

NINE REPUBLICANS ARE IN HARMONY

Democrats Hope to Win Owing to Prohibition Plank in G. O. P.'s Platform.

Augusta, Maine, June 28.—The Republican state convention, which meets here tomorrow to choose candidates for the state offices to be filled at the September election, promises to be a harmonious gathering, but it is likely, nevertheless, that it will witness a greater display of political activity and earnest discussion than has marked any Republican convention held in the Pine Tree state in many years. Among the delegates who have already arrived in the city, there is none who will openly confess to a fear of Democratic victory in Maine this year, but notwithstanding the general expressions of confidence it is known that many of the Republican leaders regard the outlook with more or less anxiety.

Maine has been hard shell Republican for many years. Recently, however, a feeling of discontent has manifested itself and the Democrats believe that the time is ripe for a general political upheaval. The Democrats rely for their chief strength on the popular opposition to the Sturge liquor law and to statewide prohibition—which were Republican measures. The Democratic party advocates the system of local option. This question will be the leading issue of the coming campaign. If Maine goes Democratic, the prohibition amendment to the constitution will be resubmitted to the people for reconsideration. In Frederick W. Plafsted, mayor of Augusta, the Democrats feel that they have chosen the strongest candidate who could be selected for the governorship.

Leaders Quarrel.
Dissensions among the Republican leaders are also counted upon to help the Democrats. The retirement of Senator Eugene Hale, after representing Maine in the upper house for 30 years, has precipitated a contest for the senatorial top that is not calculated to preserve harmony in the party. The fight for the senatorship is already under way, with Frederick A. Powers, former associate justice of the supreme court, and William T. Cobb, former governor of the state, as chief contestants.

The contest between Asher C. Hinds, parliamentary clerk in the national house of representatives, and Colonel Frederick Hale, son of Senator Hale, for the Republican nomination to succeed Congressman Allen in the first district, has also proved a note of serious discord in the party ranks. Present indications point to a victory for Hinds in the congressional convention which is to meet in Portland day after tomorrow.

There is no opposition to the renomination of Governor Fernald at tomorrow's state convention and he probably will be named by acclamation. A candidate for state auditor will also be nominated.

Great care will be exercised in the construction of the platform. Some of the conservative Republican leaders admit that the state is in doubt and that it will be by the hardest kind of work that a Republican victory can be secured. In addition to the prohibition problem, the Republicans will have to face the questions of the tariff and "high cost of living" as leading issues of the coming campaign.

CHILD CONFERENCE AT WORCESTER, MASS.

Worcester, Mass., June 28.—The national child conference for research and welfare, which was organized here last year with Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, Mrs. Robert M. La Follette, Clifford Pinchot and other men and women of wide prominence among its sponsors, began its first annual meeting today at Clark university with a large and representative attendance. A five days' program arranged for the convention is replete with interesting and instructive features.

Stiles of the Rockefeller foundation; "The Prevention of Infant Mortality," Dr. Helen Putnam of Providence; "Efficient Organization and Scope for the Bureau of Education," Dr. Elmer E. Brown, United States commissioner of education; "Child Study and Welfare in Europe," Professor William H. Burton of Clark university; "The Juvenile Court and Reform," Judge Ben B. Lindsey of Denver; "What Child Study Has Contributed to Social and Educational Progress," G. Stanley Hall, president of Clark university.

MAY END USE FOR BURNT TREES

Santa Fe Railroad to Give Burnt Cedar of Coos County Trial as Piling.

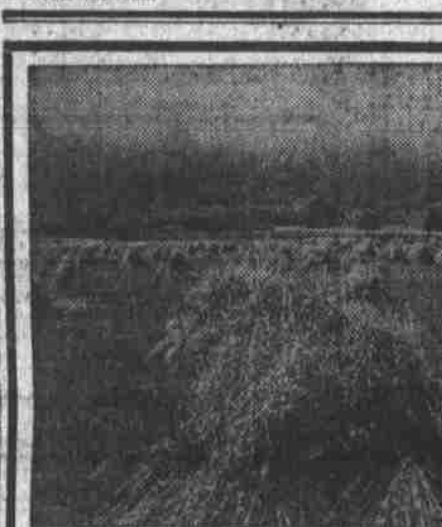

Marshfield, Or., June 28.—A. F. Estabrook & Co. of San Francisco, which first operates at Bandon in Coos county, has undertaken an experiment which is successful may prove a big thing in the way of a lumber industry. The company has an order from the Santa Fe railroad for 1200 cedar piling as a trial order. These piling are to be made from the burnt cedar which is on the ground in cut over districts and throughout the timber where there have been fires. It is now presumably useless and a waste, but if the piling suits the purposes of the railroad they will be ordered on a large scale and the industry of working the cedar logs on the ground in this way will add greatly to the lumber industry of the Coquille valley. The piling will all be shipped out of Bandon. The Estabrook company has also taken the contract for furnishing a large amount of telephone and telegraph poles. The company has bought the timber on 900 acres of land belonging to the Doe estate and located near Bandon and a force of men is at work turning out the poles which are being shipped. There is also a large amount of matchwood now going out of Bandon.

Forest Fire Damages.

Marshfield, Or., June 28.—A fire in the logging camp of the Cody Lumber company on the Coquille river has done considerable damage. The fire was brought under control but the loss which are now being taken out of the timber show the damage the fire did. There have been several forest fires this year but this one was the most damaging. It is believed by the lumbermen and timber owners that the county association which was formed will do much toward protecting the timber against fires. Each timber owner is assessed a certain amount per acre thus creating a fund for the cooperative fire fighting.

LONDON CATHEDRAL IS CONSECRATED TODAY

London, June 28.—With impressive and solemn ceremonies, the Roman Catholic cathedral at Westminster was formally consecrated today, with the participation of one of the largest and most distinguished gatherings of prelates ever assembled in England. The ceremonies brought together the Most Rev. Dr. Bourne, archbishop of Westminster, and the bishops of Liverpool, Birmingham, Shrewsbury, Southwark, Nottingham, Northampton, Galloway and other sees. The lord mayor of London, Sir John Knill, the Duke of Norfolk, Lord Halifax and other noted representatives of the Catholic laity were in attendance. The consecration is to be followed tomorrow by a grand celebration of the sixtieth anniversary of the re-

establishment of the hierarchy of England.

The great cathedral at Westminster was projected by Cardinal Wiseman, the first archbishop of Westminster, and on his death the idea was taken up by his friends as a memorial of his splendid services to the Roman Catholic church. In 1895 the first stone of the cathedral was laid, and in the winter of 1902 the edifice was opened for daily use. The general style of the building follows that of St. Mark's, Venice, the nave being the widest in England. Excluding the cost of the site, the total expenditure on the cathedral building, hall and cloisters has been nearly \$7,000,000.

TO HAVE LIFE SAVING STATION AT PORT ORFORD

Marshfield, Or., June 28.—It is quite likely now that the government will establish a life saving station at Port Orford to better protect the Curry county coast and it is reported that negotiations are on foot for the purchase of a suitable site and that work on the station will begin this fall. Under the present arrangement the life

saving station and crew at Bandon is supposed to look after everything south of that point to the Curry county coast. This territory is of course too great for one station to cover in a satisfactory manner. Especially is this true in view of the fact that all of the vessels come close in to Port Orford to pick up the Cape Blanco light. When wrecks have occurred there the Bandon station was too far away to be of much service but with the new station all of the coastwise vessels will be better protected.
