

WOULD REMODEL MAP OF OREGON BY REFERENDUM

Total Proposed New Counties
Now 7, and Possibly More—
Will Probably Be 31 Meas-
ures on Ballot.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., June 22.—Though initiative petitions have already been presented at the office of the secretary of state which propose by direct enactment to create five new Oregon counties next November, petitions are still being circulated in different parts of the state asking the electorate to create two additional ones, making the list of new counties to be created by the people at the next general election a total of seven. Four of these new counties are to be located in eastern Oregon and three in western Oregon. If they all carry, the map of Oregon will be so badly mutilated the state's own sons will be unable to recognize it.

Petitions have already been presented for the creation of Nesmith and Umpqua counties. These counties are to be located in the upper Willamette valley, and will depend for their territory on the counties of Lane and Douglas. Petitions are being circulated that have for their object the enactment of an act to create Williams county, in the same vicinity, and overlapping the boundaries of the proposed Umpqua and Nesmith counties.

Redmond Ambitions.
In eastern Oregon already proposals have been so far consummated as to bring about the filing of petitions for the creation of Otsu county from parts of Malheur, Harney and Grant; Orchard county mainly from northeastern Umatilla, and Clarke county mainly from the north portion of Grant county. Petitions are being circulated for the creation of Deschutes county out of the north portion of Crook. Redmond will be made the county seat of Deschutes county, the boundary excluding Bend by about six miles and Prineville about four miles.

Such is the county situation as presented by the initiative. All petitions must be filed by July 1 and arguments in their favor by July 4. The indications are that by that time there will be at least 31 measures on the ballot of the general election to be held Tuesday, November 8, and now county propositions bid fair not to be the least item on the long ballot. Nineteen measures have already been filed.

Seven County Changes.
Among the 19 already filed are the five county projects named; two other proposals to annex portions of Washington and Clatsop counties to Multnomah county, making seven county changes and with the two more sure to be filed, a total of nine; a salary bill, enacted by the legislature and referred by the people, which provided for the increase of the salary of the circuit judge who sits in Baker county; two taxation amendments to the constitution referred by the legislature; an amendment allowing the state to build its own railroads; a bill for a constitutional convention and a bill for redistricting the state for representative purposes in the legislature, all proposed or referred by the 1909 legislature; a bill for the establishment of a branch hospital in eastern Oregon, also referred by the legislature; women's suffrage amendment; a state-wide prohibition bill; an employers' liability act; a bill to abolish the poll tax and making other reforms in taxation; an act proposing to allow cities and towns to control the sale of liquors, and one measure providing for the maintenance and support of a state normal school at Monmouth, all by initiative petition.

AMERICAN GIRL WEDS ENGLISHMAN

Helen Post Becomes Bride To-
day of M. Eliot, Groom-in-
Waiting to King.

London, June 22.—The third and last of the series of notable Anglo-American weddings solemnized in London this month took place today at St. George's church, Hanover Square, when Miss Helen Agnes Post became the bride of Montague Charles Eliot.

The church was filled, the guests including Ambassador and Mrs. Whitelaw Reid, the staff of the American embassy, and most of the Americans prominent in London society, besides many friends of the groom's family. Lord Barrymore, stepfather of Miss Post, gave away the bride, who was attended by two pages and several bridesmaids. The latter included Miss Dorothy Smith Barry, the bride's half sister, Miss Claire Frewen, and the young daughter of Sir Bache and Lady Cunard.

The bride's gown was of rich, white satin, draped with priceless old lace, with a wreath of orange blossoms holding in place the Brussels lace veil. Her only jewel was a pendant given by the bridegroom.

After the ceremony a reception was held at the home of Mrs. Eliot in Curzon street, an aunt of the bride. Over a thousand invitations were accepted and the handsome house, which was beautifully decorated with flowers, was crowded with guests. The presents were numerous and costly, including diamond tiaras and necklaces and other jewels.

The marriage of Miss Post and Mr. Eliot is entirely a love match, and neither the bride nor bridegroom has a superabundance of this world's goods. The bride comes of American stock, though she has passed most of her years in London. Her mother was the daughter of General James Wadsworth of Genesee, N. Y., who fell in the battle of the Wilderness. In early life she married Arthur Post. After his death she became the wife of Lord Barrymore.

The bride has been a favorite in high society since her coming out in 1908. Two of her intimate friends are the Crown Princess of Sweden, who is the elder daughter of the Duke of Connaught, and the Crown Princess of Romania, who is a cousin of King George. Montague Eliot, the bridegroom, was in the personal entourage of King Edward as groom-in-waiting and it is said that he is to be retained in a similar capacity by King George. His father was the late Lieutenant Colonel Charles Eliot and his grandfather the third Earl of St. Germans. The Countess of Hesselborough and Lady Layard are his aunts.

