

HIS BAIL REDUCED, GUILFORD IS FREED; CAMERON OBJECTS

Youth Accused of Attempting to Bribe Juror Gains Liberty; Bail Cut to \$1250 Over Protest of District Attorney.

Howard W. Guilford, who is held on a charge of attempting to bribe a juror in the W. Cooper Morris bank case, was released from the county jail yesterday afternoon on bail of \$1250. The amount was reduced from \$5000. He had been held in jail for about five weeks.

Arguments for the bail reduction were made yesterday afternoon before Judge Morrow. Attorney Campbell and Geeslin, representing Guilford, argued that the bail was excessive in view of recent facts that have become known in connection with the case, and that Guilford is anxious to stand trial, and he wants a chance to show what were the motives and who are the persons who were back of him in the deal. Campbell further argued that the district attorney's office had shown a disposition to allow the case to drag along, and that it was an injustice to keep the boy locked up until the fall term of court.

Cameron Objects. District Attorney Cameron appeared, and contended the bail should not be reduced. He said the charge is grave, and the state wishes to be sure that Guilford will be here when the case is called for trial, which, under all probabilities will not be until the September term of court.

Judge Morrow said that a much different light had been shed on the case lately, and that he saw no reasons for the young man not appearing when the case is ready for trial. He ordered the bail to be placed at \$1250. The prisoner was released from jail after 3 o'clock.

Many Praise Guilford. Attorney Campbell exhibited letters from former employers of Guilford, and from several prominent business men. All spoke highly of him. Guilford recently gave out what he said was the true story of the affair. He said he had been coached to approach the juror by "Bob" Patterson, who is connected with a notorious saloon and resort in the North end. Guilford further says that Patterson told him to do the work as Attorney J. J. Fitzgerald, chief deputy district attorney, wanted to smother the reputation of Attorneys Seneca Potts and Alexander Sweet, who were representing Morris in the bank case. It was a political and personal grudge, Fitzgerald had against the two men, said Patterson.

Guilford has secured employment and will remain in Portland.

ONLY TWO APPLICANTS WANT INSPECTORSHIP

Only two applications have been made to Building Inspector Plummer for the position recently provided for by the council. This position is for general work that falls in the line of the building inspector, and carries a salary of \$100 a month. One of the applicants is uncertain that he will remain in the city, and the other has not had sufficient experience to handle the work.

The enormous amount of building this season was the cause of added help for the office. Still more help is needed, but the council saw fit to provide only one new place. With the beginning of the next year, however, provision will be made for a further enlargement of the office force.

The qualifications for the new position are that a person shall be thoroughly familiar with carpenter and contract work. He should have had at least five years' experience in building lines, and should have a good knowledge of mechanical draughting.

CAMPAIGN FOR COMMISSION PLAN Committee Reports New York Has Best System of Regulating Corporations.

A determined campaign to secure the appointment of a public service commission through an initiative petition and the election of next November has been commenced by a committee from united east side clubs. The drafting of the law is already under way.

"Portland has grown into great need of a public service commission to regulate public service corporations," said Ben Riesland, chairman of the public service central committee, yesterday.

"Our telephone rents are being unreasonably advanced. Our street railway service is in many instances inadequate. Other public service corporations give indifferent service. But what is our relief? Nothing.

"We may go to President Roosevelt to complain of our service or the need for new tracks, but we are continually reminded that he does not represent us, but the company, whose stockholders like to draw big dividends. The same thing holds true in the case of abuse in telephones or in taxicabs. The heads of the companies may make promises, but corporate promises are seldom kept.

"We have through months of investigation learned that New York has the most perfect and complete public service commission among all cities. The voice of the humblest citizen is heard either night or day, if lifted up in complaint. All complaints are heard. The commission sits as an intermediary board between the citizens and the corporations. Neither is wronged and all are benefited because of the commission. Satisfaction obtains for all, and abuses are not possible."

The committee consists of Mr. Riesland, H. C. Van Dyke, A. W. Martin, H. G. Brand, Rev. Father Gregory, Dan Kellaheer and J. Woods Smith.

WHIRLWIND FINISH FOR BOND SALE

Business Men Expected Tuesday to Demonstrate Desire for Broadway Bridge

Tuesday is the day appointed by Mayor Simon for a whirlwind finish to the campaign for sale of \$250,000 Broadway bridge by popular subscription. It is the day for the business men of Portland to demonstrate that the great desire they have evinced for the Broadway bridge's construction be made tangible in the form of bond purchases.

"I believe the big effort will be successful," said Mayor Simon yesterday. "I am receiving assurances that the business interests of the city are fully alive to the critical nature of the situation. They should all know that if the Broadway bridge is built now it will be because they have furnished the cash. But this is not a charitable proposition. The bonds are the best kind of an investment. They are perfectly safe. No buyer will ever lose by their purchase. They are a safe, long time investment, 30 years at 4 per cent.

"There is no obstruction to the sale of the bonds or the construction of the bridge that cannot be removed by determined effort. I think I shall know just how great that determination is after Tuesday."

EIGHTY RELATIVES OF KELLY FAMILY MEET

Eighty relatives and 20 other guests of the Kelly family gathered yesterday at the Kelly homestead farm on the Section Line for the twelfth annual reunion of the Kelly clan. The affair was conducted by Mrs. Eva A. Kelly and her son James Kelly who lives on the old homestead.

