Everyone is guessing how the contest for Boy Mayor of Portland is going to terminate. Will the newsboys be able to win the fight to elect their candidate, or will a boy from one of the schools be successful?

Until yesterday it seemed that the newsboys really had the fight won. Their candidate, Weinstein, led comfortably. Then came an afternoon rally. Don Tarpley's friends voted many times, and he reached second place. The fight is now among Weinstein's constituents to keep Tarpley from reaching first place.

Voting will undoubtedly be more brisk Saturday. If some of the candidates have "votes up their sleeves" Saturday will show numerous changes in the order of the list presented today.

Boy week in Portland will be significant. The beginning toward teaching boys the fundamental principles of government will be commenced. The importance of clean politics and impartial administration will be impressed upon them. Plans for the club house will be developed simultaneously with plans for culture and uplift among boys whose lives hitherto have been pretty much spent on the street.

While the boy mayor and his assistants are governing the town the boys from the Columbia Park club will be showing what boys can do by spending their time in learning instead of on the streets. There will be three days packed solid with good times. The nature of entertainment has already been told in detail. Probably most important of all will be the council meeting over which the boy mayor presides, and which will conclude the week. What the boys want is the way of good government will be listened to patiently and action will be taken. If any of the fathers try to force their way into the session, and the exclusion order, effective with the regular council, is not enforced, then strict attention will be given to please for more work and less play, more study and less wishing for school to dismis.

State May Win Estate.

LA Grande, Or., June 23.—Real estate valued at \$25,000, the property of John Morrison prior to his death two years ago, will go to the state of Oregon unless the supreme court reverses a decision reached by a jury in an estate case at midnight last night. The case had once been up to the supreme court and had been set back for retrial. Last night's verdict is the state's second victory. Morrison's fortune, which included some \$20,000 in cash, was divided among five heirs, on orders of the probate court, and then the state started escheat proceedings. The state introduced evidence to show Morrison was of illegitimate parentage.
