

PROSPEROUS YEAR ENDS AT MT. ANGEL

Many Visitors Witness Concluding Exercises; Eight Receive Diplomas.

Mount Angel, Or., June 22.—Mount Angel college ended a prosperous year Tuesday afternoon, with the holding of the commencement exercises and the closing of her doors for the scholastic year. A large gathering of visitors was present to witness the exercises, and the students left immediately after for their various homes, to return when the school resumes, September 6. Eight diplomas and five gold medals were awarded. Archbishop Christie made the address and concluded the exercises with a short address. Rev. W. R. Daly of St. Mary's church, Portland, delivered the address of the day, and Frank Manning of the graduating class presented the address of welcome.

Tuesday was also the occasion of the alumni meeting, and many prominent men were present. Plans were made in a business meeting Tuesday afternoon for the celebration of Mount Angel college's silver jubilee in 1911. Last night a big banquet was served in the college dining hall.

Commencement Program.
The commencement program included, besides the addresses mentioned, a piano overture by the Rev. Father Dominic and Ambrose, O. S. B.; a mandolin solo by Casanova Lenti; a violin interlude by music class, under direction of Rev. Father Joseph, O. S. B.; and the rendition of Father Dominic's and Eva Emery Dye's musical composition and song, "The Oregon Grape," by Robert Beck and chorus.

Five gold medals are annually awarded, and these were given this year, as follows:
Archbishop's medal, for general excellence—Stephen A. DeMartini of Portland.

Lane medal, founded by Rev. Father Lane of Albany, for proficiency in Latin and Greek—Leo Furney of Astoria.

English medal, founded by a friend of the college for proficiency in English—Charles Mau of Portland.

President's medal, awarded by the president of the college for proficiency in religion—Louis Sander of Ashland.

For general excellence in the lower academics, awarded by the college—Robert Beck of Portland.

Diplomas were awarded as follows:
From the academy—Stephen DeMartini and Frank Manning of Portland, and Frank Steffen and J. Clark Murphy of Nampa, Idaho.

From the commercial department—Fred Albus of Sublimity; William Heymacker of Forest Grove; Albert Falla of Portland, and Charles Pick of Woodburn.

MAN'S DEATH MAY INVALIDATE ELECTION

Salem, Or., June 22.—The sudden demise of W. J. Crabtree, who dropped dead in a fit of anger at Crabtree in Lin county about 10 days ago during a quarrel with a neighbor, has had more effect and more dire results than at first was counted upon. An important school election held Monday in his precinct which provided for the union of three districts for high school purposes may be invalidated because of Crabtree's death.

Mr. Crabtree was a member of the school board for his district. It had been left to him by his associates to post the notices for the forthcoming school election. The law is specific where it provides that notices must be posted 10 days before the election in certain conspicuous places when a union of districts for high school purposes is an issue at the election.

The result of the election was largely in favor of the contemplated union in all of the districts interested but in the central district Mr. Crabtree died and the notices were forgotten. They were put up, but not until nine days before the date of the election. As a result, those who oppose the union will attempt to have the election set aside as invalid.

Hermiston School Election.

Hermiston, June 22.—The regular school election of the school board took place today, and Dr. Rose was elected to fill the vacancy of H. T. Irvin, whose term had expired. H. T. SOCIETY FINDS OLDEST WHITE WOMAN WEST OF MISSISSIPPI RIVER

The present meeting of the pioneers of Oregon has brought out nothing more interesting than the discovery of the oldest white woman born and living west of the Mississippi river. Her name is Mrs. Adrian LaChapelle. She was born at Vancouver, in 1821. The peculiar part of it is that she has been living at St. Louis, Or., or Butteville, for the past 40 years, and it was not until yesterday that her existence became known to the Oregon Historical society, or the Pioneers' association.

Though 89 years of age, Mrs. LaChapelle does a great deal of sewing and knitting and is never idle. She is active and retains her mental faculties to a remarkable degree. She remembers many incidents of her childhood days, and talks interestingly, through an interpreter, of the olden days.

She does not speak English, but she understands English perfectly. Her father located a farm in the 30's, at about where East Twenty-third street now is, but he gave it up. It did not appeal to him as a suitable place to live. Later he scattered on a claim near St. Louis, and remained there the rest of his life.

Mrs. LaChapelle has several great-grandchildren, and she says that she thinks she has about 100 descendants. She has 10 children living, all of whom have grandchildren.

The aged woman doesn't like the streetcars and automobiles. She says she is afraid of them, and to ride in the cars makes her dizzy.

WOMAN PROTESTS WORD "WOMEN" IN AMENDMENT

Salem, Or., June 22.—Miss Myrtle E. Pease of Portland called at the office of the secretary of state Tuesday morning to record a kick against the title prepared by the attorney general for the woman's suffrage amendment to the constitution, proposed by the initiative. The title will be changed. Attorney General Crawford had made the title to read:

"Women's taxpaying suffrage amendment, granting to all taxpayers, regardless of sex, the right of suffrage."

That was unsatisfactory to the suffragettes, so the word "women's" will be eliminated and the word "citizens" substituted.

The amendment proposed this time contemplates giving suffrage only to those women who pay taxes.

INDIAN AND CHINESE GRADUATES AT YALE

New Haven, Conn., June 22.—In the class of nearly 800 graduates who received their diplomas today at the annual commencement exercises of Yale university the three who attracted most attention were Robert Alphonse Taft, son of the president; Cheng-t'ing Thomas Wang of Ningpo, China, and Henry Red Cloud of the Winnebago tribe of Indians. The last named is the first American Indian ever to graduate from Yale.

