcomed by Governor A. O. Eberhart and Mayor J. C. Haynes in behalf of state and city, and by J. F. Conklin, president of the Minneapolis real estate board, in behalf of the real estate men of the city. W. W. Hannan of Detroit, president of the National Association of Real Estate Exchanges, responded and later delivered his annual address. There will be business sessions every day, but tomorrow afternoon the delegates will make an automobile tour of St. Paul, winding up with a trip over the boulevard to Fort Snelling. On Friday they will inspect the business section of Minneapolis and after the adjournment of the convention and the farewell dinner on Friday evening the delegates will start on a tour for Duluth, where they will be the guests of the city for one day.

BUZZARDS FIGHT WHEN YOUNG ARE DISTURBED

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Rafael, Cal., June 15.—State Senator E. E. Martindale and his 10-year-old son, in a battle with a flock of buzzards near Inverness, Sonoma county, yesterday, were badly scratched. The battle lasted several minutes and only Senator Martindale's persistent fighting with the birds saved his son's life. The boy was hunting blackberries, when he came upon a nest of young buzzards. Their cries attracted dozens of grown buzzards, which flew at the boy in great rage, pecking and clawing fiercely. His father, who was some distance away, hurried to the spot and, with a walking stick, clubbed four birds to death, wounded several more and finally drove the flock away.

LIBERAL ELEMENT WINS AT LEWISTON

Lewiston, Idaho, June 15.—Out of 1203 voters registered but 1016 ballots were cast in the municipal election Monday, which resulted in the reelection of Councilmen Emery and Wlaner and the election of J. H. West for two years and Dr. J. P. Boston, unopposed, for one year. The result was a victory for the liberal rule element as against the law enforcement league, which was supporting Leola and Brown, the latter a member of the present council. It is also a decided rebuke to Mayor B. F. Tweedy, who was out on the streets all day urging the voters to support the law enforcement candidates. The majority score: West 279, Emery 248, Wlaner 256.

MOSIER CITIZENS FILE COMPLAINT

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., June 15.—D. E. Hall, on behalf of the citizens of Mosier, has filed complaint with the railroad commission in which he not only charges the company's trainmen with failure to comply with the regulations of traffic imposed by the order of the railroad commission and the laws of this state by their refusal to cut freight trains so as to allow passengers to alight from passenger trains, but also charges the conductors with personal abuse and insult to passengers and citizens of Mosier. "Adding insult to injury," says Mr. Hall, "the conductor of train No. 24 heaped abuse and curses upon the citizens of Mosier in general and upon myself, saying that he would do as he pleased about cutting crossings here, and swearing with the utmost freedom before Mrs. Ross and her children." The Mosier residents say this practice of not cutting trains is a frequent one, and that women and children are compelled to walk long distances through the rain and mud to get around freight trains on sidings when passenger trains arrive.

GIVES HUSBAND TO HIS AFFINITY

Mrs. Clara Hughes Quits Fight to Regain Love of Wayward Spouse.

Los Angeles, Cal., June 15.—Mrs. Clara Hughes is preparing to return to her home in Portland and leave her husband, Thomas Hughes, confessed bigamist, to the woman he chose in preference to her. She has forgiven both the man and the woman he loves. Hughes, who is a private detective, yesterday pleaded guilty to the charge of bigamy. Mrs. Clara Hughes of Portland was his second wife and Mrs. Cora Hughes of Los Angeles his third. His first wife is dead.

Both women visited Hughes in his cell at the city jail last evening. Together they stood before him, and when Hughes, after tenderly kissing both, turned to Mrs. Cora and clasped her in his arms, the Portland wife with tears in her eyes, bravely smiled a goodbye and withdrew from the cell.

Back in the visitors' room of the jail she said: "He doesn't care for me, and he does for this woman, so why should I spoil their happiness when it would not help me one bit? I have the memory of two years we spent together, and I will take it back home with me."

When Hughes pleaded guilty of bigamy he threw himself upon the mercy of the court. He will appear for sentence within a few days.

Thomas Hughes followed "spotting" for railroad companies, blacksmithing and detective work while residing in Portland. Two years ago he left the city under a cloud of debt and shady transactions. He is well educated and is endowed with a peculiar cunning. When the late Captain Patrick Bruin engaged in the private detective business he took Hughes as a partner. When the partnership closed Bruin claimed that Hughes had \$1000 of company funds.
