

REPUBLICAN PARTY SPLIT IN MAIN IN NORTH DAKOTA

Five Candidates for Governor,
Not Including Democrat—
Stalwarts Bitter Against the
Progressives.

Bismarck, N. D., June 27.—A political campaign that presents many interesting features is being brought to a whirlwind finish in North Dakota. Day after tomorrow the voters of the state will participate in a general primary for the selection of candidates for two United States senators, two representatives in congress, governor and other state officers and justices of the state supreme court.

The fight between the stalwart and progressive factions of the Republican party has waged for nearly a year and with the near approach of the primary election it has steadily increased in intensity. Each faction has a candidate for each office, and in addition there are several candidates running independently for governor and congress.

Indorse Taft Administration.
The progressives claim that the stalwarts are corporation tools, allies of Aldrich and Cannon, and that the wave of protest against the Washington machine is going to sweep North Dakota clean next Wednesday. They are centering their fire on Senator P. J. McCumber, and to a less extent on Congressman L. B. Hanna, both of whom are candidates for reelection. The progressive platform commends Theodore Roosevelt and indorses the Taft administration. It deals with the Payne-Aldrich tariff measure in the following language:

"While we firmly adhere to the principles of protection, we do not believe that the promises of the Republican national platform, nor sacred pledges to the people, are fulfilled in the Payne-Aldrich law. We believe the tariff should be further revised with a view to protect more equally the interests of the consumer, upon whom falls the heavy burden of over-protection and resulting increase in the cost of living."

Bitter Against Progressives.
The stalwarts have been extremely bitter in their attacks on the progressives. First of all, they dispute their opponents' exclusive title to the name "progressive." They call the progressive leaders "irregulars," and declare the latter are hostile to the Taft administration, and that the progressive idols, the insurgent members of congress, blocked the Taft legislative program. The old stalwarts take the stand that they are the administration Republicans, standing for real party progress, and the "progressives" are nothing but political disturbers, trying to ride into office on a popular wave.

Tom F. Marshall is the progressive candidate against Senator McCumber for the long term and he has waged a vigorous campaign. The candidates for the short term for senator are Edward Engerud of Fargo, for the stalwarts, and Congressman A. J. Gronna for the progressives. The field is open to independent candidates, and two have filed for the senate. They are Dennis Hannifin, squatter governor of North Dakota, and H. N. Mithe, of Donnybrook. Neither is expected to cut much figure in the result of the contest.

There are eight candidates for the two congressional nominations. H. T. Helgeson, of Milton, and Judge W. S. Lauder, of Wahpeton, have the progressive indorsement. Congressman L. B. Hanna, of Fargo, is indorsed by the stalwarts. Other candidates in the field are John Fittie, of Villaton; James Johnson, of Minot; Thomas R. Moeckler, of Bismarck; and Alfred Blaisdell, president of the state. The chances for the success of Congressman Hanna are generally considered very good, though he is the object of fierce attack.

Gubernatorial Candidates.
The situation in regard to the Republican gubernatorial nomination is very complicated. The progressive candidate is James A. Buchanan, who ran for treasurer two years ago. C. A. Johnson, of Minot, who headed the Republican ticket two years ago, has the indorsement of the stalwarts. Three independent candidates are in the running and are expected to draw from the leaders. In addition to the governorship, there are several interesting contests on for other places on the state ticket.

In regard to the judicial nominations a new plan is to be tried for the first time. According to this plan, the supreme court justices will be voted for on a separate ballot. There are no party designations, and men of all parties will vote the same ballot. There are three places to fill, and the six who stand highest will be put on the general election ballot. From them the three will be chosen.

In view of the split in the Republican ranks, the Democrats of North Dakota have high hopes of victory this year. They confidently expect to elect Governor John Burke for a third term. There are usually twice as many Republicans as there are Democrats in North Dakota, and the Democrats are expected to be elected governor twice, and perhaps three times, is making the Republican leaders keep awake. The Democrats hope to elect their entire state ticket, but are not counting much on the United States senatorship, as the legislature is always overwhelmingly Republican.

"THE THREE OF US" BRIGHT COMEDY

A prettier or more effective vehicle than "The Three of Us" could hardly have been chosen to leave pleasant recollections of the present Baker stock company or to close this popular old house, which has furnished diversions for multitudes of people for so many years.

The interest of the play never flags. It is one of the happy blendings of comedy and heart interest which starts the tears and wipes them away with a laugh. It is to be regretted that Frances Slosson is not in the cast, but one and all the members who play "The Three of Us" handle their parts with striking success.

Isabella Jewel gave one of the best characterizations of her present engagement. There was a genuineness, a brightness and depth of feeling in her portrayal which made the part more than a mimicry, which made it rise to the heights and marked it as something real. She filled the part with delightful light and shade, and was strikingly effective in her big third act scenes.

Franklin Underwood's part is best at the beginning, and could not have been improved upon. The life of the big outdoors came in with him in the first act, and his joyous abandon and bright hopes for the future were good to see. The remainder of the part was played with dignity, strength and discrimination, all of which are necessary to make the character count as it did.

As the wayward and headstrong brother Clem, Dan Bruce was ideal. It is by far the best thing he has done. His emotional work rang true, and the part as a whole showed the real dramatic power which he possesses.

John W. Sherman, too, was at his best, and has never showed to such advantage. His performance was smooth and easy, and he played his big scenes with telling effect.

Margo Duffett was ideally suited to her part. She has never looked more stunning, and the vivacity with which she invested the part made her wholly delightful.

Lillian Andrews, who seemed like an importation from old Ireland, was a tremendous favorite with her various vocal contributions, to say nothing of her second act costume.

Benjamin Horning had little to do, but as usual did it well. Ralph Lee, opposite Underwood, as Hop Wing, and Mamie Haslam as Sonny, the youngster. The scenery was artistic and complete in every detail.

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INDIANS THROW OFF SAVAGERY

Representatives of Every Tribe
to Meet at Muskogee, Okla.,
This Week.

Muskogee, Okla., June 27.—The big conference of Indians which is to hold forth this week at which the leaders of the red men will discuss the final abandonment of tribal customs and laws and the preparation of the Indian for the enjoyment of all the privileges of American citizenship is attracting much attention. The conference is proclaimed as the last big gathering of its kind to be held by the aborigines of the American continent.

The Commercial club of Muskogee is the sponsor for the movement and it has invited many prominent representatives of the various departments of the

federal government to confer with the Indian chiefs. Others interested in the welfare of the Indian have also been asked to take part and to assist in teaching the Indian how to take up the burden that civilization is thrusting upon him.

A number of delegations of Indians have already arrived here for the conference and others are reported on the way. Among the tribes that are expected to be represented are the Choctaws, Chickasaws, Seminoles and Chickasaws of the Five Civilized Tribes, the Iroquois from New York, the Sioux from Dakota, the Kickapoos from southwestern Texas, the Apaches from Arizona, the Florida Seminoles and the Klamaths from Oregon.

NO WILL IS LEFT BY WEALTHY CALIFORNIAN

San Francisco, June 27.—In the probate court today a hearing was held on an application for letters of administration in the estate of Peter James Donahue, the wealthy San Franciscan who died several months ago in the Isle of Wight, England. Donahue was formerly a very well known figure in San Francisco, but for more than 30 years he lived abroad. His father, the late James H. Donahue, and his uncle, Peter Donahue, were the founders of the Union Iron Works.