The formal exercises of commencement day began at 10 o'clock this morning. In accordance with custom, they included the singing of the first four verses of the Sixty-fifth Psalm, which was sung in 1718 on the occasion of the opening of the first college erected in New Haven.

The dinner of the alumni in the university dining hall followed the commencement exercises. At the conclusion of the dinner there was an elaborate program of toasts and responses, including a greeting from President Taft.

BLASTED STUMP FRACTURES SKULL

Roseburg, Or., June 22.—Mrs. Albert Willis, wife of a farmer at Wolf Creek, Josephine county, is in the Mercy hospital here with a fractured skull as a result of being struck by a flying piece of wood while her husband was blasting stumps. The accident occurred last Saturday noon. The piece of wood was hurled 150 yards to where she was standing. She was brought to this city Sunday night.

Miller's National Federation.

Minneapolis, Minn., June 22.—A convention with over 700 delegates from all parts of the United States and from several foreign countries, representing more invested capital, probably, than any other convention ever held in Minneapolis, is the annual meeting of the Miller's National Federation, which opened here today with headquarters at the West hotel. The sessions will continue three days, during which time numerous questions of interest and importance to the milling fraternity will be discussed. At the close of the convention, Saturday night, a majority of the delegates will leave by special train for an excursion through Yellowstone Park.

Conference of Charities.

Guelph, Ont., June 22.—The eleventh annual meeting of the Canadian conference of charities and correction convened here today with President J. P. Downey, M. P. P., in the chair. The conference, which will continue its sessions three days, has brought together several hundred men and women who have made their life's work the scientific study of the best means of caring for or reforming the defective and incorrigible, feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, educating the ignorant and reforming the reprobate. The program provides for the discussion of a wide variety of subjects.

Estate of Chauncey Ball.

Twenty thousand dollars is the value of the estate of Chauncey Ball, as shown in the county court. He died on June 2 and left no will. The heirs besides Margaret C. Ball, the widow, are five children, Henry C., Edward J., Clark H. and Mildred B. Ball and Laura M. Markham.

By the will of Annie E. Myers an estate valued at \$12,000 is disposed of. Clarence A. Hogan is bequeathed \$500 and Miss Adeline Striegler \$200. Jewelry and family helpmeets are divided between Mrs. David P. Leach and Mrs. Anna B. Hogan. All the remainder of the property goes to a nephew, Harry Blaisdell Hall, recently of Rockland, Me.

\$4000 Raised for Church.

Hood River, Or., June 22.—At the Sunday morning service the Aubrey M. E. church, Dr. T. B. Ford exhibited the plans and drawings of the proposed M. E. church to be erected on the site of the old building. The building will be of stone. It will have a seating capacity of about 300 and will be furnished with a pipe organ. Dr. Ford called for an immediate subscription. Sunday morning and \$4000 was raised.

GOOD PICKIN' IN CITY OF MEDFORD

G. L. Davis, at Least, Finds It So; Starts on \$2.40, Now Bank President.

That there is plenty of loose change in southern Oregon is attested to by George L. Davis, president of the Farmers' & Fruitgrowers bank of Medford, and the Bank of Jacksonville, of Jacksonville.

The Farmers' & Fruitgrowers bank was opened for business two days before Christmas, 1909, and now has deposits to the amount of over \$200,000. This is all the more remarkable when it is considered that Medford already had three banks doing a large volume of business when the Farmers' & Fruitgrowers bank was opened.

George L. Davis came to Oregon from Kansas for the benefit of his wife's health. He arrived at Medford with \$2.40 in his left hand pocket and he had a mighty interesting time keeping the wolf from the door and from climbing into the back window. He finally got a few dollars together—\$12, to be exact—and with them started a feed store. Two years later he was operating a grocery store on a small scale and his business increased until he was conducting one of the largest grocery stores in the southern part of the state.

Mr. Davis is a firm believer in advertising. So extensive and effective were his advertisements that the Klammath Indians traveled hundreds of miles past grocery stores and towns to trade at the Davis grocery store at Medford.

ALIBI FAILED TO SAVE DEFENDANT

Robber Tries to Convince Jury He Was Asleep When Bridge Watchman Assaulted.

An alibi unsupported by any witness except himself failed to save William Herron, alias Larry Dempsey, in the circuit court yesterday afternoon, where he was on trial for robbery and assault with a hammer upon J. H. Lovelace, watchman on the east end of the Madison street bridge.

With little delay the jury found him guilty. He declared he was sleeping in a Japanese lodging house at the time Lovelace was robbed, but he was positively identified by Lovelace and by Patrolman Arthur L. Pressey. The latter testified he arrested Herron about midnight for drunkenness and the prisoner was turned loose the next morning by Captain Glover, he not then being suspected of the robbery.

Herron was arrested in Spokane, Wash., several days after the affair and brought back to Portland by Pressey. On the stand yesterday Herron admitted having served two years in San Quentin, Cal., for assault. He said he hit a "scab" who went to work for less wages than the rest. Herron is a structural ironworker. He will be sentenced later by Judge Kavanaugh.

LAUREL, WASH., SOON TO BE ON BIG BOOM

White Salmon, Wash., June 22.—To meet the anticipated large demand for lumber as the result of railroad construction through the valley, Peck Brothers, of the Laurel Milling company, have the plans drawn and specifications made for an enlargement of their allied industries. They include the most modern equipment in band saws, gang saws, dry kilns, planing and other wood-working machinery. The capacity of the mill is yet to be decided. Several buildings are already planned to go up as soon as the mill starts. Laurel precinct is having a boom, and when country division comes—as it inevitably will—a movement will be started to make it the county seat.
