

THROWS BUNDLE OF MONEY IN THE SEA

It Is an Accident and Man Leaps Overboard and Saves Many Dollars.

New York, June 20.—Just as the last hawser was cast off and the White Star liner Arabic began to back slowly out into mid-stream, an excited man galloped down to the end of the pier, waving a bunch of greenbacks in one hand and beckoned wildly with the other for the ship to come back.

"Bet he's a ticket speculator," said a bystander, gazing hungrily at the bunch of greenbacks.

Appearances, however, were deceiving. The man was J. M. Cosgrove, a lawyer of 55 Broadway, and the greenbacks were for a young woman client who was on board.

Unfortunately the ship could not be stopped, so the panting Mr. Cosgrove hurriedly wrapped in a handkerchief his client's money, which amounted to \$218, and attempted to throw it aboard the vessel, then 50 feet away.

The handkerchief fell short and the young woman for whom its contents were intended and who had stretched forth her hands for it over the rail of the promenade deck burst into tears as she saw her money float away.

The action of the incident, however, had only just commenced.

Two stevedores had seen Mr. Cosgrove's futile throw. When they saw the handkerchief opened by the swirling ebb tide and the greenbacks scatter about the surface of the water they emitted simultaneous whoops and dived off the pier as one.

At this juncture Bo'sun Steve Lynch of the Arabic must be introduced to the reader.

Bo'sun to the Rescue.

Bo'sun Lynch was stationed at the bow of the big ship. He heard the splash as the stevedores hit the water. Turning around, he saw the men struggling in the tide, and, fearing that they were drowning, promptly dived to the rescue. The boat had no idea that the stevedores had merely jumped over to recover the greenbacks, and when he swam up and found that his life saving mission promised to develop into something so sordid as a money rescuing expedition he was the maddest man in the vicinity.

The stevedores prevailed upon him to help them collect the greenbacks, however, and when the three scrambled up on the pier a few minutes later they had between them \$120 of the original \$218. The remainder of the roll had been carried away by the tide.

The "salvage money" was immediately turned over to Lawyer Cosgrove. He peeled off a few of the wat bills as a reward for the stevedores and the boat's crew, and then hustled to the tug Tom F. Watkins, which took him and the boat's crew on a chase after the Arabic.

The tug caught the big liner before it had gone very far and Mr. Cosgrove had the satisfaction of turning what was left of the money over to his client, who immediately dried her eyes and commenced to take an interest in life again.

As it turned out it was a good thing for six persons besides the client that some of the money was recovered and taken out to the ship, for the tug brought back to the shore three women, two men and a boy who had not engaged passage aboard the Arabic. They had delayed too long in saying good-bye to their friends, and if the tug hadn't come out to the ship they might have been taken on an unpremeditated trip abroad.

He begins with a supper, but Trixie arrives in time to greet some of the guests in his absence and further complicates matters. She decides to leave for a convent, never to bother him again, and might even have carried out this dire threat had he not suddenly realized that he loved his own wife, whereupon the play ends as all good plays should, with everybody happy, the audience included.

Miss Jewel could hardly find a more congenial or delightful role than that of Trixie, the bewitching and irresponsible cause of it all. As an ingenue, Miss Jewel is at her best and her work this week is charming, although she could have groomed the first act a little more adroitly in keeping with her age and the character.

UNCLE SAM HAS GOOD POSITIONS TO OFFER

The United States civil service commission will hold examinations on July 20 to secure eligibles to fill positions of plant ecologist in the forest service. The positions will carry salaries of \$1200 per annum each. July 27 an examination will be held to secure a trained nurse in the isthmian canal. Philippine and Indian services.

To secure eligibles from which to make certification to fill vacancies as they may occur in the position of United States surveyor in the general land office, and other vacancies as they may occur in any branch of the service requiring similar qualifications, examinations will be held July 20-21.

Examinations will be held July 27 to secure eligibles to fill vacancies in the positions of assistant qualified in dairy chemistry and dairy bacteriology in the bureau of animal industry, department of agriculture.

To fill the position of laboratory aide in agricultural technology at \$600 per annum in the bureau of plant industry, department of agriculture, examinations will be held July 27.

Several positions in vacancies in the position of statistician in forest products at salaries ranging from \$1400 to \$1800 in the forest service, department of agriculture, will be filled by eligibles secured by examinations to be held July 27.

CIRCULATE PETITION FOR GOOD ROADS

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In Portland Charles Lenon has been put in charge of a force of men who are circulating the petition. Throughout Oregon branches of the Oregon Good Roads associations, Automobile associations, threshermen, granges, fruit growing associations and county judges have charge of the campaign. Ten thousand names are needed. The aim is to obtain \$20,000 as an evidence of the proposed constitutional amendment's popularity.

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
