

GOES TO ESTABLISH CAMP FOR BOYS

J. C. Clark of Y. M. C. A., Takes
Amount of Equipment
to Spirit Lake.

J. C. Clark, secretary of the boys' department of the Portland Young Men's Christian Association, left today for Spirit Lake where he will take preliminary steps to establish the boys' camp to be conducted there this summer by the Y. M. C. A. of Clatsop county, accompanied by several of the association boys and they took with them a large amount of the equipment to be used in the camp.

The first group of boys will leave for the camp on July 1. They will go down the Columbia and up the Cowlitz, using the Y. M. C. A. launch, and will cover the remaining distance on foot, carrying their bedding and camp kit. It is expected that between 40 and 50 will go at that time.

Other groups of boys will go out from Portland each week and those at the camp will return as they desire. The camp will probably be maintained until early in September and is expected that several hundred boys will enjoy outings there. Besides the members of the boys' department of the Y. M. C. A., several clubs and groups of boys from various Portland churches plan to go. Among those who will make the trip are the Barons of the First Presbyterian, the Knights of the Temple of the White Temple, and boys from the Third Presbyterian, Sunnyside Methodist and First Christian churches.

Spirit Lake lies at the foot of Mount St. Helens and is one of the most beautiful spots in the northwest. The present summer may be the last one that campers may have a monopoly of its beauties, as a scheme is on foot to establish there a colony of summer homes, as was announced in The Journal yesterday.

Fishing, boating and excursions to the top of St. Helens are some of the pleasures in store for boys who make the trip. It is also planned to maintain a summer school at the lake for boys who desire to make up studies in which they are behind. Mr. Clark will have charge of the camp, and other Y. M. C. A. secretaries will look after the studies and the sports of the boys.

YEAR BOOK REFLECTS CREDIT UPON STUDENTS

"The Portlandia," the first year book issued by the students of Washington high school, under supervision of the senior class, is a most interesting and well written little volume pertaining to school life, and reflects unbounded credit upon those immediately responsible for its contents. It is a volume of some 230 pages, beautifully bound and illustrated.

The arrangement of subjects, the character of material, and its general treatment compares favorably with year books of much more pretentious and older institutions. Much good poetry, excellent short stories, sidelights of student life, athletic records and other matters intimately related to high school affairs, are features of "The Portlandia." The foreword of the volume is suggestive of the happy and enthusiastic vein in which the year book is edited: "The first Portlandia—We here present it to you, parents, friends and schoolmates. With all its faults, we are proud of it, for it is the work of students alone—the product of their initiative and perseverance."

The class poem, which opens the volume, is by Mary C. Davies, and is a fitting example of the joy and delight of the "sweet girl graduate" wherever she may be.

Y. W. C. A. GIRLS GO TO ATTEND CONFERENCE

The northwest conference of the Young Women's Christian Association begins tomorrow at Long Beach, Wash. The excursion steamer, T. J. Potter, left Portland this morning, bearing about 45 delegates from Oregon, Montana and Idaho. The Potter will land at Meigs and a special train will carry the delegates from that point. The conference will last ten days, closing July 4. At Long Beach the Breakers, the leading hotel, will be exclusively given up to the Y. W. C. A. girls.

The conference at Long Beach is one of seven held each year under the auspices of the National Y. W. C. A. board. Miss Caroline Dow, from the national board, New York city, has charge of the conference, and she is assisted by Miss Emma Hays of New York city, Miss Francis C. Gage, city secretary for the northwest, and Miss Lucy J. Hopkins, student secretary for the northwest.

There will probably be 25 representatives from the Portland association. A number will leave tomorrow and more next week. The conventions are schools for Christian workers. The instructors are well known men. Professor William J. Hutchins, of Oberlin college, will be the lecturer in Bible study. Professor Norman F. Coleman of Whitman college, and Dr. Benjamin P. Young, pastor of the Taylor street Methodist church, Dr. S. L. B. Penrose, of Walla Walla, and Mrs. Carrie F. Barge from Tacoma are also among the instructors. Afternoons will be given up to recreation and games. The purpose is to combine fun with serious study.

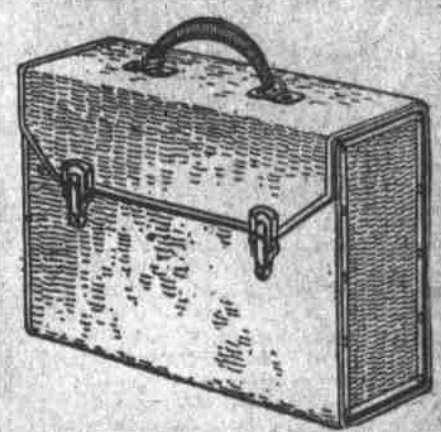
