Last Meeting of Club—The meeting of the Sunnyside Push club held last night was the last time the members of this organization will come together until September, as the meetings will be discontinued during the summer. Among the important matters discussed at last night's meeting was the movement looking to the establishment of a bank in Sunnyside. A number of business men were present, all of whom pledged their support to the movement, and they agreed to take stock and otherwise assist in the establishment of a bank. Ben S. Reiland, chairman of the committee engaged in drafting a law creating a public service commission, was present and addressed the club, telling of the progress being made by the committee. The chairman of the club was authorized to name a committee of two Democrats and two Republicans to interview the members of the county court and ask that the best citizens of the Sunnyside district be named for judges of election at the forthcoming primaries and general election.

Strawberries Are Whoppers—F. M. Wadsworth of Scappoose might be termed the Strawberry King. If that title could not be conferred on him for any reason still he might be called the Strawberry Prince. Mr. Wadsworth makes his home at The Cedars, where he has 1 1/2 acres of strawberries. He has been so successful that next year he intends to add 2 1/2 acres. Mr. Wadsworth some time ago received his sets from Michigan and is raising the Thompson No. 2 variety of berries. They are so large that one of his girl pickers filled 12 boxes in one day. The top of the berries are as big as the top of the box. He has been in the berry business for nearly 50 years. He contends that Oregon is the real home of the strawberry.

Kosses Money on Ship—Credence is put in the story of Samuel Astalos, of Everett, Wash., who charges he was robbed of \$175 while on his way from San Francisco to Portland on the steamer Beaver, and who likewise charges the officers of the craft with neglecting to aid him in any way in obtaining the return of the money. He believes John Kelly, a cabin boy, took the money, but declared the officers of the ship refused to have the boy jailed. Astalos has retained a Portland attorney to take up the case and prosecute Kelly if, by chance, the boy can be found.

Want Prices Fixed—Retail grocers are working with a view of having manufacturers fix minimum prices of their product in order to prevent rate slashing among dealers. The subject was discussed at a meeting of the local retail grocers' association at the Commercial club last night. Frank B. Connelly and John A. Stoll, prominent grocers of San Francisco, and Mr. Perry, delegates from Oregon to the retail grocers' convention, recently held at Springfield, Ill., addressed the meeting on the subject.

Brokers Kneel First—J. H. Ackerson, a real estate broker, has learned one cannot taunt the brothers Kredit into buying anything. He was taught a few things when he informed Ernest, Con and Andy Kredit that men earning good wages who could not afford to buy such fifty lots as he is selling, were hobos. In the municipal court yesterday the brothers Kredit forfeited \$25 bail in which they were held on charges of fighting. Ackerson swore they threatened to kill him.