Besides being the twelfth annual reunion of the Kelly clan the assembly was the sixtieth anniversary of the founding of the Kelly homestead farm by Plympton Kelly, who died four years ago, and the fiftieth anniversary of the arrival of Elizabeth Clark Kelly. The company assembled at 11 o'clock in the forenoon and an elaborate dinner was served at 1 o'clock, after which the rock pile at the famous Kelly Butte was visited. The rest of the day was spent in a general reunion and a social time interspersed with music and other features.

7269 REGISTERED; YESTERDAY POOR DAY

Yesterday afternoon, at the close of the third week of registration, the Multnomah county rolls show a total of 7269 names. The third week, with a total of 3255, was less than the week previous by 600, but was 100 greater than the first week. By parties the registration shows 5625 Republicans, 985 Democrats and 588 of other faiths or independent. Although Saturday would be supposed a good day for registration, there was a decided falling off yesterday. It was the poorest day since the books were opened, the total for the 24 hours being 248. As the campaign warms up and candidates become more active the registration is expected to respond to the impulse, but those who are wise will register early, to avoid the rush that is sure to come later on.

SATURDAY HALF HOLIDAY FOR CITY HALL EMPLOYEES

Beginning with next Saturday, city hall employees will be given that afternoon off during July and August. The first afternoon is to be dedicated to a baseball game between the city hall team and a team selected from the employees at the court house. This game is to be played at Multnomah field.

Many of the offices about the city hall yesterday afternoon had the appearance of being deserted. In the offices where business is slack few employees were kept on duty. Usually everything is kept up to date, and all office work put out of the way by noon. The auditor's office was the busiest yesterday. Here many communications and papers are filed, which necessitate the greater part of the office force being on hand.

STRIKERS REPORT 14 DRAYMEN SIGN THEIR AGREEMENT

Encouraged by News That This Number Out of 35 Decide to Employ Union Men and Resume Business.

Features of encouragement for the union men were introduced into the teamsters strike situation yesterday. Fourteen of about 35 transfer companies were reported as having signed the agreement demanded by the strikers before they would return to work. These were the Green Transfer company, Package Delivery company, Rathjen, Shorty, W. E. Dunivan, Dolph Miller, O. F. Hussey, A. C. Whitesides, Hellewell, C. M. Olsen, J. O. Anderson, Noland, W. H. Jones Milling company, Olsen & Roe, transfer companies. To these companies the strikers have returned and work will proceed as before the strike.

It was also reported that the Draymen's association had 68 teams at work during yesterday, and that 40 of these were manned by the employers or their foremen.

There seems to be no definite desire on the part of either employers or strikers to arbitrate their differences. Reports from the freight depots, docks and warehouses is to the effect that freight shipments are more badly congested than ever. A peculiarly irksome feature of the strike consists in the number of men in other lines of work that are compelled to be idle because the teamsters have stopped their work. The loss to all concerned has already amounted to many thousands of dollars, and there seems no prospect for immediate relief, except for those companies that have agreed to the union demands.

COURT REDUCES STEVENS' BOND

As Tax Collector It Was \$150,000; Now \$50,000; Sheriff Saves Money.

Sheriff Stevens' bond as tax collector of the county has been reduced by the county court from \$150,000 to \$50,000 for the six months from July until January 1, 1911. During this period, the taxes for 1909 being now nearly all collected, the larger bond is not regarded as necessary, and by the reduction several dollars will be saved to the sheriff.

Ordinarily the bond of county officers runs from one year to another. Heretofore their terms have expired in July, but the law changing the date of elections also extended the terms of present officials for six months. It is for this extra six months the bond of the sheriff will be reduced. Beginning next January, when the money begins to come in from the new tax roll, the bond will again be raised. Sheriff Stevens gives a separate bond to guarantee faithful performance of his duties as sheriff, apart from the collection of taxes, and this bond is not affected by the decrease of the other.

HOTEL MEN TO FIGHT PROHIBITION MOVE

At a meeting of the executive committee of the Oregon State Hotel association, held yesterday afternoon, George Dixon, publisher of the Northwest Hotel News, was made assistant secretary and commissioned to carry out important work for the association. The hotel association was organized about two years ago and has accomplished many important things since that time. The hotel men assert that the prohibition movement is aimed directly at their interests, and the association will make it a business to fight the prohibition movement in the coming campaign.

Among the Portland members of the Oregon association are the following hotels: The Imperial, the Oregon, the Portland, the Perkins, the Nortonia, the Cornwell and the Belvedere. The American Hotel Men's Protective association, with which the more prominent hotels of Portland are affiliated, will hold its third annual convention in Portland this year. Arrangements will be made to entertain the visitors, among whom will be some of the most prominent hotel men in America.

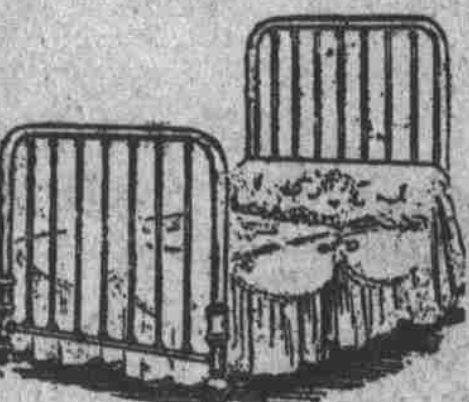