REGENTS ELECT NEW PROFESSORS AT EUGENE

University of Oregon, Eugene, June 22.—At the regents' meeting today two new professors were elected to fill vacancies in the faculty. Professor Lusky was elected to take the place of Professor H. W. Kheeler in the German department. Professor Kheeler has been granted a year's leave to study in Europe, and Professor Lusky will fill his place in the interim. After several years' vacancy, the geological department has a head to take the place of the famous Professor Thomas Condon, deceased, who held the chair for many years, and was a man with a world-wide reputation in his field. The new man will be Professor A. M. Collier.

The regents also indorsed the recommendation of the faculty for granting 125 diplomas for work completed satisfactorily in the various departments of the university.

DALLES CITY ELECTION PASSES OFF QUIETLY

The Dalles, Or., June 22.—The annual city election resulted in the election of the following officers: Mayor, E. M. Wingate, reelected; treasurer, E. Kurtz, reelected; water commissioner at large, N. J. Sinnott, reelected; councilman of first ward, T. N. Crofton; water commissioner, T. A. Hudson; second ward councilman, P. J. Stadelman; reelected; water commissioner, J. D. Kelly; third ward councilman, J. W. Koontz; water commissioner, Vincent Circle, reelected. This is the first election held in this city since the corrupt practices law went into effect. There were no button-holing and electioneering, and every voter was allowed to go to the polls and express his choice for officers without being importuned by strikers.

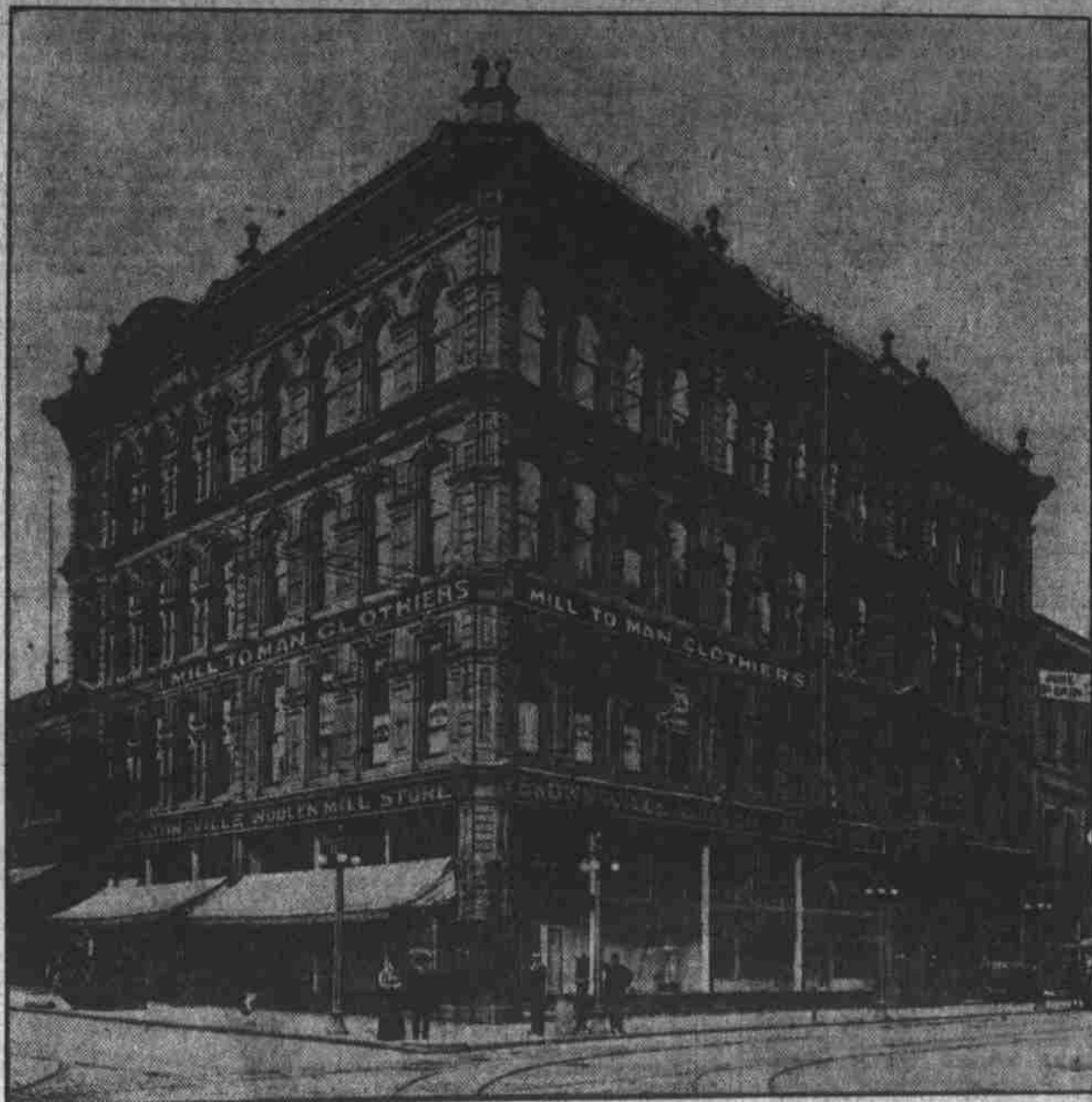
