

CONGRESS TALKED AND SPENT MONEY; MILLIONS OF BOTH

Printers Ink Spread Over 10,000 Pages of Record, and 60 Per Cent of It Just Talk—Appropriate \$1,074,000,000

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, June 25.—In addition to spending \$1,074,000, or a trifle more, the recent session of congress was the wordiest on record. The Congressional Record totaled nearly 10,000 pages and each page contains more words than the average newspaper column.

This has set the statisticians estimating the number of words uttered by the members of congress during the session. Figuring that only 6000 pages were devoted to debates and speeches, and the other 4000 pages to records, the statisticians uttered something like 10,000,000 words.

Bills introduced in the house during the session numbered 27,065, and in the senate 880. Thousands of these were pension and private relief bills. Of those intended for the public good 136 house and 83 senate bills have become laws.

The senate ratified three treaties of no great importance, and confirmed 10,800 appointments by the president, who established a record in the number of appointments.

The recent session convened on December 6. The long sessions of the five preceding congresses ended on May 20, June 30, April 28, July 1 and June 7.

Deaths since the preceding session included Senators McLaurin of Mississippi and Johnson of North Dakota, and Representatives Griggs of Georgia, Lovridge of Massachusetts, Perkins of New York, De Armond of Missouri and Lanister of Virginia.

FLOODS RENDER PEOPLE HOMELESS
Cloudbursts in Kentucky Damage Crops and Drown Stock; Hundreds Suffer.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Whitesboro, Ky., June 25.—Scores of families living in the valley of the middle fork of Beaver creek, along the border between Floyd and Knott counties, are homeless following an unusually heavy rain during the past 48 hours.

Hundreds of farmers with their families have fled to higher ground to escape the rising waters. Crops have already been damaged, and livestock lost to the value of many thousands of dollars.

Two cloudbursts occurred last night in the Beaver creek district. A bridge on the Chesapeake & Ohio railroad near here and a cattle bridge over John Creek were washed away.

Rail communication throughout this section is demoralized and telephones and telegraph wires are prostrated. Reports from the mountain districts state that several persons lost their lives in a terrific wind storm that preceded the rains. These reports, however, could not be verified.

MRS. SHERMAN AT POINT OF DEATH
Wife of Vice President of United States at Johns Hopkins Hospital.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Baltimore, June 25.—The condition of Mrs. James S. Sherman, wife of the vice-president, who is ill at Johns Hopkins hospital here, is grave and Mr. Sherman is at her bedside constantly. The nature of her illness has not been made public.

WARRENTON, OR.
Warrenton, Or., June 25.—Jake Bossart, a 16-year-old boy, killed a black bear last Saturday on the Warren estate near Warrenton.

After a spirited contest Miss Runa Sigurdson was elected Goddess of Liberty for the coming Fourth of July celebration at Warrenton. There were 1277 votes cast, of which number Miss Sigurdson received 550.

COURT CONTENTS W. COOPER MORRIS HAD A FAIR TRIAL

Judge Gantenbein Denies Motion for New Trial Made on Behalf of Cashier Convicted of Embezzlement.

W. Cooper Morris received a fair trial, and was not prejudiced by the activity of the court, the prosecution and the detectives of the state in planning the capture of Howard A. Gullford, who approached one of the jurors with a bribe offer. Such was the decision of Circuit Judge Gantenbein this morning when he denied the motion for a new trial for Morris.

All that is left to Morris now to escape serving six years in the penitentiary for embezzlement is the hope of winning an appeal to the supreme court. He is now on bail aggregating over \$30,000 in a dozen cases against him, and he will retain his freedom while the weary stages of the appeal are being completed.

Judge Gantenbein made no comment this morning in denying the motion for new trial. The motion was argued last Saturday by M. J. Gordon for the defense and A. E. Clark for the state. None of the attorneys representing Morris was present today when the decision was announced.

Gordon placed particular stress upon the jury not having been forbidden to read the newspapers during the progress of the trial and the conduct of the court in talking with a juror concerning the capture of the briber when attorneys for the defendant were not present. Affidavits were also filed showing that H. M. Barton, the juror who was approached, in his testimony before a committee of the bar association, admitted having made an appointment one day to meet A. E. Clark, special prosecutor, just previous to the time he had expected to meet Gullford and to be paid the bribe money.

Morris was convicted on a charge of embezzling \$75,000 in notes from the Oregon Trust & Savings bank while he was cashier of the institution. He is the only officer of the bank convicted of crime in connection with the tangled affairs of the bank.

YOUNG TAFT'S VICTIM REPORTED ON THE MEND

PACIFIC MAIL TO BUILD NEW BOATS
Two Magnificent Vessels to Cost \$3,000,000 Each—Modern, Luxurious.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, June 25.—The Pacific Mail Steamship company is to improve its trans-Pacific service by building two new vessels to cost \$3,000,000 each. They will be of the most modern type and as luxurious as any steamship on the Atlantic. They will be modeled after the steamship George Washington of the North German Lloyd line, which is said to be the best type of architectural magnificence afloat.

The new steamers are to be 650 feet in length, 70 foot beam, with a maximum draught of 33½ feet. They are to have 35,000 tons displacement, a dead tonnage weight of 8000 and combined space measurement and tonnage of 22,000.

There will be ample quarters for 500 cabin passengers, 150 second class passengers and 700 in the steerage.

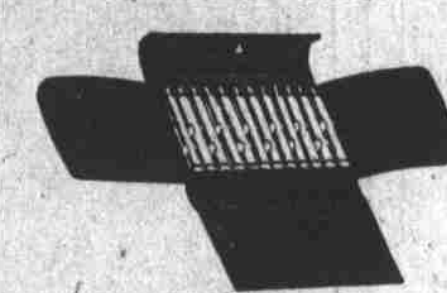
